A. Consideration of request by Tyler Bridges to replace the regular School Zone signs with Flashing School Zone signs on Walnut Street just West of Pleasant Grove School and on Bryan Street on both the North and South sides of Pleasant Grove School.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION : Staff recommends approval of request. Michael Ludi states staff recommends approval of the light and would like to make the Traffic commission aware of the cost of the sign because it is a significant cost at \$5200 each. Tyler Bridges states the original request is to replace the regular School Zone Sign with a Flashing School Zone Sign on Walnut Street just west of Pleasant Grove School. This is the only one needed. Several incidents have happened in this area. It is a blind hill that is right before the school. People just fly over the hill and do not see the cars stopped for school pickup times. Major concern for safety is on Walnut. Ronald Taffe recommended amending the request to read “ Consideration of request by Tyler Bridges to replace the regular School Zone Sign with a Flashing School Zone Sign on Walnut Street just West of Pleasant Grove School” All agreed to amend the consideration.

Mayor Mainord and Commissioner Winterringer reported that they are currently working on RFQ's and that Mr. John Ayers was elected chairman. It was also noted that their seconded meeting is scheduled for Wednesday of this week.

Commissioner Winterringer stated that the new doors on the Commission Chamber look nice. He also had questions regarding the water utility payments at the kiosks located in the Homeland Stores. City Clerk Phyllis Loftis stated that since the kiosks were opened in July, each month has shown significant growth in usage. The average weekly amount received from kiosks payments is approximately \$3,000.00. Regarding fees for kiosk use, \$1.00 is charged if customer is paying with cash or check and \$3.50 if paying with MasterCard or Visa.





IV. CONSIDERATION OF REQUEST

- A. Consideration of request by Joseph W. Ford to establish two (2) crosswalks across Bell Street directly on the North and South sides of the newly repaired rail tracks.

Discussion: Michael Ludi states crosswalks were previously at this location. Staff recommends repainting crosswalks in this location. The City currently has signs in that area for pedestrian crossing which is about 1200 feet therefore the signage is already up for this area. The City would just need to call attention to this specific area.

William Ford reports the Mill has fixed the tracks at this location and the traffic in that area has taken it upon themselves to speed up on the much smoother road. For this reason Mr. Ford believes these crossings are very important for the safety of the employees of the Mill.

Motion was made by **Cody**, seconded by **Harris** to approve two (2) crosswalks across bell Street directly on the North and South sides of the newly repaired rail tracks

B. Consideration of request by Joseph W. Ford to place additional stop signs on Bell Street at the requested crosswalk locations.

Discussion: Michael Ludi reports our staff recommendation is to deny this request for stop signs. Instead of stopping traffic all the time, the staff recommends to place 36" x 36" Yield here for Pedestrians sign. This would draw attention to the crosswalk. After studying the area there are only certain times of the day the crosswalks would be used and we feel it is unnecessary to stop traffic all the time at this location but we did think it was necessary to call attention to the crosswalk at this location. These signs are not at any other location in town but are an approved traffic control devise sign.

William Ford states his first concern is with the safety of the employees. He believes it would be a good start and hopes they don't have to come back later to report they had a bad problem simply because people ignore these signs. Mr. Ford was concerned with what the law on enforcement was at a crosswalk in comparison to a stop sign. Ludi assures him that is Oklahoma law that you must yield at a crosswalk if a pedestrian is there trying to cross. A police officer would have to see this just the same as if someone rolled thru a stop sign. Mr. Ford states that he doesn't believe it would be much of a problem once the people in town are educated. The only problem Mr. Ford foresees would be those people from out of town. He believes it is a safety issue. He states he has mixed emotions about the yield signs because he still feels running a stop sign would be different than running a yield.

Ludi states an alternate sign is available. It would actually say stop on the yield sign itself but would still be a yield sign. It would be the exact sign but instead of saying yield for pedestrians it would say stop for pedestrians. He states he feels this sign might be confusing to citizens. Citizens might think it is a stop sign. Mr. Ford asks about speed humps for the area. Ludi states that with the grade of the area and the Semi trucks loading and unloading that it probably would not meet the required criteria at this location.

Motion was made by **Cody**, seconded by **Harris** to deny the stop sign request and place a yield sign at that location instead.

Staff would recommend at this time to approve the designation of the east side of the 100 block of North Louisa and just south of 9th street as a no parking zone.

Tina Hanna reads the letter from Ms. Buckles at this time. The letter does state she wants a no parking sign on Louisa.



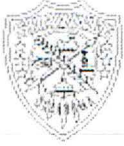

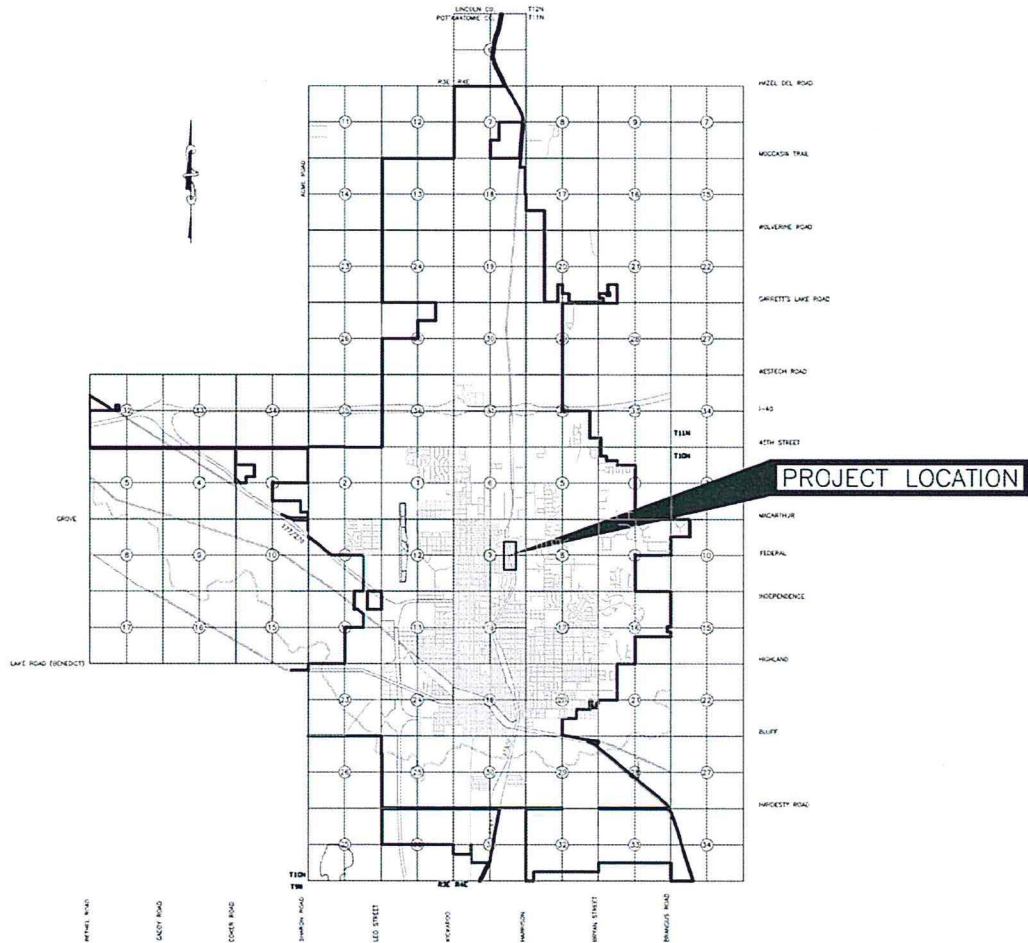

THE ITEM "PNEUMATICALLY PLACED MORTAR" CONSTRUCTION AND MATERIALS SHALL BE IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 521 OF THE STANDARD SPECIFICATIONS. ALL REMOVED MATERIAL SHALL BECOME THE PROPERTY OF THE CONTRACTOR AND DISPOSED OFF SITE IN A MANNER APPROVED BY THE ENGINEER. ANY DAMAGE DONE TO EXISTING REINFORCING STEEL BY THE CONTRACTOR'S REMOVAL OF LOOSE CONCRETE OPERATION SHALL BE REPAIRED AT THE CONTRACTOR'S EXPENSE. TO THE SATISFACTION OF THE ENGINEER, ANY DETERIORATED REINFORCING STEEL WITH SECTION LOSS GREATER THAN 50%, AS DETERMINED BY THE ENGINEER, SHALL BE REPORTED TO THE BRIDGE ENGINEER FOR REMEDIAL ACTION. PRIOR TO MORTAR APPLICATION, BLAST CLEAN THE CONCRETE SURFACE AND REINFORCING STEEL FREE OF DEBRIS AND CORROSION. APPLY PNEUMATICALLY PLACED MORTAR TO REPLACE DETERIORATED CONCRETE. BUILD UP MORTAR PATCH TO MATCH EXISTING LINES AND GRADES OF SUBSTRUCTURE ELEMENTS. FAULTY REPAIRS SHALL BE REPLACED BY THE CONTRACTOR AT NO EXPENSE TO THE CITY.

THE EXISTING SUPERSTRUCTURE, TO INCLUDE THE BEAMS AND THE EXISTING SUBSTRUCTURE, WHICH INCLUDES THE PIERS, PIER CAPS AND COLUMNS SHALL BE REPAIRED WITH A FIBER WRAP PER PLANS OR WHERE DEEMED NECESSARY BY THE ENGINEER.


THE EXISTING EXPOSED PILES SHALL BE BLASTED CLEAN OF ALL RUST AND DEBRIS AND REPAINTED TO PROTECT STRENGTH AND INTEGRITY. ALL COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH THIS WORK SHALL BE INCLUDED IN THE LUMP SUM PRICE FOR "CLEANING AND PAINTING OF EXISTING STRUCTURE". THE WORK MUST BE DONE IN ACCORDANCE TO THE ODOT SPECIFICATIONS FOR PAINTING STRUCTURES IN SECTION 512.

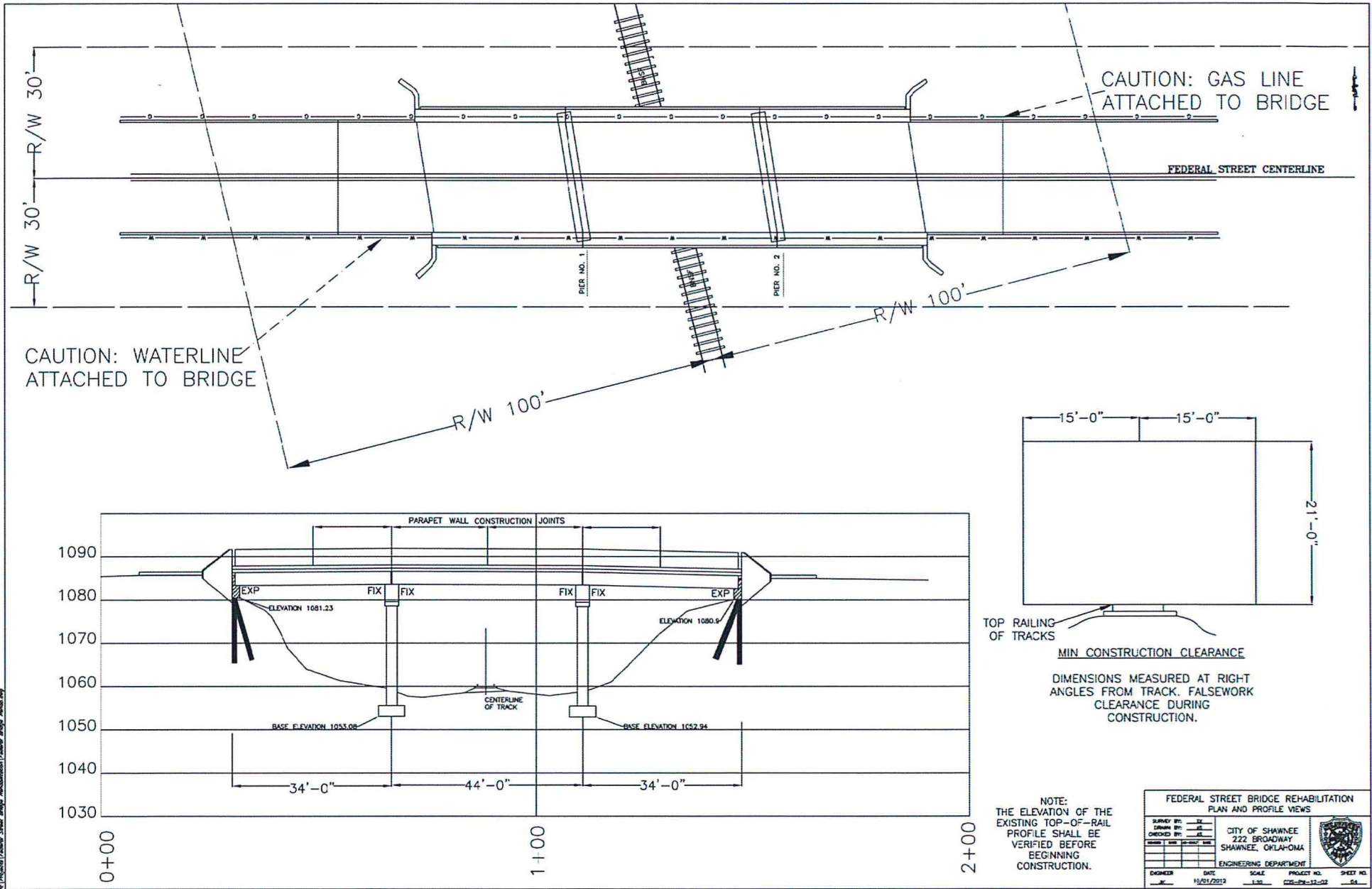
BRIDGE DECK

THE EXISTING BRIDGE DECK IS TO BE REMOVED ALONG WITH THE SIDEWALK AND PARAPETS. THE REPLACEMENT BRIDGE DECK MUST BE CONSTRUCTED OF CLASS AA CONCRETE AND PER THESE PLANS AND ODOT SPECIFICATIONS. THE DEPTH IS NOT TO BE COMPROMISED MORE THAN 1/2 INCH THICKNESS FROM THE DEPTH SHOWN ON THE PLANS OR THE ENGINEER MAY DEMAND REMOVAL FORMS AND BRACING MUST BE PROVIDED TO ACCOMMODATE CONSTRUCTION LOADS AND PROPER FORM. THE BEAMS AND DIAPHRAGMS SHALL BE BRACED TO PREVENT DAMAGE AND ROTATION. ALL THE COSTS FOR CONCRETE, MATERIALS (EXCLUDING REINFORCING STEEL), EQUIPMENT, LABOR, AND INCIDENTALS SHALL BE INCLUDED IN THE COST FOR BID ITEM "CLASS AA CONCRETE".


THE EPOXY COATED REINFORCING STEEL IS TO BE PLACED IN ACCORDANCE TO SECTION 511 "REINFORCING STEEL FOR STRUCTURES" FROM THE 2009 ODOT SPECIFICATIONS AND PER THESE PLANS. THE COST, LABOR, EQUIPMENT, AND INCIDENTALS TO THIS ITEM ARE TO BE INCLUDED IN THE COST FOR "EPOXY COATED REINFORCING STEEL". THIS BID ITEM SHALL INCLUDE ONLY THE REINFORCING STEEL INCLUDED IN THE SIDEWALK AND BRIDGE DECK.

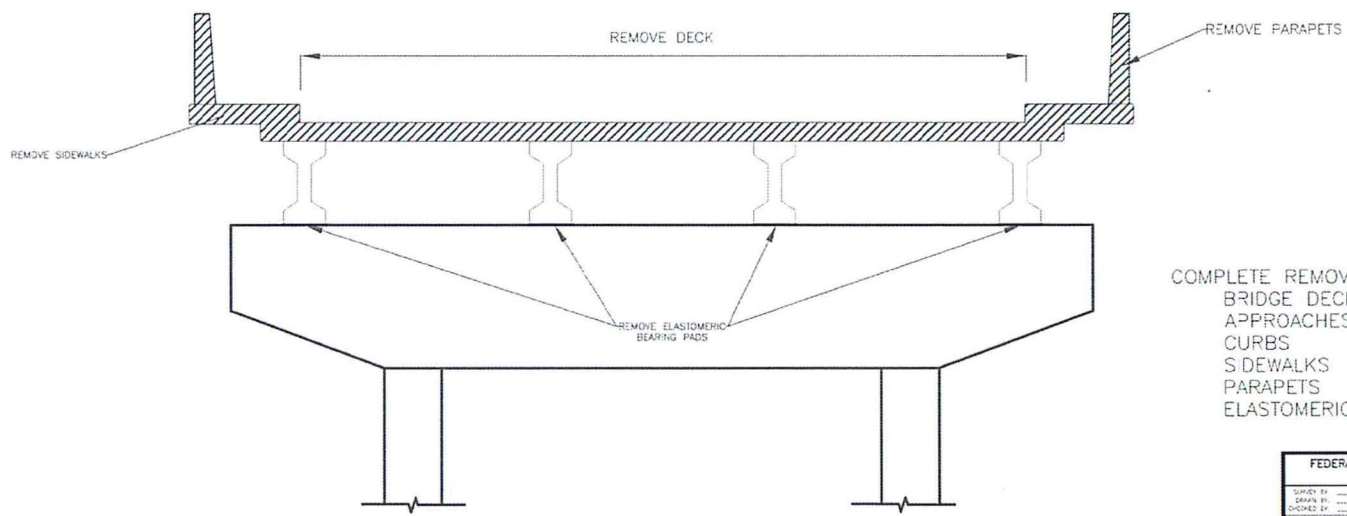
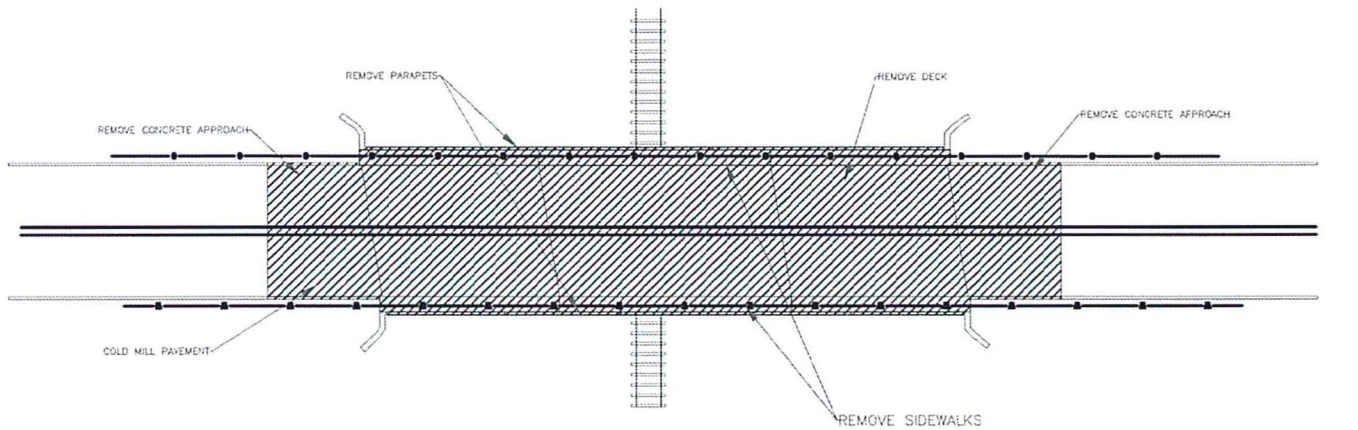

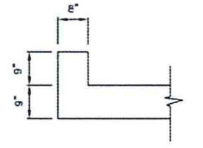


TYPICAL PLAN - APPROACH SLAB

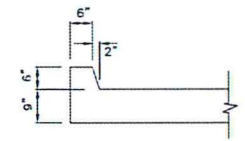

TYPICAL ELEVATION THRU SLOPEWALL

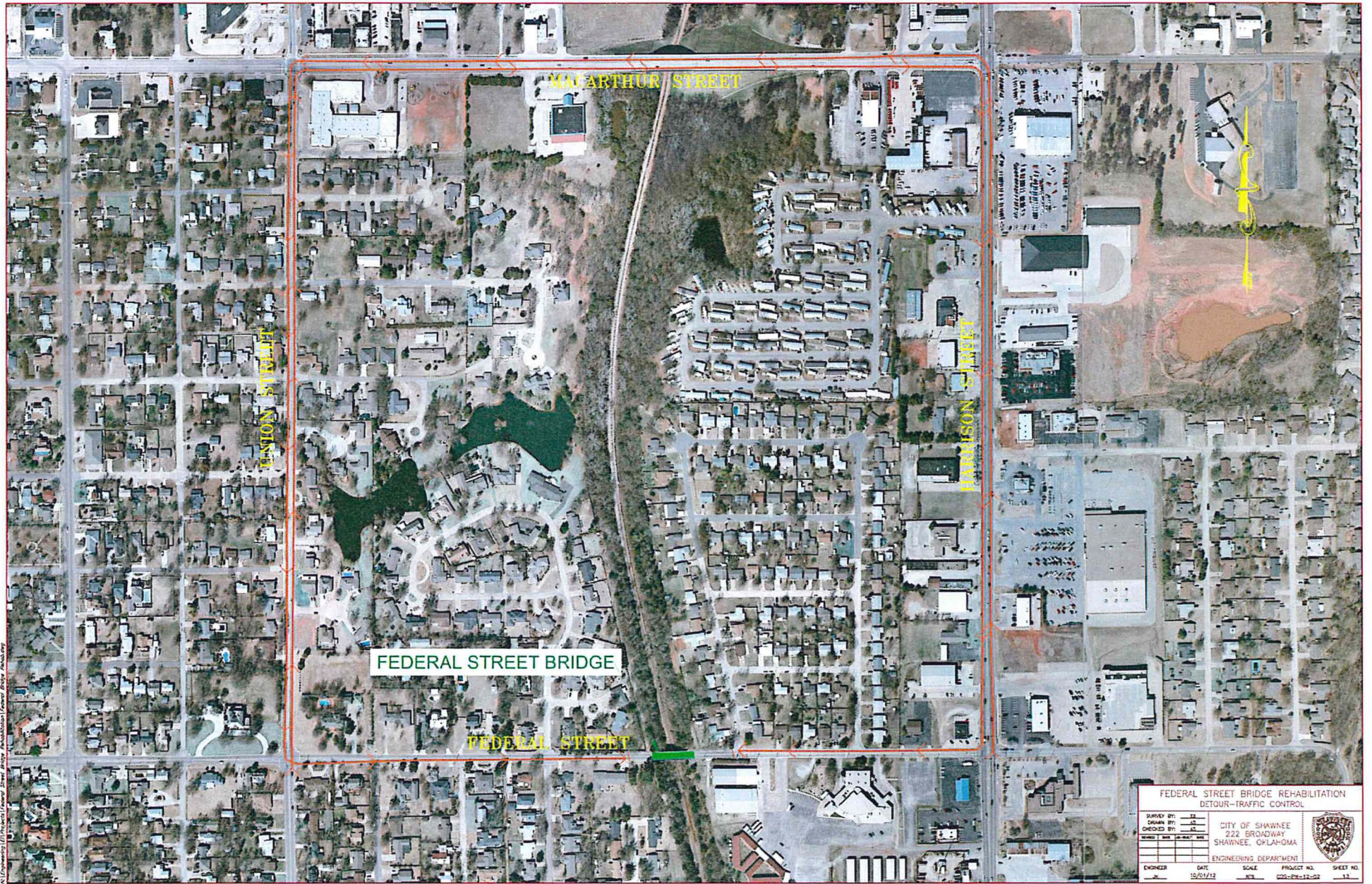


SLOPE WALL PROFILE VIEW

TRAFFIC CONTROL NOTES

CONTRACTOR

ON CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS, IT WILL BE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE CONTRACTOR TO INSTALL THE NECESSARY TRAFFIC CONTROL BEFORE CONSTRUCTION BEGINS.

THE CONTRACTOR SHALL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR MAINTAINING ALL DEVICES TO ASSURE A HIGH DEGREE OF BOTH DAY AND NIGHT VISIBILITY, WHICH WILL INCLUDE ALL WASHING, REPLACEMENT AND/OR REPOSITIONING WHERE DEEMED NECESSARY BY THE ENGINEER.

THE CONTRACTOR SHALL REPAIR OR REPLACE ANY NEW OR EXISTING PERMANENT STATE/CITY OWNED SIGNS WHICH ARE DAMAGED DUE TO HIS/HER NEGLIGENCE OR CARELESS HANDLING DURING THE CONSTRUCTION OF THIS PROJECT. THIS SHALL BE DONE AT THE CONTRACTORS EXPENSE.

THE CONTRACTOR SHALL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR MAINTAINING TEMPORARY TRAFFIC CONTROL WORK ZONE AND EXISTING PAVEMENT MARKINGS ON ALL ROADWAYS OPEN TO TRAFFIC WITHIN THE PROJECT. SUFFICIENT QUANTITIES HAVE BEEN PROVIDED FOR MAINTAINING PAVEMENT MARKINGS FOR PRESCRIBED DETOUR ROUTES WHEN DEEMED NECESSARY BY THE ENGINEER.

SIGN MATERIALS

ALL SIGN BLANK MATERIALS SHALL BE THE OPTION OF THE CONTRACTOR BUT SHALL BE OF SUCH MATERIAL THAT WILL RETAIN A SATISFACTORY APPEARANCE THROUGHOUT THE LIFE OF THE PROJECT.

ALL SIGNS, LIGHTS, FLAGS, ETC. SHALL CONFORM IN SIZE, SHAPE, COLOR, LEGENDS AND APPLICATIONS TO THE STANDARDS SET FORTH IN THE MANUAL ON UNIFORM TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES AND/OR OKLAHOMA STATE STANDARD DRAWINGS FOR SIGNS. STANDARD DRAWINGS ARE AVAILABLE FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION. INTERPRETATION THAT MAY BE NECESSARY SHALL BE REFERRED TO THE ENGINEER.

SIGN SHEETING

REFLECTORIZATION OF TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES SHALL BE BY MEANS OF WIDE ANGLE, FLAT TOP REFLECTIVE SHEETING MEETING THE REQUIREMENTS OF 2009, OKLAHOMA STANDARD SPECIFICATIONS.

SIGN INSTALLATIONS

ALL SIGNS SHALL BE SECURELY PLACED OR WEIGHTED TO PREVENT BLOWING OVER. BROKEN ROCKS, CONCRETE OR OTHER SUCH OBJECTS SHALL NOT BE CONSIDERED AN ACCEPTABLE SUBSTITUTE FOR SAND BAGS WHEN USED TO OBTAIN ADDED STABILITY FOR MOVABLE SIGNS AND BARRICADES.

IN ALL CONSTRUCTION ZONES, THE 48 INCH BY 48 INCH WARNING SIGNS SHALL HAVE ATTACHED THERETO FLUORESCENT FLAGS AND TYPE 'A' WARNING LIGHTS. THIS SHALL ALSO APPLY WHEN SIGNS ARE USED ON BOTH SIDES OF THE ROADWAY. ADDITIONAL FLASHING LIGHTS MAY BE REQUIRED WHEN SO DESIRED BY THE ENGINEER.

ALL 'BRIDGE OUT' AND 'DETOUR' SIGNS MUST BE PLACED IN A FASHION TO ELIMINATE CONFUSION AND CONGESTION THROUGH THE NEIGHBORHOODS ADJOINING FEDERAL STREET. THE DETOUR MUST BE CLEAR AND EASILY FOLLOWED THE ENTIRE LENGTH OF THE DETOUR.

DUE TO THE TEMPORARY NATURE OF CONSTRUCTION, SIGNS WHICH ARE 33 S.F. AND OVER WILL HAVE NO REINFORCING STEEL IN THEIR FOOTINGS.

ALL SIGNS AND SIGN ASSEMBLIES WITH A TOTAL SURFACE AREA OF 10 S.F. OR MORE SHALL BE INSTALLED ON TWO (2) POSTS, THE EXCEPTION BEING SINGLE ROUTE MARKER ASSEMBLIES.

SIGNS MOUNTED ON BARRICADES SHALL BE MOUNTED AS HIGH AS NECESSARY TO BE VISIBLE.

BARRICADES

CONCRETE BARRICADES SHALL BE PLACED BLOCKING THE ENTIRE ROADWAY ON EITHER SIDE OF THE BRIDGE WITHIN THE WORKZONE TO KEEP TRAFFIC FROM PASSING THROUGH.

TYPE THREE (3) BARRICADES SHALL BE SET ON EITHER SIDE OF THE ROADWAY AND IN ROADWAY AT WORKZONE TO GIVE ADVANCEMENT OF CONSTRUCTION.

LIGHTING

TYPE 'A' WARNING LIGHTS SHALL BE USED ON BARRICADES (AS REQUIRED) AND WARNING SIGNS.

TYPE 'C' WARNING LIGHTS MAY BE USED ON VERTICAL PANELS (OPTIONAL).

CONSTRUCTION NOTES

BEFORE WORK IS TO BEGIN, CONTRACTOR IS TO SUBMIT A COMPLETE TRAFFIC CONTROL PLAN FOR THE ENTIRE LENGTH OF THE PROJECT FOR APPROVAL BY THE ENGINEER.

SHOULD THE REQUIRED WORK ON ANY PROJECT, INCLUDING ANY TRAFFIC CONTROL, OVERLAP OR OTHERWISE INTERFERE WITH ON-GOING WORK OR TRAFFIC CONTROL OF ANOTHER PROJECT, IT SHALL BE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE RESPECTIVE CONTRACTORS TO COORDINATE THEIR WORK ACTIVITIES TO FACILITATE THE SAFE MOVEMENT OF TRAFFIC THROUGHOUT OR AROUND THEIR COLLECTIVE WORK AREAS; ANY SUCH RECOMMENDED CHANGES SHALL BE SUBMITTED IN WRITING TO THE ENGINEER FOR APPROVAL.

BNSF SHOULD BE CONTACTED TO ENSURE SAFETY AND ACCESSIBILITY OF CONSTRUCTION OVER RAILROAD TRACKS. ANY FEES AND MONIES TO BE PAID FOR ACCESS IS TO BE PAID BY THE CONTRACTOR AND IS NOT THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE CITY OF SHAWNEE. ALL FORMS AND FEES REQUIRED BY BNSF SHOULD BE TAKEN CARE OF PRIOR TO INSTALLING ANY TRAFFIC WARNING SIGNS AND BEGINNING WORK.

ALL TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES NOT REQUIRED FOR THE SAFE CONDUCT OF TRAFFIC THROUGH THE TEMPORARY TRAFFIC CONTROL ZONE SHALL BE PROMPTLY REMOVED, COMPLETELY COVERED, TURNED AWAY FROM TRAFFIC OR OTHERWISE TAKEN OUT OF SERVICE. DEVICES SHALL NOT BE STORED ALONG THE ROADWAY WITHIN FIFTEEN FEET (15') OF A PUBLIC USED OPEN DRIVING LANE, EITHER BEFORE OR AFTER THEY ARE TO BE USED UNLESS PROTECTED BY BARRIERS. THESE DEVICES SHALL BE REMOVED FROM THE TEMPORARY TRAFFIC CONTROL ZONE WHEN THE ENGINEER DETERMINES THEY ARE NO LONGER NEEDED OR WHERE THERE IS INSUFFICIENT RIGHT-OF-WAY TO PROVIDE FOR THE 15' SETBACK. THE CONTRACTOR SHALL DETERMINE ALTERNATE LOCATIONS AND REQUEST THE ENGINEERS APPROVAL TO USE THEM.

TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES, WARNING DEVICES, AND BARRIERS SHALL BE KEPT IN CORRECT POSITION, PROPERLY DIRECTED, CLEARLY VISIBLE AND CLEAN AT ALL TIMES. DAMAGED, DEFACED, OR DIRTY DEVICES OR BARRICADES SHALL IMMEDIATELY BE REPAIRED, REPLACED, OR CLEANED BY THE CONTRACTOR AND APPROVED FOR USE BY THE ENGINEER. ALL DEVICES AND THEIR CONDITIONS THROUGHOUT THE LIFE OF THE PROJECT SHALL MEET O.D.O.T.'S LATEST 'QUALITY STANDARDS FOR TEMPORARY TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES.'

NO EQUIPMENT OR VEHICLES BELONGING TO THE CONTRACTOR, HIS/HER SUB-CONTRACTORS OR EMPLOYEES SHALL BE PARKED OR STOPPED WITHIN THIRTY FEET (30') OF A LANE CARRYING TRAFFIC, AT ANY TIME, UNLESS REQUIRED BY ON-GOING CONSTRUCTION OR APPROVED BY THE ENGINEER.

ALL DETOURS AND DIVERSIONS SHOULD BE IN PLACE, WITH SIGNING, STRIPING AND CHANNELIZING DEVICES, AS SHOWN IN PLANS OR STANDARD DRAWINGS BEFORE THEY ARE OPENED TO TRAFFIC.

NO LESS THAN SEVEN (7) DAYS PRIOR TO CLOSING THE ROAD TO THROUGH TRAFFIC, THE CONTRACTOR SHALL NOTIFY THE FOLLOWING INDIVIDUALS AND AGENCIES DESCRIBING THE AFFECTED ROAD AND THE APPROXIMATE DURATION OF THE CLOSURE. THOSE TO BE NOTIFIED INCLUDE BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO: 1) LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS, 2) LOCAL FIRE OFFICIALS, 3) AMBULANCE SERVICES, 4) LOCAL SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT, 5) UNITED STATES POSTAL SERVICE, AND 6) CITY OR COUNTY ROAD SUPERINTENDENT.

ARROW DISPLAY

USE OF AN ARROW DISPLAY, IN THE ARROW OR CHEVRON MODE, SHALL BE LIMITED TO STATIONARY OR MOVING LANE CLOSURES.

AN ARROW DISPLAY, IN THE CAUTION MODE, SHALL BE USED ONLY FOR SHOULDER WORK, BLOCKING THE SHOULDER, ROADSIDE WORK NEAR THE SHOULDER, OR FOR MOBILE OPERATIONS (I.E. STRIPING).

AN ARROW DISPLAY IN THE ARROW OR CHEVRON MODE, SHALL NOT BE USED ON A TWO-LANE, TWO-WAY ROADWAY FOR TEMPORARY ONE-LANE OPERATION.

AN ARROW DISPLAY SHALL NOT BE USED ON A MULTI-LANE ROADWAY TO LATERALLY SHIFT TRAFFIC.

FLAGGERS

FLAGGERS MUST BE CLEARLY VISIBLE TO APPROACHING TRAFFIC FOR A DISTANCE SUFFICIENT TO PERMIT PROPER RESPONSE BY MOTORIST TO THE FLAGGING INSTRUCTIONS AND TO PERMIT TRAFFIC TO REDUCE SPEED OR STOP BEFORE ENTERING THE TEMPORARY TRAFFIC CONTROL ZONE. FLAGGERS SHALL BE POSITIONED TO MAINTAIN MAXIMUM COLOR CONTRAST BETWEEN THE FLAGGERS REFLECTIVE CLOTHING, EQUIPMENT AND THE WORK AREA BACKGROUND.

DURING HOURS OF DARKNESS, FLAGGER STATIONS SHALL BE ILLUMINATED SUCH THAT THE FLAGGER WILL BE CLEARLY VISIBLE TO APPROACHING TRAFFIC. LIGHTS TO BE USED FOR ILLUMINATION THE STATION SHALL BE APPROVED BY THE ENGINEER. REFLECTORIZED PADDLES AND REFLECTORIZED VEST, SHIRTS, OR JACKETS SHALL BE USED FOR NIGHTTIME FLAGGING.

UNLESS OTHERWISE SPECIFIED IN THE PLANS, THE COST OF FLAGGING OPERATIONS SHALL BE INCLUDED IN THE LUMP SUM OF THE TRAFFIC CONTROL ITEM.

CHANNELIZING DEVICES

IN THOSE AREAS WHERE DRIVERS ARE ASKED TO MAKE A DECISION OR JUST BE GUIDED THROUGH A PRECISE MOVEMENT, BY USE OF CHANNELIZING DEVICES, IT IS ESPECIALLY IMPORTANT TO PROVIDE A CLEARLY DEFINED PATH, EXAMPLES OF THIS COULD BE IN DELINEATING A TEMPORARY GORE OR TURNING RADIUS, IN SUCH AREAS THE SPACING OF CHANNELIZING DEVICES MAY BE REDUCED TO 10 FEET FOR SPEEDS OF 40 MPH OR LESS.

WHEN CHANNELIZING DEVICES ARE USED TO DIRECT TRAFFIC ACROSS EXISTING LANE LINES OR EDGE LINES, THE SPACE BETWEEN CHANNELIZING DEVICES SHALL BE REDUCED BY 50%. SPACING SHOULD ALSO BE REDUCED WHEN CHANNELIZING DEVICES ARE PLACED ON CURVES, HILLS, OR NEXT TO POTENTIAL HAZARDS.

ALL TRAFFIC CONTROL CHANNELIZING DEVICES SHALL MEET MUTCD COLOR REQUIREMENTS.

MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES

- (1) WARNING LIGHTS (TYPE A FLASHERS AND TYPE C STEADY BURN)
 - (A) NOT LESS THAN NINETY (90) PERCENT OF THE TOTAL NUMBER OF LIGHTS BEING USED AT ANY ONE TIME SHALL BE FULLY OPERATIONAL
 - (B) NOT MORE THAN THREE (3) LIGHTS ADJACENT TO ONE ANOTHER SHALL BE FAILING
- (2) ARROW DISPLAY
 - (A) WHEN IN ARROW MODE, NO MORE THAN TWO (2) LAMPS IN THE STEM AND ZERO (0) LAMPS IN THE HEAD SHALL BE FAILING. THE DIMMING FUNCTION SHALL BE OPERATING PROPERLY.
 - (B) WHEN IN CAUTION MODE (CORNERS), A MINIMUM OF FOUR (4) LAMPS SHALL BE OPERATIONAL. THE DIMMING FUNCTION SHALL BE OPERATING PROPERLY.
- (3) PAVEMENT MARKING TAPE
 - (A) NOT MORE THAN TEN (10) PERCENT OF ALL TAPE, PAINT, MESSAGE OR SYMBOL SHALL BE MISSING
 - (B) NOT MORE THAN TWO (2) CONSECUTIVE DASHED LINES SHALL BE MISSING.
 - (C) NOT MORE THAN FIFTY (50) CONTINUOUS FEET OF A SOLID LINE SHALL BE MISSING.

STRIPING

WHenever the work causes the obliteration of pavement markers, either temporary or permanent markings shall be in place prior to opening the roadway to traffic. centerline pavement markings shall be provided at all times for roadways open to traffic.

THE APPLICATION SURFACES FOR PAVEMENT MARKINGS SHALL BE FREE OF DUST, DIRT, MOISTURE OR OTHER FOREIGN MATTER WHICH WOULD INTERFERE WITH ADHESION. INSTALLATION OF ALL PAVEMENT MARKING SHALL BE IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE MANUFACTURERS RECOMMENDATIONS AND THE MUTCD.

ALL TEMPORARY PAVEMENT MARKINGS SHALL BE REMOVED IMMEDIATELY AHEAD OF THE PERMANENT STRIPING OPERATIONS OR RE-STRIPING FOR FOLLOWING CONSTRUCTION PHASES.

WHEN REMOVABLE PAVEMENT MARKINGS TAPE IS TO BE INSTALLED ON NEW CONCRETE PAVEMENT, THE CURING COMPOUND SHALL BE REMOVED PRIOR TO INSTALLATION.

IF REMOVABLE PAVEMENT MARKING TAPE IS INSTALLED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE MANUFACTURERS SPECIFICATIONS AND FAILS DURING THE FIRST SIX MONTHS OF SERVICE, IT SHALL BE REPLACED AT THE CONTRACTORS EXPENSE. REPLACEMENT SHALL BE ACCOMPLISHED IN A TIMELY MANNER UPON BEING NOTIFIED, BY THE ENGINEER, OF SUCH FAILURE.

MISCELLANEOUS

TRAFFIC CONDITIONS MAY NECESSITATE CHANGES IN THE USE AND/OR QUANTITIES OF THE TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES SHOWN IN THE PLANS OR IN THE STANDARDS. ANY SUCH CHANGES ARE SUBJECT TO APPROVAL BY THE ENGINEER.

ALL CHANNELIZING DEVICES PROVIDED ON THIS PROJECT SHALL BE IN GOOD CONDITION AND SHALL BE APPROVED FOR USE ON THIS PROJECT BY THE ENGINEER.

THE REGULATORY SPEED LIMITS THROUGH THE WORK ZONE MAY BE ADJUSTED AT THE DISCRETION OF THE ENGINEER WITH THE DOCUMENTED APPROVAL OF THE DIVISION ENGINEER.

THE CONSTRUCTION SIGNING AND BARRICADE CONTRACTOR SHOULD AFFIX THEIR COMPANY NAME AND/OR LOGO INCONSPICUOUSLY ON EACH TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICE.

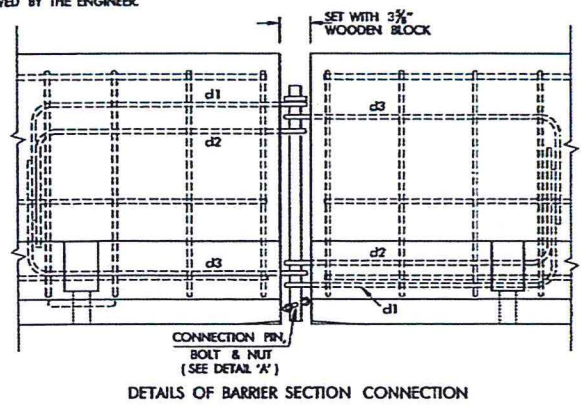

AGENDA ITEM NO. 2: **Case #P13-12 (continued from September 5, 2012 Planning Commission Meeting) A public hearing for consideration of approval to rezone property from C-3; Automotive, Commercial and Recreation to C-4; Central Business with a Conditional Use Permit for a Boarding House or Rooming House Homeless Shelter (34 beds, plus three family units), food pantry, dining hall (soup kitchen), office, and other services for property located at 204 N. Louisa.**

Applicant: Mike Little Construction

Chairman Turner called for the staff report. Justin Erickson presented the staff report. Staff gave an overview summary from October 3, 2012 Planning Commission Meeting, including new information obtained since then. Also, reported that the applicant provided further information with answers to questions from the Commissioners at that previous meeting.

Staff recommends approval of the rezoning request from C-3 to C-4; Central Business District.

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Staff recommends denial of the current Conditional Use Permit request as presented and proposed by the Shawnee Rescue Mission.

However, Staff does recommend approval of a Conditional Use Permit in a limited form for a boarding house/overnight shelter with the following conditions:

1. Upon completion of all other conditions and code requirements, the proposed 31-bed boarding house/homeless shelter may only be utilized during severe inclement winter weather events as defined as when the National Weather Service issues a Winter Storm Warning, Ice Storm Warning or Blizzard Warning. When the overnight shelter is operational, security shall be provided at all hours. Violation of this condition shall result in the immediate revocation of the Conditional Use Permit.
2. Utilization of the shelter in a method other than that identified in #1 above, shall require approval from the Shawnee City Commission upon recommendation by the Shawnee Planning Commission following the Conditional Use Permit requirements outlined in the Shawnee Zoning Code.
3. The building and proposed parking lot shall have security lighting and the lighting shall be shielded so that it does not impact adjacent residential properties.
4. The Shawnee Rescue Mission shall provide annual reports to the Shawnee City Commission related to all aspect of operation. These reports shall occur in May of each year and shall begin in May of 2013.
5. All applicable building, fire and zoning code standards apply and must be met before the building is occupied for an overnight shelter or any other use.

There was a lengthy discussion between the Commissioners and Justin Erickson clarifying portions of the staff report.

Chairman Turner asked the applicant to come forward for any questions from Commissioners. Melinda Blankenship, Director of the Shawnee Rescue Mission read a statement on the need for a second homeless shelter in the community.

Commissioner Silvia asked about the significance of 31-beds as proposed and the residents that frequent the Mission. Ms Blankenship said it is designed for 10 beds for men, 10 beds for women and 11 beds designated for occupants of the family shelter. She stated that the residents of Shawnee Rescue Mission are from Shawnee, there is no reason to bring them in from Oklahoma City. The Mission frequently transports the

homeless to other agencies or specialized facilities. One program provides bus tickets to reconnect the homeless with family members in other states.

Ms Blankenship answered questions from the Commission. She stated the Shawnee Rescue Mission has a strict policy regarding drug and alcohol abuse. They plan on modeling an 8 month substance abuse program after the City Rescue Mission. Those with mental health issues will be evaluated by paid staff and connected with various agencies.

She assured the Commission that security monitoring systems are in place with more to be added. There are currently two security guards for the food pantry and they plan to have full time security if this proposal is passed.

Chairman Shawna Turner turned the discussion toward the financial area of the project such as funding for staff and the completion of the project. Ms Blankenship turned it over to the Chairman of the Board for the Shawnee Rescue Mission and Director of Development, Bill Holly. Mr Holly remains confident that funding sources will be available if needed through successful funding efforts. Mr Holly states the Rescue Mission has operated on a sound budget. Plans are to seek grants that will help this construction project, and funding campaigns will begin shortly.

Mr Holly answered questions from the Commissioners. Mr Holly stated they have applied for an AHP grant but it is conditional upon the Planning Commission approving the Conditional Use Permit as proposed.

With this grant, the goal is to get the day shelter fully operational as soon as possible. Mr Holly stated without the night shelter opening, the day shelter would be delayed because the funding is tied to the night shelter.

Tom Jones, President of the Oklahoma City Rescue Mission spoke before the Commission. Mr Jones offered a suggestion to redesign the 31-bed count plan for family units only. This would ensure that the Shawnee Rescue Mission would receive the AHP grant. Jones noted that this would allow the Shawnee Rescue Mission to prove to the Planning Commission and community that they can operate successfully. Shawnee Rescue Mission could then return to the Planning Commission with modifications at a later date to include single adults.

Chairman Turner asked Mr Jones about substance abuse policies and mental health issues at the Shelter. Mr Jones states drugs and alcohol will not be allowed at the Shelter. He stated that when the word gets out those eligible come to the Mission and immediately start the program of recovery. Those who don't want the help won't stay. Mr Jones acknowledged the Mission is not a mental health facility. However, they help connect those with mental health issues to other organizations. Once they have been evaluated the Shawnee Rescue Mission can shelter many who are on medication.

Commissioner Chris Silvia voiced concern when Mr Jones stated "when word gets out". He does not want to increase levels of homeless, substance abuse or mental health issues in Shawnee. Silvia noted that he would like to see an additional recommendation from staff stating they must have a Shawnee address.

Chairman Turner's concern is the Shawnee Rescue Mission may become a congregation point and may impact the surrounding neighbor's health and safety. Mr Jones answered that most of the congregating activity would be conducted during day time hours. Once the overnight shelter is in place, a strict 7:00pm curfew would exist.

Commissioner Prince asked Melissa Blankenship her view on changing the 31-bed issue to more family orientated as suggested by Mr Jones. She agreed the Shawnee Rescue Mission would be open to the changes mentioned.

Chairman Turner asked Holly Gordon to come forward. Turner asked her if she has noticed any changes with the safety concerns she mentioned at the meeting on September 5, 2012. Ms Gordon stated she received a phone call from another organization confirming the homeless are being sent from the City Rescue Mission in Oklahoma City to the Shawnee Rescue Mission. She continues to see the same issues she originally voiced to the Commission. Ms Gordon said she bought her historic home seven years ago to renovate, but is concerned about the value of her home should she decide to sell.

Chairman Turner asked a representative from South Central Industries to come forward. Tina Hanna, Executive Director stated that many physically and mentally challenged individuals work, live and shop in this area. Several parents wrote letters of concerns to South Central about increased criminal activity. Ms Hanna commented she thinks the security cameras and security guards will help, but she is concerned regarding the security guards jurisdiction which stops at the Shawnee Rescue Mission property line.

Justin Erickson clarified questions from the Commission regarding police activity reports obtained.

Chairman Turner asked a representative from Angel's Acres to come forward. Mike Little spoke on behalf of Angel's Acres detailing the letter of support for the Shawnee Rescue Mission project.

Chairman Turner asked for Commissioners comments before bringing it to a vote.

Commissioner Ben Salter commented that he remembers this issue being discussed almost 30 years ago. That was Angel's Acres and has turned out to be good for the area. He feels management has a lot to do with the organizational success. Since the last meeting he has driven in the area of the Shawnee Rescue Mission daily and has not observed the activity mentioned.

Commissioner Prince stated he lives in the area and therefore drives in the neighborhood several times a day. Mr Prince stated that it appears that activity has seemed tapered down in the last 30 days. He recognizes people in the neighborhood as former clients of the Shawnee Rescue Mission. He mentioned he shares Commissioner Silvia's concerns about determining if the clients are residents of Shawnee and not servicing individuals outside the community. Prince agrees with Mr Jones' proposition to change the 31-beds to family units.

Commissioner Silvia states he believes rezoning and conditional use permit requests are seen by the Planning Commission too often. Often, where an applicant purchases a piece of property for a use other than what the current zoning allows, or has begun renovation or other construction projects without proper authorization prior to beginning. Silvia referred to the staff report quoting zoning regulations, and it was Staff's opinion that the proposed use will have impact on the character of the neighborhood, traffic congestion and general welfare of the community. There are potential negative impacts on the City and surrounding neighborhood. Commissioner Silvia noted that to him, the Shawnee Rescue Mission has not shown that a need outside of the family units exist. He does feel the Shawnee Rescue Mission is filling a role of that which is a benefit to the impoverished in the local area and some homeless. However, it appears other agencies are not at full capacity. Silvia noted his concern that the size of the project is scaled more to the size of the grant than the need. Negative neighborhood impact would worsen if an overnight

shelter was allowed especially if it was open beyond Shawnee's borders allowing someone to come to Shawnee to find rescue. Staff recommended that the Shawnee Rescue Mission provide letters from other service providers in the community, noting partnership agreements and/or submit more information detailing the existing gaps in service that the Shawnee Rescue Mission can provide. This has not been done. Silvia questioned whether the \$2.3 million dollars planned to manage the Shawnee Rescue Mission is the most effective use of the money. Rezoning this property with the Conditional Use Permit would stretch the boundaries, eliminate the natural barrier of this property once provided to the single family residential surrounding the property and would see a drop in property values. To grant the rezoning to C-4 with Conditional Use Permit as requested would be irresponsible.

Commissioner Hoster stated that the applicant should apply for rezoning first. His main concern is for the safety of the homeowners. Bigger buffer zone is needed so if anything were to pass, the family units might be safer. Certainly feels there is a need, but very concerned about the homeowners in the area.

Commissioner Carter commented this issue is problematic. When the issue of homelessness fails to provide nuance, it becomes easy to dismiss or not able to talk about. Antidotal evidence has been provided and not sure that is helpful in reaching a decision. Too many outstanding variables have not been addressed adequately to make an informed decision. Some consideration of this would be feasible since the Mission is already operating as a day shelter and offering services to clients. Appears if this should pass it would improve the facilities and services. It has also been suggested that it may improve the neighborhood as well. Carter stated this would be difficult for the Planning Commission to pass 31-beds without elaboration on the plan.

Chairman Turner thanked everyone in attendance for their support, time and effort to this cause. Turner stated that at this point she is not in support of approving the application as given. She thanked Mr Jones for to his recommendations to consider changing the 31-bed overnight shelter proposal to family units because it does have merit.

Chairman Turner made a recommendation to table this matter until a new packet of information can be presented by the Shawnee Rescue Mission to consider options of family care as presented by Mr Jones.

Commissioner Silvia voiced that he is not in favor of the rezone, making the Conditional Use Permit request non-applicable.

Chairman Turner asked Staff to clarify the zoning classification.

After discussion with Staff and City Attorney Mary Ann Karns, Chairman Turner reminded the applicant of the opportunity to withdraw the application before it goes to the City Commission. If any changes are made to the application prior to the City Commission meeting, Shawnee Rescue Mission may resubmit to the Planning Commission without further charges incurred.

Chairman Turner asked for a motion for the rezoning portion of the application request. Chairman Turner made the motion to approve the rezone to C-4; Central Business District. Commissioner Prince seconded the motion.

Chairman Turner called for a motion for the Conditional Use Permit as presented by the application. Carter made a motion to deny the Conditional Use Permit as per the recommendation from Staff. Motion seconded by Commissioner Silvia.

Chairman Turner asked for motion. Commissioner Silvia made the motion to approve the Conditional Use Permit per the 5 recommendations from Staff with two additional points. They must show proof of Shawnee residency or a prior Shawnee resident and the facility must be verified only as family units. Chairman Prince seconded. After discussion to clarify motion from Commissioners, Chairman Prince withdrew his second motion. No one seconded the motion.

Chairman Turner asked for another motion. Commissioner Prince made a motion to approve the Conditional Use Permit as per Staff's recommendations 3, 4 and 5, (excluding Staff recommendations 1 and 2) and to add the conditions that shelter residents must be Shawnee residents or be a prior Shawnee resident and the facility must be developed to include only family units. Commissioners discussed clarification of motion. Second was made by Commissioner Hoster.

I. PROPOSAL

The Shawnee Rescue Mission, requests approval of a Rezone Application and the issuance of a Conditional Use Permit to facilitate the establishment of a homeless shelter and associated social services (see Exhibit 1). The proposed uses would occur within an existing 26,931 square-foot building (approximate) located at 204 N. Louisa Street. The site is presently zoned C-3: Highway Commercial and the proposed zoning is C-4: Central Business District. The project also includes the development of a parking lot with 30 spaces and a community and recreation area. The planned improvements will be completed through a multi-year phased effort.

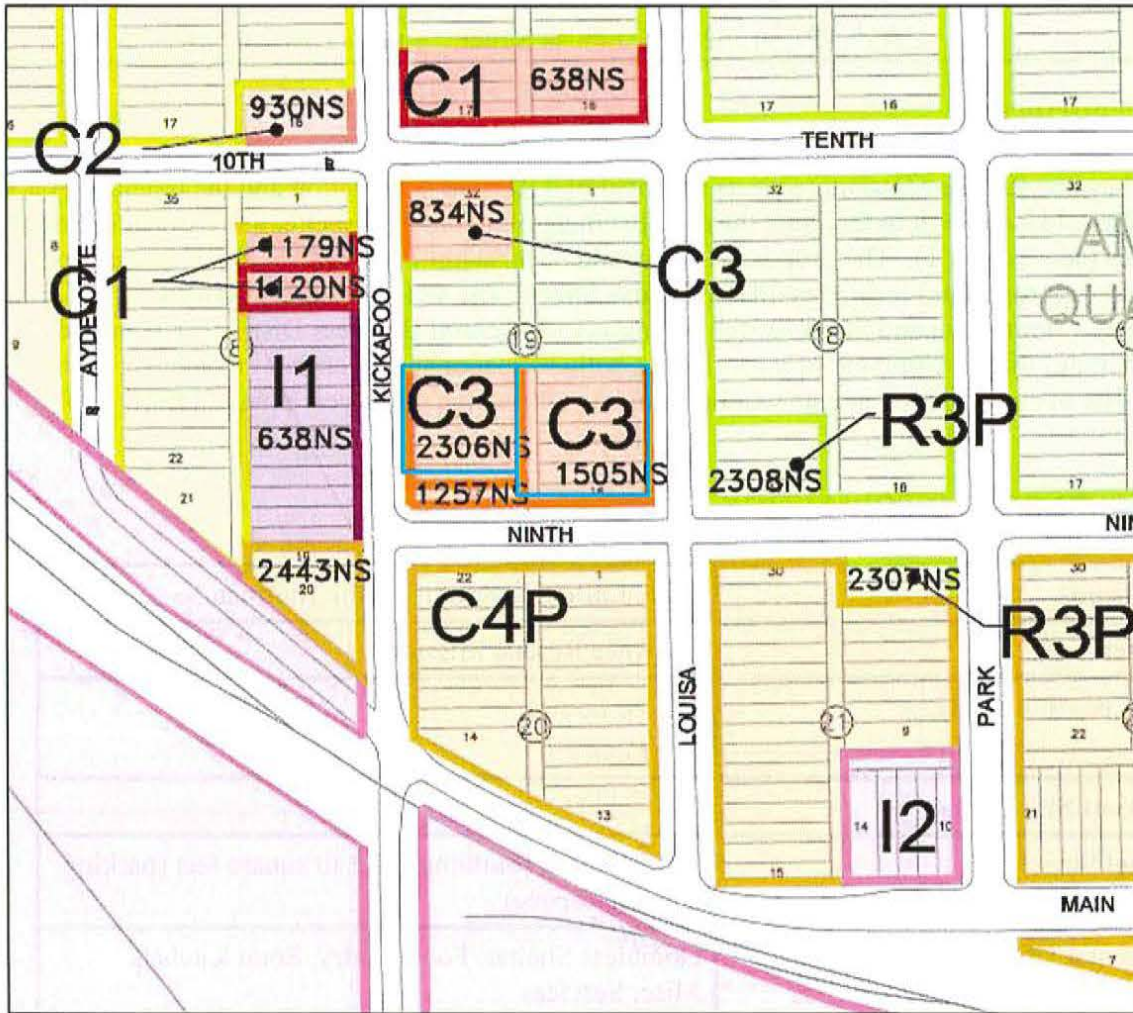


Figure 1: Zoning Map, with site outlined in blue.

III. STAFF ANALYSIS AND REVIEW

This property at 204 N. Louisa is currently zoned C-3 and was previously used as a commercial use for office space and warehousing before being purchased by Shawnee Rescue Mission (see Exhibit 2 for photographs of site). The building is utilized at present as a storage facility for the food pantry operation by the Shawnee Rescue Mission and as office space. The site was rezoned from R-3 to C-3 in 1989 when the building was used for warehousing/offices. The building was constructed in 1950 according to the Pottawatomie County Assessor. Extensive remodeling is proposed to bring the facility into compliance with the applicable Building and Fire Codes.

The current proposal request is for the property to be zoned C-4 Central Business District (CBD) and for a Conditional Use Permit to be granted to allow for the use of a homeless shelter (“boarding or rooming house”) on the property. The owner is requesting permission to convert the existing commercial building into a facility that will provide an overnight emergency shelter, day shelter, food pantry and other services aimed at supporting the homeless and indigent population within the City of Shawnee like medical, job services and other social services. The owner explains in detail what additional services will be supplied in the “Statement of Operations and Services” (Exhibit 3).

In an effort to provide clear information, Staff has organized the remaining portions of this section into the following subsections:

A. Specifics of Development Proposal

The proposed plan for the property includes a full service shelter that combines men, women and family overnight emergency sheltering; a day shelter, soup kitchen, food pantry, clothing closet, medical clinic and general office space. To handle parking, the site proposes a new parking lot on the West side of the building with 30 additional parking spaces. The site currently includes both on and off-street parking. To the North of the proposed parking area, the owner intends to use the open space for a community and recreation area which will include a community garden. The owner will work toward the remodeling of the facility in phases as noted in Exhibit 4. As shown in Exhibits 5-6, the Site Plan and Renovation Plan indicate that improvements will include:

- 11 beds for women;
- 23 beds for men;
- 9 beds for families (3 family units);
- A 180-seat dining hall;
- 8 general purpose offices;
- A two-bedroom apartment use for on-site staff;

- A day shelter;
- A food pantry and clothing closet; and
- Other miscellaneous uses as shown on the plan.

According to State of Operations and Services, 30 residents may be served in the overnight shelter. However, the Renovation Plan, indicates a total bed count of 43. The length of stay is limited to 30 days and residents are screened for health problems and a background investigation is completed.

B. Zoning Code and Conditional Use Permit Requirements

The purpose of C-4 zoning, according to Section 605.1 of the City of Shawnee Zoning Regulations, “is designed for the conduct of personal and business services and the general retail trade of the community. It is designed to accommodate a wide variety of commercial uses in the Central Business District or areas of mixed business enterprises.” The request to allow a zone change to allow for a Conditional Use Request for a homeless shelter is permitted under those regulations. Without the addition of an emergency shelter, the site would not require a Conditional Use Permit, just a zone change as the other requested uses are permitted within the C-4 zoning and actually most if not all are permissible under the existing C-3 designation.

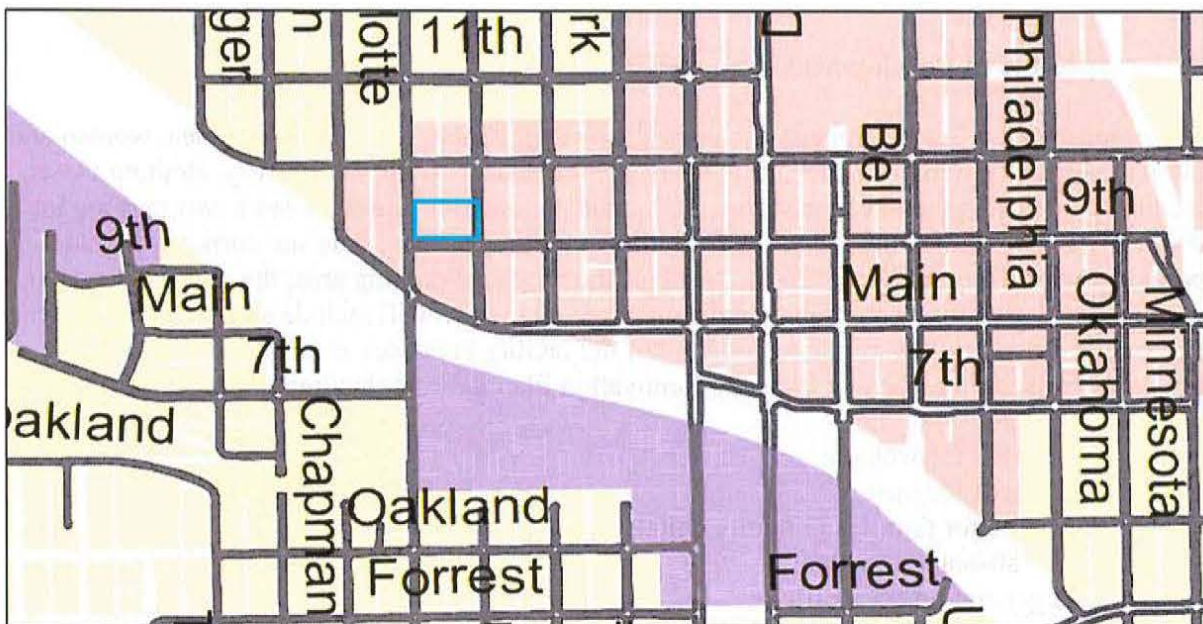


Figure 2: Future Land Use Map, with site outlined in blue (Residential/Public/Commercial).

According to Section 605.4 of the City of Shawnee Zoning Regulations, a “request for C-4 CBD zoning shall only be granted as an extension of the existing CBD zoning district. To be eligible for rezoning to this district, a parcel shall abut or be adjacent across from a street or ally from the existing CBD district.” The property at 204 N. Louisa is connected to the CBD to the South and the Southeast (Figure 1). The fact that the property is contiguous to other land zoned C-4, allows the property to be rezoned to C-4 CBD as per the regulations. Such a request is also compatible with the Shawnee Comprehensive Plan (Figure 2).

C. Analysis of Surrounding Neighborhood

If there are negative impacts associated with the proposed use, those impacts will most greatly be felt by those individuals living or working within close proximity to the property. The surrounding neighborhood of the proposed emergency shelter is made up of both businesses and residents, with six different zoning classifications within a few blocks. The uses within the area are not just residential or commercial, but a mix of both uses that are typical within or near downtown areas.

Staff collected Census Tract data from the 2010 U.S. Census Bureau. Because Block data (2010) for the City of Shawnee is not available at this time, Staff had to review the larger Census Tract data which covers a much larger surrounding area than what might be directly impacted by the actual site.

Within the Tract area, there is a population of 3,275 residents and 1,579 total households. Of those households, 1,302 houses are occupied with 277 vacant. Of the total number of houses occupied, there is an owner-occupied rate of 31.8% and a renter-occupied housing unit rate of 68.2%.

Due to the surrounding rates of vacant housing, and renter occupied housing, there has been a decrease in the general upkeep of homes causing several homes to suffer damage and become dilapidated structures from lack of care. One structure was demolished in early 2012 by the City and one structure was demolished in August 2012 by the owner.

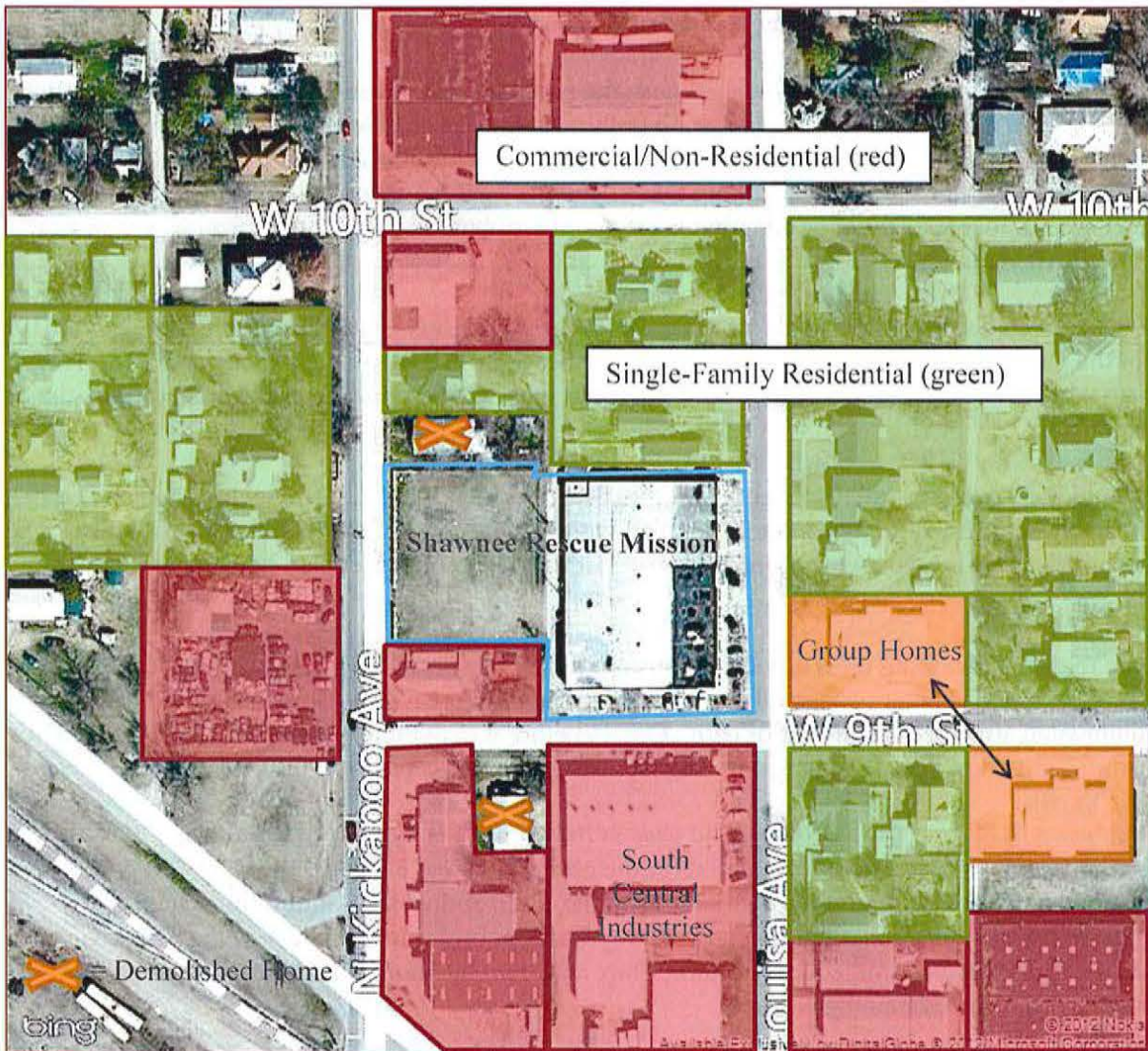


Figure 3: Existing land use (subject property outlined in blue).

As shown in Figure 3, the existing land uses in the immediate vicinity of the site are predominately single-family residential (to the north, west and east) and commercial/warehouse/non-residential uses to the south and west. South Central Industries, which provides vocational training and employment opportunities for the developmentally challenged is located immediately south. They also own two homes to the east, which house some of those in its training program.

D. Shawnee Rescue Mission

The Shawnee Rescue Mission is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization (nonprofit) as per the Secretary of State’s office and has been so since 2010. The organization currently relies on funding from individuals, churches and other business donors within the community and surrounding areas. Information regarding the shelter and organizational goals may be found in the “Statement of Operations and Services” (Exhibit 2). They also maintain a website with additional information: <http://www.shawneerescuemission.com/>.

Renovations to the facility are being paid for by grant funding, with funding in place for Phase 1 of the project. It is Staff’s understanding that additional fundraising efforts will be undertaken to fund further improvements and to pay for ongoing operational expenses. Staffing the completed

building and shelter is addressed in the Operations Plan and in a document entitled “Funding and Budget Issues” (Exhibit 7). Pursuant to these documents, the following positions will be in place to serve the community:

1. Resident Director (2), live onsite
2. Security (2), to provide 24-hour security
3. Secretary
4. Daytime Client Registrar
5. Case Managers
6. Cook
7. Custodian
8. Job Placement Director
9. Food Pantry Coordinator
10. Clothing Distribution Coordinator
11. Director of Development
12. Bridges to Life Interns

Most of the above positions are shown as volunteer positions and as having no personnel costs associated with them.

The proposed operating budgets for the next five years are shown as:

- 2012: \$120,000
- 2013: \$125,000
- 2014: \$150,000
- 2015: \$200,000
- 2016: \$250,000

The projected capital campaign is to raise \$750,000 over the next five years.

E. Homelessness in the United States

A thorough discussion of the merits of the subject request would not be complete without a look at the broader issue of homelessness in the United States. Contained below are the results of a factual investigation concerning the state of homelessness in the United States, the State of Oklahoma and locally in Shawnee. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development’s definition of *homelessness* contained in the Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing Act is as follows:

1. People who are living in a place not meant for human habitation, in emergency shelter, in transitional housing, or are exiting an institution where they temporarily resided if they were in shelter or a place not meant for human habitation before entering the institution.
2. People who are losing their primary nighttime residence, which may include a motel or hotel or a doubled up situation, within 14 days and lack resources or support networks to remain in housing.

3. Families with children or unaccompanied youth who are unstably housed and likely to continue in that state. This applies to families with children or unaccompanied youth (up to age 24) who have not had a lease or ownership interest in a housing unit in the last 60 or more days, have had two or more moves in the last 60 days, and who are likely to continue to be unstably housed because of disability or multiple barriers to employment.
4. People who are fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or other dangerous or life-threatening situations related to violence; have no other residence; and lack the resources or support networks to obtain other permanent housing.

Types of Shelters and Applicable Definitions

Homeless individuals are often defined as either being “sheltered” or “unsheltered.” The following definitions provide accepted definitions for each and are followed by definitions relevant to the type of shelter:

Sheltered: A homeless person who is in an emergency shelter or transitional housing program for homeless persons.

Unsheltered: A homeless person who is living in a place not meant for human habitation, such as the streets, abandoned buildings, vehicles and parks.

Emergency Shelter: Any facility with overnight sleeping accommodations, the primary purpose of which is to provide temporary shelter for the homeless in general or for specific populations of the homeless.

Transitional Shelter: Intended to facilitate the movement of homeless individuals and families to permanent housing. Homeless persons may live in transitional housing programs for up to 24 months and receive supportive services that enable them to live more independently.

Chronic Homelessness: An unaccompanied homeless individual with a disabling condition who has either been continually homeless for a year or more or has had at least four episodes of homelessness in the past three years.

Permanent Supportive Housing: Long-term, community-based housing that has supportive services for homeless persons with disabilities. This type of supportive housing enables special needs populations to live as independently as possible in a permanent setting. The supportive services may be provided by the organization managing the housing or coordinated by the applicant and provided by other public or private service agencies. Permanent housing can be provided in one structure or several structures at one site or in multiple structures at scattered sites. There is no definite length of stay.

Application Review Note: Based on the information provided, the Shawnee Rescue Mission is proposing an Emergency Shelter.

Homeless Counts

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development requires communities to conduct a "Point-in-Time Count" annually. The count is utilized to calculate funding for housing and supportive services. According to the Department's 2010 Annual Homeless Assessment Report to Congress, there were 649,917 sheltered (62%) and unsheltered (38%) homeless persons nationwide as of January 2010. Additionally, about 1.59 million people used an emergency shelter or a transitional housing program at least one night during the 2010 reporting period. Most users of homeless shelters used only emergency shelter (78.7%), while 17% used only transitional housing, and less than 5% used both. Use of a shelter is typically brief. Sixty percent of emergency shelter stays lasted less than one month, with one-third of those lasting less than one week.

National homeless characteristics from the count are as follows:

- 78% of sheltered homeless are adults
- 62% of adults are male
- 58% of members of a minority group
- 37% are between 31-50 years of age
- 63% are in one-person households
- 37% have a disability
- 26% of a serious mental illness
- 35% suffer from substance abuse
- 12% are domestic violence survivors

Housing Unit Count and Length of Stay

In 2010, the U.S. had an estimated 661,230 beds to house homeless individuals. The breakdown as to type is: Emergency Shelter (30%), Transitional Housing (35%), and Permanent Supportive Housing (34%). Individuals in Permanent supportive housing are no longer considered homeless because they have a permanent residence. Approximately 86% of emergency shelter beds were occupied on an average night during the study period. The average length of stay for emergency shelters is:

- 1 week or less – 34%
- Less than 1 month – 27%
- 1-6 months – 33%

Homelessness in Oklahoma

In 2010, Oklahoma had an estimated homeless population of 5,229 (Point-In-Time Count). The rate of homelessness for Oklahoma and neighboring states is: Oklahoma (0.13%), Arkansas (0.10%), Texas (0.15%), and Kansas (0.07%).

Regionally, Oklahoma City is the primary location for most homeless services and sheltering. The cities of Midwest City, Moore and Edmond do not have emergency shelters. The City of Norman does have emergency shelters, including one provided by the Salvation Army. According to the Oklahoma City 2012 Point in Time Count, there were 1,303 homeless counted. Of those, 630 were sheltered, 312 were in transitional housing and 361 were unsheltered. The chronically homeless make up around 18-19% of homeless population of Oklahoma City. Of the 230 chronically homeless individuals counted in 2012, 76% were staying in an unsheltered environment. Veterans make up approximately 12% of Oklahoma City's homeless population and 11% of the homeless population nationally. Homeless families currently make up 12% of the total homeless in Oklahoma City. Approximately 79% of all respondents reported having one or more disabling conditions. Like the national trends, many suffer from mental illness and/or substance abuse. Oklahoma City has the following capacity to meet the homeless housing needs:

- Emergency Shelter – 975 units
- Transitional Housing – 266 units
- Permanent Supportive Housing – 598 units

Homelessness in Shawnee

Shawnee is part of the Oklahoma Northwest Continuum of Care and conducts annual Point in Time Counts like Oklahoma City and other communities in the State. The following counts are for Pottawatomie County, although it can be assumed that all or most of the counted individuals were within the Shawnee city limits:

Table 1: Official homeless counts for Pottawatomie County, 2010-2011.

As shown in the above table, the majority of homeless individuals in the City are sheltered in some manner.

The Salvation Army has operated a shelter in Shawnee for approximately 25 years. The shelter has 30 beds and they accept single men and women. According to the Program Director (phone conversations: August 22, 2012, August 30, 2012), they are seldom full.

Poverty Levels

Poverty is linked to homelessness in that individuals living below poverty are more susceptible to becoming homeless if for no other fact that a much higher percentage of their monthly income is spent on housing. The U.S. Census Bureau uses a set of income thresholds that vary by family size and composition to determine poverty levels. If a family's total income is less than the family's threshold, then that family and every individual in it is considered to be in poverty. The official poverty thresholds do not vary geographically, but they are updated for inflation using Consumer Price Index data.

Per the most recent U.S. Census Data, the following are poverty levels at the national, state and local level:

F. Conditional Use Permit Considerations

According to the Zoning Regulations in 1401.10(C), the Planning Commission is tasked with considering the following in regards to Conditional Use Permits, “the effect of such proposed building or use upon the character of the neighborhood, traffic congestion, public utilities and other matters pertaining to the general welfare” of the community. It is Staff’s opinion, that the proposed use will have impacts on the character of the neighborhood, traffic congestion and the general welfare of the community. The question then becomes, can such impacts be appropriately mitigated to lessen the impact to an acceptable level and/or does the benefit provided by the proposed use outweigh the negative externalities? Staff does not have enough information to answer this critical question at this time.

The Conditional Use Permit process, allows the Commission to grant a use – subject to conditions. There are a number of conditions that could be placed on the proposed overnight shelter that would help to mitigate some of the concerns expressed. For instance, the Commission can require 24-hour security, annual inspections and audits, parking improvements, certain operational functions and other requirements that are reasonably related to protecting public health, safety and welfare.

To date, the City has received numerous letters of protest concerning the proposed request (see Exhibits 8-14). Many of the concerns center around impacts to the surrounding neighborhood especially as it relates to crime, security, parking, vandalism, theft and other activity. Several letters are from owners of rental property within close proximity to the subject property. The Shawnee Rescue Mission supplied a response to concerns raised by some of the letters (Exhibit 15). Staff does have significant concerns with the subject proposal, as more specifically enumerated below:

Staff Concerns

Specific Staff concerns are as follows:

1. ***Demonstration of Need.*** Because of the potential negative impacts to the surrounding neighborhood and the City at large, it is Staff's recommendation to only permit a facility that meets an existing need. The proposed facility is designed for 43 beds (or 30 depending on the exhibit). The Salvation Army emergency shelter holds 30 individuals and is seldom full and the official Point-In-Time homeless count indicates that the "unsheltered" homeless population is substantially less than the size of the proposed facility (this in true in years 2010-2012). The Shawnee Rescue Mission has not provided any demonstration of need or a clear justification for 43 or 30 beds.
2. ***Neighborhood Impact.*** The Shawnee Rescue Mission has operated a food pantry, provided meals, clothing and other assistance for some time at various locations in the City of Shawnee. Based on letters from the public, the current limited operations at the facility (204 N. Louisa) appear to have had major impacts on the neighborhood. Overnight sheltering will result in a large concentration of individuals with mental health and substance abuse issues in the neighborhood. Staff recommends that the Shawnee Rescue Mission hold a community meeting (not associated with the City process) to hear from the public and seek ways to address neighborhood concerns.
3. ***Staffing Levels.*** The proposed staffing plan relies heavily on unpaid volunteers. Based on the size of the shelter and the full array of service planned, it seems unlikely that such an effort could be undertaken primarily by volunteer labor. To Staff's knowledge, none of the staff, board members, or volunteers have any experience operating a homeless shelter. If the organization plans on utilizing a mentor organization or partner agency with such experience, such information should be shared in detail with the Planning Commission.

Simply providing 24-hour security will cost somewhere between \$87,600 and \$175,000 annually depending on the level provided. This alone, represents all or most of the anticipated operational expense over the next five years. Case managers are certified by the State of Oklahoma and require extensive training – Staff is not aware of any shelters that utilize volunteers in this capacity. The same is true for mental health professionals and substance abuse counselors. Most homeless individuals have mental health and substance abuse issues and most volunteers are unprepared and untrained to handle such individuals.

In Staff's opinion, there is substantial risk in creating an organizational structure that relies almost entirely on volunteer labor. The homeless are a vulnerable population with substantial needs. Their service and care is high and without the ability to hire and retain qualified staff, their basic welfare is at risk. If key positions such as Resident Directors, Case Managers and others are unpaid positions, what happens if those individuals depart service from the Shawnee Rescue Mission and suitable volunteers cannot be found? If such situations were to occur and the shelter was at capacity with 30-43 beds occupied, a serious public health emergency would occur.

Staff recommends that the Shawnee Rescue Mission provide specific examples of other facilities that operate with an operational budget similar to what is proposed and/or provide evidence that other successful shelters operate primarily on volunteer labor. Expert testimony and/or exhibits from shelter operators are needed to protect the public and ensure that the proposed shelter is adhering to best practices.

4. *Duplication of Services.* Staff has surveyed other homeless shelters and organizations in the OKC Metro area and all those surveyed have an extensive partnership network in place. Within Shawnee, many resources exist including the Salvation Army, Red Rock Behavioral Health Services, Gateway to Prevention and Recovery, Family Promise and others.

The materials from Shawnee Rescue Mission do not note any partnerships and the services provided appear to be a duplication of some services already available in the community. Staff recommends that the Shawnee Rescue Mission provide letters from other service providers noting partnership agreements and/or submit more information detailing the existing gaps in service that they seek to fill in the community.

5. *Phasing Schedule.* The submitted phasing schedule does not include a budget or specific dates of anticipated completion. Further, there is no phasing schedule associated with the operational aspects of the proposal (when is the proposed shelter planned to open?). Additional details are needed.

IV. FINDINGS

At this time, Staff reserves findings for a future date (see below).

V. RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Planning Commission continue the Public Hearing on Case #P13-12 to a future date, preferably at a special meeting. At this time, not enough information is known to issue a recommendation or to set conditions and Staff feels it pertinent to hear the testimony at the public hearing in order to better formulate a recommendation. It is also likely that the owner may be asked by the Commission for more information based on your review and on testimony received.

At a later date, Staff can bring forward a recommendation on this issue based on the additional information received and as directed by the Planning Commission. An addendum to this Staff Report will be issued at that time.

INTRODUCTION

This report is an addendum to the Staff Report dated August 31, 2012. At the Shawnee Planning Commission meeting held on September 5, 2012 for the above-noted case, the Planning Commission continued the matter and asked for additional information. The applicant submitted additional information on October 1, 2012 (Exhibit 39). Exhibit 39 also includes a series of attachments/exhibits provided by the applicant. The applicant has lowered the number of proposed beds to 31 from 43. They also held a community meeting on September 28. The applicant has also included a draft Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Shawnee Rescue Mission and the City Rescue Mission in Oklahoma City (Exhibit 40).

STAFF ANALYSIS

Demonstration of Need

As noted in the August 31, 2012 Staff Report, there were 17 unsheltered ("street") homeless individuals in 2010 and 23 in 2011 (official January count). Using the most generous numbers provided on the actual count sheets, the total unsheltered homeless population for January 2012 is 24. In January of 2012 the Salvation Army sheltered eight individuals, leaving 22 open beds. An unofficial count was also taken in August 2012. According to the actual data sheets, there are 25 unsheltered homeless. At the time of the August count, the Salvation Army was sheltering 18 individuals, leaving 12 beds open.

Staff Conclusion: There does not appear to be a need for a 31-bed homeless shelter in Shawnee. Recent point-in-time homeless counts illustrate that the unsheltered homeless population has been fairly consistent over the last three years at around 100 homeless and 25 unsheltered homeless. The Salvation Army homeless shelter is not at capacity. Staff is unaware of how the applicant arrived at the requested 31-bed facility, but there is no data to suggest that there is a 31-bed emergency shelter deficiency in Shawnee. If that were the case, the existing shelter in town would routinely be at or exceeding capacity and it is not. Staff does believe that the proposed family units (3) are needed in the community and that at times of inclement weather a temporary emergency shelter for 31 total individuals could be warranted as well.

Neighborhood Impact

Criminal Activity

The area surrounding the Shawnee Rescue Mission has had an active police call log both before and after the building was utilized by the Shawnee Rescue Mission, beginning in about September 2010. Exhibits 39, 41, 42, and 43 all provide additional details regarding police activity. Staff has confirmed that all of the cited numbers are accurate and factual based on the data. Staff does caution though that upon review of the police reports, few of the calls can be directly linked to the Shawnee Rescue Mission or their clientele. In the two years prior to Shawnee Rescue Mission establishing a presence at 204 N. Louisa, there were no calls for service that resulted in a police report. In the two years since (September 2010 – September 2012), there were five (5) calls that resulted in detailed police reports (reports: #11-06545, #12-00348, #12-01039, #12-01278, #12-01654). There have been 14 total calls to police with the reported location being 204 N. Louisa between June 2011 and June 2012 (note: not all calls result in a police report).

There have been numerous calls that resulted in police reports at adjacent locations. For instance, Angel's Acres (205 N. Louisa) has had 12 police reports associated with it from September 2010 to September 2012 and only three from September 2008 to September 2009. A review of the police reports, reflects that there are no specific references to Shawnee Rescue Mission clientele. As noted in Exhibit 41, there have been numerous police reports written for trespassing, suspicious persons, vandalism, theft and drugs in around the immediate area. An examination of the police reports, finds that there is no causal link between the criminal activity and the Shawnee Rescue Mission.

Under previous testimony on September 5, 2012, several residents have reported a perceived increase in crime and in people loitering in the area. There is no way to measure increased pedestrian traffic and people walking about on public property is generally not a violation of law, so no statistics exist that can confirm an increase in the transient population or in pedestrian traffic. The applicant themselves though did acknowledge a problem as Mr. Jones states (public testimony, September 5, 2012), "there will continue to be inappropriate behaviors" and "SRM has no authority" once individuals leave the Shawnee Rescue Mission property.

The Shawnee Rescue Mission has noted that they have now employed security personnel during the twice-monthly food distribution. In addition, they plan to have security onsite around-the-clock when the proposed shelter is in operation. The presence of security can certainly assist in

addressing some of the concerns expressed by neighboring properties, but private security personnel have no jurisdiction on public property and so any relevant issues along 9th Street, Louisa Street and the alleyway intervening between the building and the proposed parking lot will not be able to be addressed by onsite security. The parking areas in front of the building (204 N. Louisa) along both 9th Street and Louisa are also public right-of-way.

Impacts to Sensitive Populations

As detailed in the Staff Report (August 31, 2012), the neighborhood surrounding the Shawnee Rescue Mission includes a variety of land uses and residential densities. In addition to Shawnee Rescue Mission, South Central Industries and surrounding single-family residences, there are two group homes (owned by South Central Housing) and a housing complex for individuals with disabilities (Angel's Acres). South Central Industries has submitted additional information related to potential impacts to the group homes they manage (Exhibit 44, which includes 8 attached letters). Exhibit 39 includes information from the manager of Angel's Acres that indicates that no impact from the Shawnee Rescue Mission has been experienced (applicant's "Exhibit D").

The proposed shelter is less than 2,000 feet from a daycare center and from Youth and Family Resource Center (Hope House). Accordingly, pursuant to Oklahoma Statute (57 O.S. § 590), it is unlawful for any person registered according to the Sex Offenders Registration Act to reside (even temporarily) at the subject site (204 N. Louisa). According to the applicant, they will screen clients against the Sex Offender Registry and perform a background check for violent criminal records. Clients with a history in either of these areas will be denied use of the shelter.

Property Values

A review of research papers and literature provides no information that homeless shelters decrease property values¹. That said, there are no comparable studies that examined conditions similar to what is proposed as most research studies have been conducted in very large metropolitan areas. Most studies also detail the impact of affordable housing on adjacent properties and there is little research on impacts associated with homeless shelters specifically. As per Exhibit 42, one property owner does report a decrease in rental rates. Further, as noted by the Mr. Tom Jones during the Public Hearing on September 5, 2012, the nearest single-family residence to the City Rescue Mission is at least one-half mile. Many communities that have specific zoning requirements for shelters do employ distance standards and many require significant setbacks (typically about 2,000 feet) from single-family residential areas.

Since many of the proposed activities are allowed by right in either the C-3 or C-4 zoning district, it is important to consider the additional impact that overnight sheltering will have on the surrounding neighborhood. The most substantial difference is intensity of use. The other proposed uses (soup kitchen, day shelter, food pantry, etc.) generally occur during traditional business hours and may not occur seven days a week. The homeless shelter proposed is a 24-hour a day year-round operation. Thus, there will always be individuals, staff and security on the premises. This is very different than all other non-residential uses in the neighborhood that operate under traditional business hours. Of course, the overnight activity is confined to within the building and it is unlikely that there will be a lot of traffic or exterior activity during the late evening and night hours.

Staff Conclusion: There is credible testimony from those that live in the neighborhood that there have been neighborhood impacts since the Shawnee Rescue Mission started providing services in the area. Many of those interactions may not have resulted in a police call or a police report. Police call volume may have increased since the Shawnee Rescue Mission was established in the neighborhood, but there is no clear correlation between the two. Other testimony and exhibits contradict that the existing operations of the Shawnee Rescue Mission have been problematic. A review of literature provides little guidance as to impacts of the proposed overnight shelter on property values.

Staffing Levels / Operational Aspects

The applicant appears to be well aware that the use of the site as an overnight shelter will require paid staff positions as the scope of service expands (Exhibit 39). The proposed partnership with the City Rescue Mission (Oklahoma City) should also provide needed technical and staffing resources (Exhibit 40). There are few specific details on funding for the future ongoing operating expenses.

In terms of the building improvements, the first phase is estimated at \$820,720. Phase 1 includes the parking lot, creation of the apartment, family units and shelter, fire sprinkler system (partial), fire alarm system (full) and many other improvements. Phase 2 is estimated at \$497,427 and includes improvements for the dining hall, kitchen areas, restrooms for the dining hall, etc. Phase three is \$180,000 and includes additional improvements to the kitchen area. The total estimated cost is approximately \$1.5 million. It is Staff's understanding that the Shawnee Rescue Mission has procured a grant for \$450,000 to help pay for the first phase. Staff is unaware how the remainder of the money will be raised.

As noted by the applicant (Exhibit 39), the day shelter, as planned by the Shawnee Rescue Mission, is a service that is not currently being offered in the Shawnee community.

Staff Conclusion: Provided that the partnership with the City Rescue Mission is realized and the operational aspects are handled as proposed (including adoption of the Community Standards for Emergency Homeless Shelters), the operational aspects of the proposed shelter have the potential to be adequately addressed. The construction phasing schedule and budget appear realistic and logical. Staff does have concerns that the Shawnee Rescue Mission can raise the additional money needed for the capital improvements. While the grant is for \$450,000, there is an estimated balance of around one million dollars that will have to be raised for the planned

improvements. In addition, the Shawnee Rescue Mission will have to raise substantial operational funds to run the facility once the improvements are made. Staff is satisfied with the overall building and site layout and architectural drawings. Staff does have concern that many of the kitchen and dining hall improvements appear not be done until Phase 2 or Phase 3. This is a concern because those individuals staying at any approved shelter will obviously need food and a place to eat, although a temporary solution is likely possible.

SUMMARY AND CONCLUSION

The challenge for Staff, the Planning Commission and the City Commission is that the applicant/owner is requesting approval of something today based on a series of promises about the future. Promises regarding funding, improvements, partnerships, operations and other critical information. At the same time, absent early approval from the Commission, the applicant would incur tremendous liability if they moved forward on improvements and then came back to the City and requested approval when all the funding, physical improvements and operational aspects were in place. The grant obtained by the owner provides a substantial start to the planned improvements and the owner has a history of raising significant funds.

The best available data indicates that there is not a need for a 31-bed emergency shelter in Shawnee. Some additional capacity and the planned family units may be needed, but a 31-unit facility is unlikely to be fully utilized by the existing regional population. At times during extreme inclement weather, such a sizeable facility could be warranted on a temporary basis. Approval of the applicant's request at this time cannot be recommended because of the outstanding issues relative to funding, operation and need. There are simply too many unknowns – will one million dollars be raised to finish the capital improvements? – will the City Rescue Mission partnership be actualized in two years when site work is completed? – where will the money come from for operations?

Staff notes the many contributions to the Shawnee area made by the Shawnee Rescue Mission. The proposed day shelter is needed and is a critical missing element in the community. Other services and offerings proposed by the Shawnee Rescue Mission are also needed and complement existing services in the community. The grant received by the Shawnee Rescue Mission will help fund significant improvements to the building that will facilitate services and offerings far beyond overnight sheltering – services that are very clearly needed in the community, including the day shelter. Allowance of a 31-bed facility on an emergency-only basis may allow the applicant to meet the grant requirements, thus allowing for improvement of the building and the future expansion of such services.

STAFF FINDINGS

Based on the record, Staff makes the following findings and recommends that the Planning Commission do the same:

1. Total proposed site improvements are valued at approximately \$1.5 million according to the applicant.

2. To date, less than half of the funds have been raised to pay for the proposed physical improvements.
3. When the physical improvements are made, substantial funds will be necessary to provide the array of services contemplated by the owner and such funds do not currently exist.
4. There is no clearly demonstrated need for 31 overnight shelter beds on a permanent basis in the City of Shawnee.
5. Existing homeless shelters in Shawnee have excess capacity based on Official HUD Point-In-Time counts.
6. There is substantial risk to public health, safety and welfare by approving a permanent overnight shelter without ensuring proper oversight, funding and operation.
7. There is a clearly demonstrated need for a day shelter, food pantry and associated support services in the City of Shawnee.
8. There is no clear link at present between the Shawnee Rescue Mission and decreases to property values or increases in criminal activity within the neighborhood surrounding 204 N. Louisa.
9. The subject rezone request is in conformance with the Shawnee Comprehensive Plan and it is appropriate to zone the property C-4: Central Business District.

RECOMMENDATION

Based on the findings above, Staff recommends that the Shawnee Planning Commission forward the following recommendation to the Shawnee City Commission:

Staff recommends that the applicant's request to rezone property located at 204 N. Louisa C-4: Central Business District be approved.

Staff recommends that the applicant's request for a Conditional Use Permit to operate a boarding house/homeless shelter be denied as presented and proposed by the Shawnee Rescue Mission.

Staff recommends that a Conditional Use Permit be approved to the Shawnee Rescue Mission in limited form for a boarding house/overnight shelter at 204 N. Louisa, with the following conditions and stipulations:

1. Upon completion of all other conditions and code requirements, the proposed 31-bed boarding house/homeless shelter may only be utilized during severe inclement winter weather events as defined as when the National Weather Service issues a Winter Storm Warning, Ice Storm Warning or Blizzard Warning. When the overnight shelter is operational, security shall be provided at all hours. Violation of this condition shall result in the immediate revocation of the Conditional Use Permit.
2. Utilization of the shelter in a method other than that identified in #1 above, shall require approval from the Shawnee City Commission upon recommendation by the Shawnee Planning Commission following the Conditional Use Permit requirements outlined in the Shawnee Zoning Code.

3. The building and proposed parking lot shall have security lighting and the lighting shall be shielded so that it does not impact adjacent residential properties.
4. The Shawnee Rescue Mission shall provide annual reports to the Shawnee City Commission related to all aspects of operation. These reports shall occur in May of each year and shall begin in May of 2013.
5. All applicable building, fire and zoning code standards apply and must be met before the building is occupied for an overnight shelter or any other use.

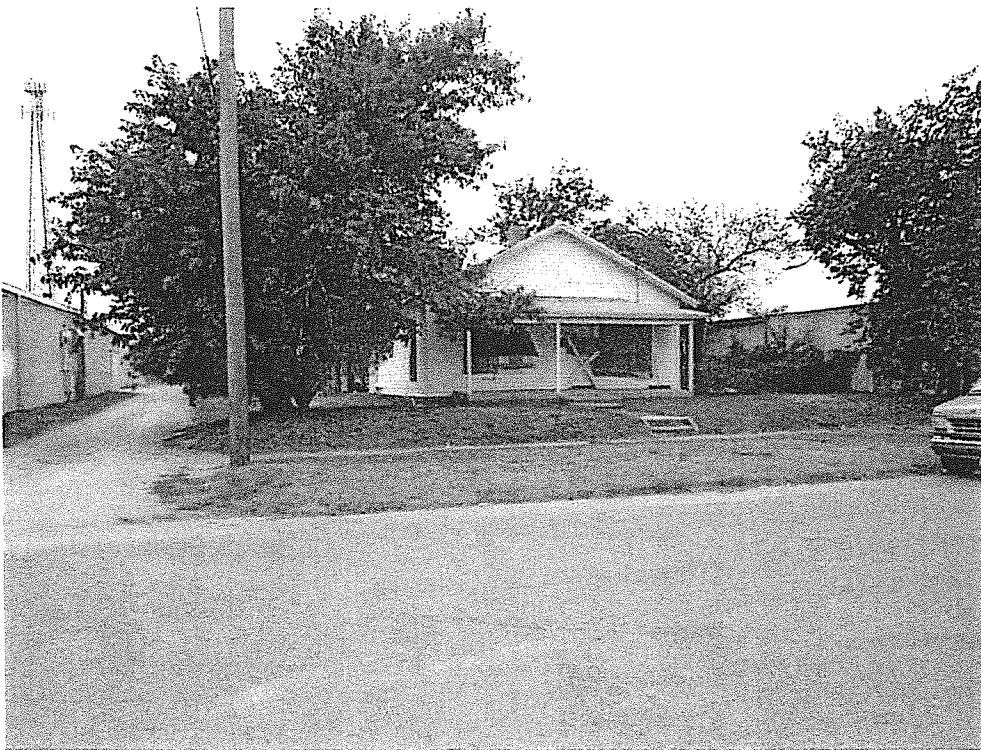

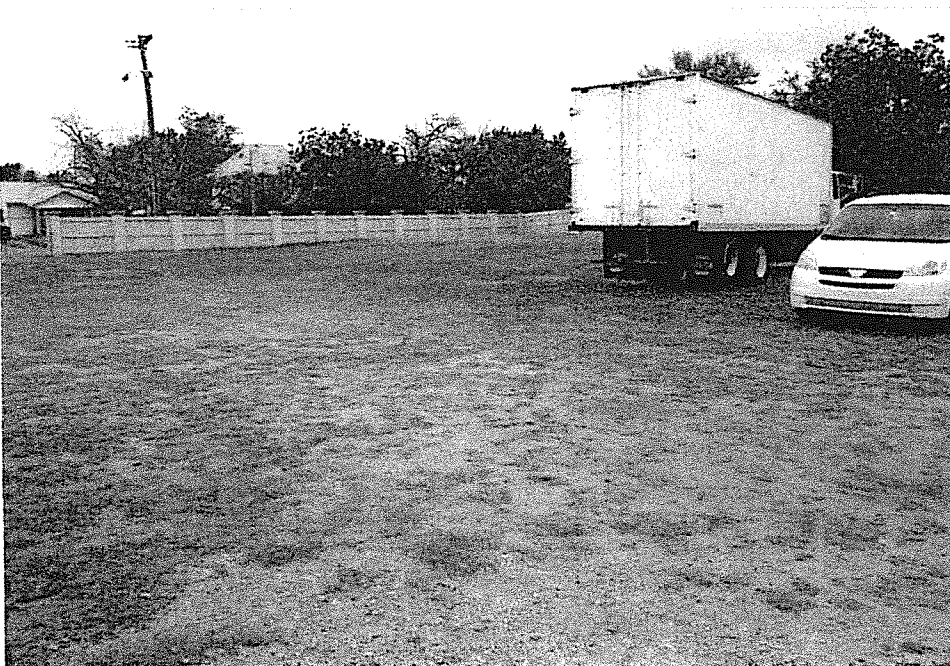

Statement of Operations and Services
For the Purpose of Zoning Application to the City of Shawnee, OK

1. Explanation of what documentation is needed from the State for approval of a homeless shelter.

Homeless shelters must acquire 501 (c) (3) status to show they are a charitable organization. Shawnee Rescue Mission has acquired this status. Physical inspections of the building by the health department and the fire marshall are needed to ensure the safety and welfare of both staff and the clients being served. All existing and renovated areas of the building will be subject to building code requirements.

2. Explanation of what services will be offered and the targeted clientele.

Shawnee Rescue Mission is a faith-based non-profit organization whose mission is to combat poverty and homelessness. The targeted clientele of the mission are homeless and severely impoverished men, women, and families.

Services to be provided include an overnight shelter designed to provide emergency housing for homeless men, women, and families. In addition, a dayshelter will be open during the daytime hours where clients can find shelter from the elements and meals will be served. Restroom, shower, and laundry facilities will be available for client use.

During the day, clients will also be given the opportunity to receive educational and career services such as GED preparation, reading and writing classes, computer literacy classes, parenting classes, money management classes, skills workshops such as furniture refurbishing, and job screening/testing and placement.

In an effort to combat drug and alcohol addiction, Celebrate Recovery, a 12 step program, will be offered. Voluntary attendance at Bible study and faith-based chapel services will also be offered.

An Emergency Resource Center will be maintained at the mission where clients can acquire clothing, toiletries, emergency food boxes, utility assistance, and gas cards. Clients will be able to get information about connecting with social agencies such as DHS, The Housing Authority, and Social Security.

Transportation to and from employment, and social service and medical appointments will be available.

3. What is the number of residents to be served?

30 residents may be served in the overnight shelter.

4. What will be the living arrangements?

The overnight shelter will include 30 beds for resident clients. The men's dorm will be located on one side of the shelter and the women's dorm and 3 family units will be on the opposite side of the shelter—in an area separated from the men's dorm. Each dorm area will have restrooms and showers for use by the residents. A common eating area in the multi-purpose room will be provided for meals. A resident director's apartment will be located in the building near the dorms.

In addition to the on-site resident directors, security personnel will be present overnight to monitor the shelter. Monitored security cameras will also be in use throughout the mission facility.

5. What will be the average length of stay? How will that be monitored?

Residents may stay in the shelter for up to 30 consecutive nights. After that time, they will be given the option to enter a recovery program.

Clients will be checked into the mission by a case manager who will monitor their status through a software tracking system.

6. What will be the house rules?

- No Loitering on or around the shelter grounds.
- No drugs or alcohol on premises.
- No smoking inside the building and only in designated outside areas.
- No weapons of any kind.
- No fighting or violence.
- No bullying
- No profanity
- No exiting the overnight shelter after 9 PM curfew except for employment and then only with a prior written permit from the shelter director.
- Lockdown and lights out by 10 PM.
- Men, Women, and Families must stay in their own dorm areas overnight.
- During the day, men, women, and families may visit together in the big open multi-purpose room.
- Residents must be fully clothed when not in their room. Dress must be modest in keeping with Christian moral standards.
- Food may be eaten only in designated areas.
- Clients are expected to clean up behind themselves—trash, laundry, etc.
- Complete chores as assigned.
- Keep your possessions locked in your locker.
- SRM may conduct searches of client's person or belongings for weapons, drugs, and alcohol.
- Residents who sign out to leave the shelter during the day, must sign back in if they return for the overnight shelter.

7. How are residents screened?

Residents will be checked against the Sex Offender Registry and a background check will be done to check for a violent criminal record . TB, Hepatitis, and HIV testing will be required.

Residents will be screened through a client intake form where an interview will be conducted by a case manager who will assess their biographical, physical and mental health status.

8. Number and positions of Staff including the Staff to resident ratio.

The staff at SRM will include:

- 2 Full-time Resident Directors
- 1 Daytime and 1 Nighttime Security Guard
- Mission Secretary
- Daytime Client Registrar
- Case Manager
- Cook
- Custodian
- Job Placement Director
- Food Pantry Director
- Clothing Distribution Coordinator
- Director of Development
- Bridges to Life Interns

The staff to client ratio will be 1 staff person to 5 clients in the overnight shelter.

9. How will security be handled?

- There will be 1 Daytime and 1 Nighttime Security Guard monitoring the building and grounds.
- Security cameras will be installed both inside and outside of the building.
- An alarm/security system will have a direct line to the police and fire departments.
- Clients will check in and out at the registration desk.
- Exterior doors will be the crashbar type that remain locked at all times and allow people to always get out of the building but they cannot re-enter from the outside without a key or being let in.
- Main entrance door on the west side of the building will be unlocked during the day.

10. How will staff handle disease/virus control (ie. UV lights for TB, TB tests, cleaning practices for viruses/colds, etc.

- Residents will be required to undergo TB, Hepatitis, and HIV testing.
- Staff will receive workshop training on how to prevent the spread of infectious diseases—ie. washing hands, wearing gloves when providing first aid or cleaning up any bodily fluids such as blood, urine, feces, or vomit.
- UV lights will be installed to help prevent the spread of TB.
- Clients with a persistent cough will be sent for medical care.
- Clients who appear to be sick and running a fever will be isolated and medical care will be sought.
- Surfaces in the kitchen, dining area, and bathrooms will regularly be cleaned with anti-microbial/anti-bacterial agents.
- Regular inspections will be conducted by the health department to ensure our food handling practices and kitchen procedures are kept up to code.
- Staff and Clients will be trained on importance of regular handwashing, use of hand-sanitizer, and covering their mouth and nose when sneezing or coughing.
- Hand-sanitizer dispensers will be placed throughout the shelter & mission.
- Tissues will be readily available during cold and flu season.
- Bedding will be laundered regularly and always changed when one client moves out and another moves in.
- Transportation to the emergency room, free clinic, and other health care will be provided as needed.
- Efforts will be made to partner with the medical community to set up free flu and pneumonia vaccinations.

11. Written documentation of what type of Good Neighbor Policies will be in place.

A. How will loitering on adjacent property be dealt with?

There will be no loitering whatsoever on Louisa or 9th Streets or around surrounding residences and businesses. The on-site Security Guard will regularly monitor these areas for such activity and call the police as needed.

B. How will disruptive residents be dealt with?

If residents refuse to comply with the request to cease disruptive behavior, the police will be called to remove them from the premises. The resident will be banned from the services of SRM for incremental lengths of time based on the severity of the offense.

C. How will noise be controlled?

Residents must be inside the building and in their dorm rooms by the 9 PM nightly curfew. No loud or disruptive music or noises will be allowed on the premises. Failure to comply will result in the resident being escorted from the premises.

D. What are the hours of operation and how will those hours keep from disrupting the general feel of the neighborhood?

The overnight portion of the shelter will be operational 24 hours a day. However, residents who stay overnight in the shelter must be in their dorm rooms by 9 PM. Lights out will be by 10 PM. Residents will not be allowed to leave the building between the lockdown hours of 9 PM and 6 AM unless they must leave the building for employment reasons. In such case, a permit signed by the director would be issued ahead of time.

Both dayshelter and overnight clients arrive primarily on foot or by bicycle and will enter the building on the west side of the building, away from the residential and business areas on 9th and Louisa Streets. Parking will be limited on the residential street sides of the building. Loitering outside will not be tolerated.

While in and around the building, clients at the shelter during the day should typically be engaged in some productive activity such as housekeeping chores, gardening, or maintaining the landscaping, attending classes, helping with processing donations, assisting with the processing of emergency food boxes, etc.

12. What type of outdoor lighting, if any, will be added to the facility?

Adequate outdoor lighting is already in place.

13. Site plan and floor plan of the facility drawn to scale.

14. What facilities will be available on site?

The one existing building will be renovated to house an overnight shelter with separate men's and women's residential dorm rooms, 3 family residential units and a resident director's apartment.

The building will also house a dayshelter, and an emergency resource center. A commercial kitchen will be included and will be used for preparing and serving meals to shelter clients.

The multi-purpose room will be used as the common dining and seating area as well as a place for conducting faith-based chapel services. Laundry facilities and restrooms with showers for the client's use will be included in the building.

The mission administrative offices and conference room will remain housed in their current location on the east side of the building.

15. What other services will be offered on site?

- The Emergency Resource Center will be maintained at the mission where clients can acquire clothing, toiletries, emergency food boxes, and utility assistance.
- Clients will also be able to get information about connecting with social agencies such as DHS, The Housing Authority, and Social Security.

- Transportation to and from employment, social service agencies, and medical appointments will be available.
- Gas cards and need-based-travelers-aid will be provided to assist homeless and impoverished clients who are stranded and need to relocate to other cities or states for jobs or to return home to their families.
- Clients will have the opportunity to receive educational and career services such as GED preparation, reading and writing classes, computer literacy classes, parenting classes, money management classes, skills workshops such as furniture refurbishing, and job screening and placement.
- The Celebrate Recovery 12 step drug and alcohol program will be offered.
- Voluntary attendance at Bible study and faith-based chapel services will also be offered.
- A landline phone is provided at the mission for client use.

16. Will there be a partnership with other social services?

SRM would like to keep an open dialogue between other non-profits offering similar services in the Shawnee area and to share resources as appropriate. Long range goals would include inviting representatives from agencies such as Social Security, The Housing Authority, and DHS to join our efforts to combat poverty and homelessness. Having on-site or guest representatives from these organizations come to SRM to provide information to help connect our clients to assistance that is available within our community would be invaluable. Our vision is to bring wrap-around services to Shawnee, whereby our clients can get the most complete services available to ensure long-term stability in their lives.

17. How will residents arrive at the shelter?

The majority of our shelter residents will be arriving by walking or riding bicycles. A few may have a vehicle. We will not be going out to “round up” potential clients.

18. What public transportation options will be available?

SRM will provide transportation for our shelter residents to help them get to and from employment, needed social services, and medical appointments.

Organizations such as CPN offer transportation that is subject to availability and is on an appointment basis. COCAA offers rides through their COTS program. Local churches or other social agencies may also provide volunteers to assist with transportation of clients.

19. What are your funding sources and how will those be maintained.

SRM primarily relies on contributions from individuals, churches/religious organizations, and business donors. Our Board of Directors has been very actively involved in raising money through an Annual Fund Campaign.

We are very fortunate to have a professional Director of Development on our Board who has 30 years of successful experience in the field of institutional and non-profit fundraising. He and a team of volunteers are gearing up to move us into phase two of our Bridging the Gap Annual Fund Campaign.

On an annual basis, volunteers will be enlisted who are trained and assigned donor solicitation responsibilities. Currently, approximately forty (40) volunteers are being recruited. They will be responsible for making financial commitments to our annual fund campaign and making gift solicitations.

Efforts are also currently underway to research, make contact with, and solicit funds from charitable foundations. Foundation support will be extremely beneficial to funding for Capital needs.

A Direct Mail campaign is also in the future. We will also continue to maintain a presence through newsletters, and social media, such as facebook, where invitations and requests for support are made on a routine basis.

We continue to secure food and other supplies from Feed the Children at no cost and from the Oklahoma Food Bank for "pennies on the dollar."

In an effort to show good stewardship of funds and to maintain transparency of our finances, annual audits will be done and will be made available to anyone interested in reviewing our financial records.

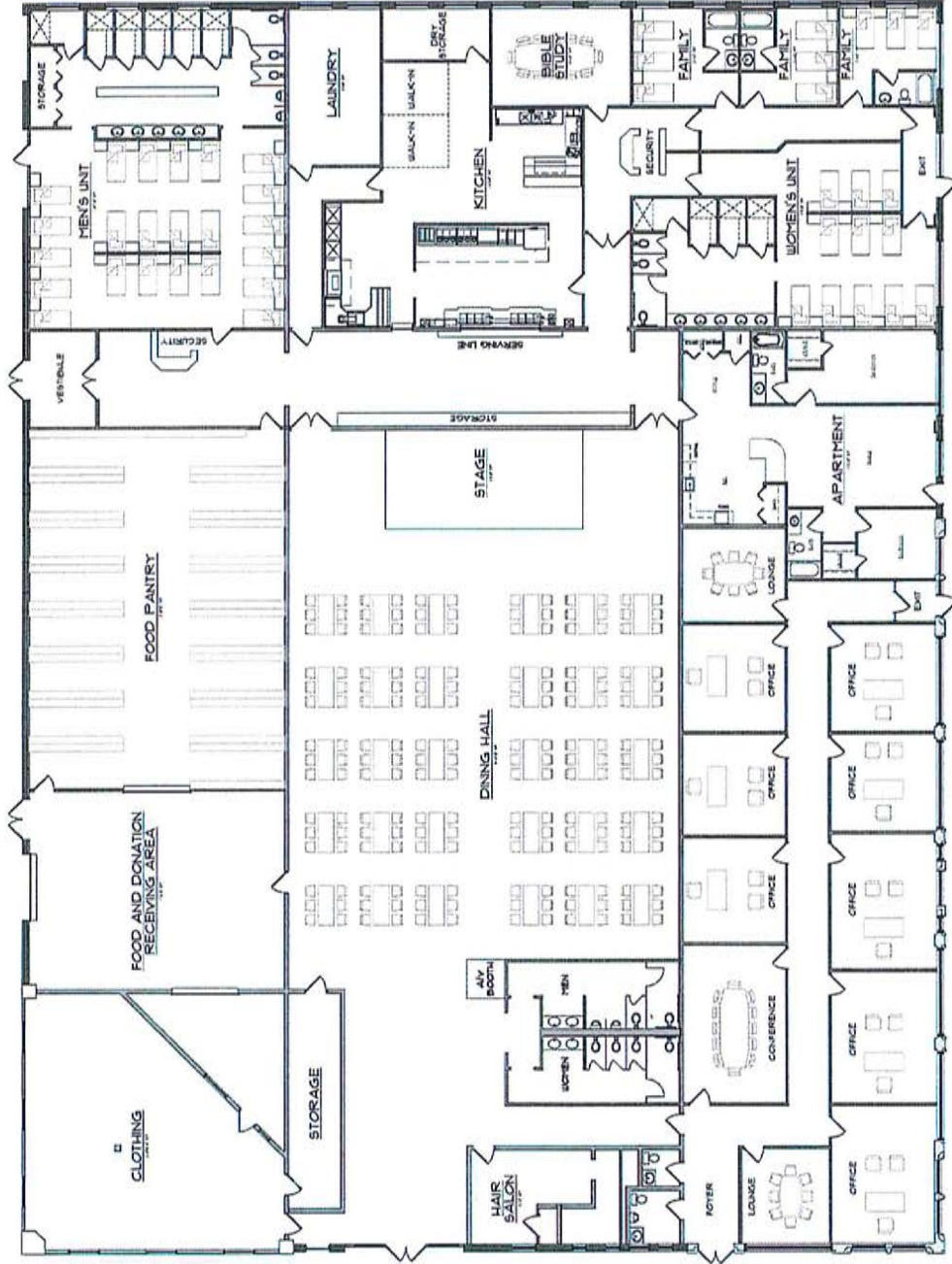

DETAILED INFORMATION REGARDING QUESTION 8: PROJECTED STAFFING FOR THE SHAWNEE RESCUE MISSION:

We would like to address concerns regarding funding for the projected staff for the Shawnee Rescue Mission. We anticipate that the staff will be phased in gradually and no new staff will be in place any earlier than January 2014:

2 Full-Time Resident Directors: Currently Glenn and Melissa Blankenship direct the work of the Shawnee Rescue Mission and are not paid. When the current facility is remodeled, they plan to serve, at no compensation, as Resident Directors and will live in the apartment that will be part of the remodel.

1 Daytime and 1 Nighttime Security Guard: We are currently exploring hiring part-time security from the OBU and St Gregory's security force to staff these positions.

Mission Secretary: Volunteers will staff this position. Currently, we have 3 individuals who already voluntarily provide various secretarial services. These individuals plan to continue doing so following the renovation and reopening of the shelter.

Daytime Client Registrar: A person who voluntarily served in this capacity when our day shelter was open will initially serve in this position along with their volunteer assistant. In year two of operation, we anticipate using a client to help with this position who will receive a minimum salary to include lodging and meals as part of the compensation package.

Case Managers: Initially we plan to utilize capable individuals among our slate of volunteers from the Shawnee Community who are willing to receive training specific to their serving as Case Managers. Some of these individuals are retired teachers who are already well aware of the need for confidentiality and have done assessment and evaluations of students for years. We also plan to utilize selected Interns from City Rescue Mission to provide assistance. In year three of operations, our plan is to secure a part-time psychologist to manage the volunteer staff. Anticipated part-time salary range for this person, to be budgeted: \$25,000.

Cook: Again, we plan to use volunteers to initially staff this position. Both Individuals and Church groups have already demonstrated their ability to work in this capacity when our day shelter was open and serving meals. Select clients will be used to assist in food preparation and will be used as long as they are able to meet health code standards. All food preparation will be subject to safe food handling practices and inspections by the health department.

Custodian: Initially, Bridges to Life Interns from City Rescue Mission and volunteers from both the community and our client base will ensure that the building is cleaned. We also anticipate using persons who are assigned to SRM to do community service. This has worked very well in the past.

Job Placement Director: This person is already voluntarily serving in this capacity. He is a highly qualified professional who has already successfully placed numerous clients in jobs by providing screening and preparing them for job interviews.

Food Pantry Coordinator: A qualified and very experienced individual, who plans to continue in this capacity, already voluntarily staffs this position. An army of volunteers assists in this operation.

Clothing Distribution Coordinator: A volunteer coordinator already heads up this work and is regularly assisted by community volunteer workers. Clients will also be used to assist with this work.

Director of Development: Currently, the SRM Board Chairman serves in this capacity as a volunteer and plans to serve voluntarily in the future. He has thirty plus years experience as a successful development professional at the university, private consultant, and non-profit levels.

Bridges to Life Interns: As a fulfillment of their requirements to complete the Bridges to Life Program at City Rescue Mission, these individuals will serve in various volunteer capacities at Shawnee Rescue Mission.

Please accept this letter as a formal protest from South Central Industries, Inc. concerning the proposed rezoning of the Shawnee Rescue Mission, Case #P13-12.

South Central Industries, Inc. is located directly across the street at 130 N. Louisa from the Shawnee Rescue Mission. South Central was established in 1981 as a non-profit sheltered workshop to provide vocational training and employment opportunities to individuals with developmental disabilities. Currently we have over 50 clients with diagnosis ranging from Down's Syndrome, Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Blindness and Deafness who are served by South Central on a daily basis Monday through Friday.

South Central has been a supporter of Shawnee Rescue Mission by donating labor, fork lift services and a commercial freezer to the project. We have attempted to be a good neighbor but circumstances have deteriorated to a point that we no longer can support the activities and behaviors associated with Shawnee Rescue Mission.

Following are a list of concerns that South Central maintains:

1. **Public sexual activities being performed outside of the Rescue Mission.**
South Central staff on three separate occasions have witnessed Rescue Mission clients on the south, west and east sides of the Mission engaging in public sexual activities. South Central clients have also reported seeing other sexual activities occurring. Both South Central staff and clients have been solicited to join the activity.
2. **Panhandling of South Central clients by Rescue Mission clients.**
Rescue Mission clients continuously panhandle South Central clients and staff. South Central can no longer leave our bay doors open to provide fresh air for our clients because of inappropriate interaction of Rescue Mission

clients demanding money and/or cigarettes. On numerous occasions, South Central female staff have been escorted to their vehicles by South Central male staff because of severe panhandling activities occurring as the work day ends.

3. **Trespassing of South Central properties by Rescue Mission clients.**
South Central has now had to place a staff member on patrol to keep Rescue Mission clients out of our facilities. On numerous occasions South Central staff has discovered Rescue Mission clients in our kitchen taking food, in our clients' lockers, and in our bathrooms.
4. **Attempted arson.**
Rescue Mission clients have camped/moved into South Central's Recycling building and on two separate occasions South Central had to extinguish fires that were set in this building by the interloper.
5. **Theft of property.**
See number 3. After escorting the Rescue Mission clients from South Central property, South Central belongings and client belongings have been missing.
6. **Inebriation, Drug Use and Offensive Language.**
On numerous occasions Rescue Mission clients have approached South Central clients in an apparently very inebriated or drug-induced state and asked for money or cigarettes. Many times our clients have complied but if a South Central staff is with our clients we explain to the Rescue Mission clients that South Central clients can not give them money or cigarettes. Following these explanations the Rescue Mission clients have proceeded to use offensive language and shout racial and sexual derogatory terms to both South Central staff and clients. These inappropriate comments also are uttered when South Central asks the Rescue Mission clients to not park in South Central's clearly marked "No Parking" zones.
On another occasion South Central Staff had to call the police concerning a Rescue Mission client using a crack-pipe on South Central property and becoming physically aggressive when asked to leave.
7. **Vandalism.**
Following episodes of unpleasant interaction with Rescue Mission clients, South Central has been the victim of vandalism to property and vehicles. South Central staff has personally witnessed Rescue Mission clients attempting to break into our facilities and to defecate in South Central bushes and doorsteps. Police were called and an arrest was made.
8. **Litter.**
Following events at the Rescue Mission, South Central staff has to spend

inordinate amounts of time picking up litter in our parking lots, our flower beds and around our dumpsters. South Central dumpsters are repeatedly overflowed with belongings and waste that is not South Central's.

9. **Inadequate parking spaces.**

South Central Industries is a business that operates Monday through Friday from 7:30am-4:00pm. South Central has clients who arrive or are picked up during this timeframe and require additional specialized assistance. In addition, South Central has business clients that come to our physical address to conduct business and DHS staff are frequently at South Central. When the Rescue Mission is having an event, South Central has to constantly ask the Rescue Mission clients to move their vehicles. Because of threats and verbal abuse made repeatedly by Rescue Mission clients, South Central has had to call towing services to address the unauthorized vehicles.

10. **Safety concerns.**

When the Rescue Mission hosts events their clients illegally park all throughout 9th street, Louisa street and other adjoining streets. The blockage and congestion of vehicles on these main arteries have resulted in dangerous situations when South Central has had to call in emergency response vehicles for assistance with our clients. These emergency response vehicles have been delayed due to the illegal blockage in the street.

South Central Industries, respectfully requests that the City of Shawnee Planning Commission and the City of Shawnee City Commissioners deny Shawnee Rescue Mission's request for re-zoning due to the adverse effects their activities cause. The new proposed re-zoning would proportionately increase the problems that South Central and our neighbors already bear because of the Shawnee Rescue Mission's proximity.

South Central Housing Group Homes are located at 314 W. 9th and 301 W. 9th which is one block from the Shawnee Rescue Mission. South Central Group Homes were established in 2010 as a non-profit residential Group Home setting to provide residential services to individuals with developmental disabilities. Currently we have 10 clients with diagnosis ranging from Down's Syndrome, Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Dementia and mental retardation who are served by South Central Housing seven days a week, 24 hours a day.

Following are a list of concerns that South Central Housing maintains against the Shawnee Rescue Missions' request:

1. **Public sexual activities being performed outside of the Rescue Mission.**
South Central staff on three separate occasions have witnessed Rescue Mission clients on the south, west and east sides of the Mission engaging in inappropriate sexual activities. South Central clients have reported seeing other sexual activities and being solicited to join the activity.
2. **Panhandling of South Central clients and staff by Rescue Mission clients.**
South Central Housing's residents can no longer sit on the benches provided in the front of the homes because of inappropriate interaction of Rescue Mission clients demanding money or cigarettes.
3. **Trespassing of South Central properties by Rescue Mission clients.**
South Central Housing has now had to place a staff member on patrol to keep

Rescue Mission clients out of our facilities. On numerous occasions South Central staff has located Rescue Missions clients in our homes and in our fenced backyards.

4. **Inebriation, Drug Use and Offensive Language.**
On numerous occasions Rescue Mission clients have approached South Central clients in an apparently very inebriated or drug-induced state and asked for money or cigarettes. Many times our clients have complied but if a South Central staff is with our clients we explain to the Rescue Mission clients that South Central clients can not give them money or cigarettes. Following these explanations the Rescue Mission clients have proceeded to use offensive language and shout racial and sexual derogatory terms to both South Central staff and clients. These inappropriate comments also are uttered when South Central staff asks the Rescue Mission clients to not park in South Central's clearly marked "No Parking" zones.

The blockage and congestion of vehicles on these main arteries have resulted in dangerous situations when South Central has had to call in emergency response vehicles for assistance with our clients and these response vehicles have had difficulty getting down the street.

My name is Kevin Hanna and I am a property owner of several rental homes surrounding the Shawnee Rescue Mission. I am writing to formally oppose the re-zoning appeal from the Shawnee Rescue Mission (Case #P13-12).

It has become excessively more difficult to rent our properties around the 9th and Louisa streets because of the type of individuals that are constantly roaming this part of town and the activities that they are engaged in. The tenants that do rent from us near the SRM are constantly complaining of theft, vandalism, being approached for money, drugs, liquor and cigarettes and witnessing inappropriate sex acts in alleyways and sides of homes.

This activity has exponentially increased since the SRM relocated to 9th & Louisa. I am very fearful of what the effects will be if the SRM becomes a full-time shelter that provides housing.

In addition, parking has become a huge issue on days that the Rescue Mission is having a food pantry or other event. The homeless clients park their cars all up and down the street and in the yards of my properties, in the driveways of my properties and block my tenants' vehicles. My tenants repeatedly report that the homeless clients shout obscenities and make lewd remarks and actions toward my tenants when the tenants ask them to remove their vehicles.

My tenants report that they no longer feel safe in their homes or especially outside their homes after dark.

I would ask that the Shawnee Planning Committee and City Commissioners please think long and hard about encouraging and increasing this program. I believe it is admirable that Shawnee is reaching out to serve its homeless citizens who are trying to help

To Whom It May Concern:

I have lived in the Downtown Shawnee area where the Shawnee Rescue Mission is located for more than seven years. I believe the proposed rezoning is a huge injustice to the homeless and to the residents who live in the neighborhood. This is a residential area; with very little for shelter residents to do during the day, let alone the resources needed for job seeking, mental health/substance abuse services or other social services that a resident would require. While there is a social desire to want to provide shelter for those in need, I do not believe that this residential area is the prime location for that shelter. This quiet neighborhood has children playing outside, senior citizens who enjoy working in their gardens, and families who like to ride their bikes or take family walks after dinner.

I have spent the last two years watching new "faces" walking the neighborhood, looking for something to do. After working through my own fear of these unknown people, I began engaging in conversation. I quickly discovered many of the new people were arriving in Shawnee from other cities in Oklahoma. They told me they had been sent to Shawnee, as it was seen as the new "Utopia for the homeless". When asked who was sending them, I was told, from every person I spoke to in the last 2 years, my case worker. I fear for the safety of the people in my neighborhood, and I no longer feel safe spending time on my front porch with my family.

The Salvation Army is an established shelter, providing resources, counseling in Shawnee, and has been successful in their efforts for many years. Why must Shawnee have a proposed duplication of services, especially without the backing of an organization such as the Salvation Army?

I have some grave concerns if this rezoning is approved:


1. Does the City of Shawnee have enough personnel in the Police Department, and Fire Departments to support the influx of chronic homeless people who are being relocated to our community? Will those officers on duty be available to spend much of their time in the downtown area patrolling?
2. If there is currently an 18 – 24 month wait for public housing, according to the Shawnee Housing Authority, will residents be allowed to stay at the shelter until housing is granted? Will this strain an already stressed resource for actual residents of the community?

3. Will residents be asked to vacate the shelter during the day? Where do they go during the day? The Shawnee Public Library? Downtown Shawnee, where as a community, we are trying to build our Downtown area as a destination? That is not good business planning for growing the area.
4. How will the Shawnee Rescue Mission ensure the safety of the neighborhood residents and property from the chronic homeless housed at their facility if rezoning is granted?
5. How will the Shawnee Rescue Mission provide mental health/substance abuse?
According to the Federal Agency, Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration, over 60% of chronic homeless are dealing with some sort of mental health issue, while over 80% are experiencing alcohol or drug addiction.
6. What is the financial sustainable plan of the Shawnee Rescue Mission? By that, I mean, if an organization invites the masses of chronic homeless to Shawnee, and much of the day to day working capital is donations, how do Shawnee residents continue to financially support the cause? Is that fiscally sustainable? I do not believe so.

These are a few of my concerns, I strongly protest having a homeless shelter at my home, and I am very much looking forward to discussing this issue further with those who are in decision making positions.

I own and manage Mrz Lizzies Home Rentals. Recently, I received the notice regarding the Shawnee Rescue Mission rezoning application #p13-12.

Please note that I am writing to oppose the rezoning appeal from Shawnee Rescue Mission request.

I have been a strong supporter financially to the Shawnee Rescue Mission during its inception and recent past. However, I have ceased my support of the Rescue Mission because of issues that continue to go unaddressed. Since the operation relocated to its current location on 9th & Louisa Street crime rates have increased tremendously. I have visited with Glen and Melissa Blankenship about setting rules and guidelines regarding their clients' drug & alcohol abuse, and mental illness concerns but I have not seen any attempts to address these concerns or issues.

My real estate properties located near the Rescue Mission have been vandalized on five different occasions. (Police reports were filed) I had never had any crime violations at these properties purchased in 1993 until the Rescue Mission relocated to its present locale. I have worked hard to provide nice, clean, affordable remodeled homes to this area. Mrz Lizzies has invested \$425,000 to \$450,000 within 300 feet of the Mission and now property values have plummeted. Recently my tenants have moved out due to their fears and not feeling safe and secure in their homes both day and night. Other tenants of mine have notified me that when their lease expires they will no longer be staying in this area.

I have served on the Shawnee Downtown Association, Beautification Committee of downtown and the Chamber of Commerce since 1993. My desire was to assist in providing a cleaner, safer, and more beautiful area for residents and businesses of our downtown community. I believe that great strides were made to strengthen our downtown area before the relocation of the Rescue Mission.

Since the Shawnee Rescue Mission came to our area their clients have continually walked the streets looking inside my tenants' windows and knocking on their doors asking for money, alcohol, cigarettes and sex. Other problems include increased litter, limited parking spaces, broken windows in my tenants' cars and homes, theft and vandalism of property

I do understand a fine group of individuals and church groups are promoting the mission rezoning. I too have searched my spiritual heart and soul regarding this problem of assisting the homeless. However, I truly believe that we should not put our law abiding, hardworking productive citizens and businesses at risk. I simply would ask all supporters, one question: Would you want these hundreds of homeless with drug, alcohol, mental illness issues living within 300 feet of your families, homes, businesses, churches and property? I am sure there is a need but a center such as this should be placed outside the city limits of Shawnee. Our planning commissioners would not be promoting Shawnee as a place to be! We would be promoting all homeless to come to Shawnee and receive free room and board. The Shawnee Downtown area will never be a safe, vital downtown area with good housing and thriving businesses if the rezoning is granted.

As an active member of Salvation Army Auxiliary since 1993, a Project Safe board member and Project Safe Auxiliary President, Red Rock advisory board member and supporter of Angel Acre's Housing complex and Gateway Prevention, I am very aware of the needed emergency and treatment shelters. The above organizations do provide strict care and supervision for the homeless with ample guidelines, rules and staffing in place to accommodate their needs.

Thank you for the opportunity to share my concerns with you.

Please accept this letter as a response to the letters submitted by South Central Industries, Executive Home Rentals, LLC and Don Dudley Development and Investments concerning their protests of the request for the rezoning of the property known as Shawnee Rescue Mission.

Shawnee Rescue Mission is a faith-based non-profit whose mission is to combat poverty and homelessness. The Mission building is located at 204 N Louisa. The surrounding neighborhood includes private homes, single and multi-family rental properties, businesses, and other non-profit agencies.

The primary mission of SRM is to provide food, shelter (where needed) and services and training programs that will enable our clients to ultimately achieve rehabilitation and stability in their lives and assist them in becoming functioning members of society. The heart of our ministry centers on the Biblical teachings of Jesus, which commands that we love our neighbor as ourselves.

In keeping with that mandate from Christ, we desire to serve our clients, and the community at-large, in an atmosphere that fosters a caring and compassionate cooperation among those who come to us seeking assistance and those whose homes or businesses surround our property. It is our sincere desire to work cooperatively to ensure that the services we provide do not adversely infringe upon our business or residential neighbors. We would like for any property owner to feel they can come to us and air any complaints or issues they feel need to be addressed. It is our desire, in so far as we are able, to address any issues brought to our attention in a timely manner, and in a way, which would be agreeable to our neighbors.

While we are concerned about all of the complaints listed in the letters of protest, we are particularly saddened by the incidents reportedly directed toward the especially vulnerable clients of South Central Industries. Until reading the letter of protest, we were unaware that such incidents were occurring because we never saw them happen firsthand and they were never reported to us. Many of the clients of South Central Industries are also clients of Shawnee Rescue Mission and regularly come into the Mission seeking meals, food boxes, clothing, friendship, or even desiring to serve in some capacity as volunteers. These individuals are precious to us and we love them dearly and frequently try to show Christ's love to them by various acts of kindness such as celebrating their birthdays and spending holidays such as Thanksgiving and Christmas with them. We too, desire to protect them from the harshness of the world and from witnessing, or being solicited to engage in, acts of lewd behavior. However, in order to better try to prevent such issues from happening, or escalating, we must be informed immediately if such incidents are occurring. Our heart's desire is to work with South Central Industries, not against them.

Many of the issues of complaint raised in the letters of protest will actually be addressed by the rezoning of the SRM property. Plans are drawn up which will move the entrance and subsequent traffic flow to the west side of the building. The lots immediately to the west and northwest of the Mission building will be utilized for parking. Traffic flow will move through the lot onto Kickapoo Street. Most of our homeless clients arrive on foot, or by bicycle, rather than cars, and will also enter and exit on the west side of the building. Once the renovations are complete, our plan includes providing security personnel who will monitor the building and Mission property 24 hours a day. Plans also include security cameras installed both inside and outside of the building. Smoking will be in a designated outside area on the northwest side of the building. Loitering on Louisa or 9th streets will not be tolerated. The onsite security personnel will monitor these areas for inappropriate activity and the police will be called as needed.

Following the rezoning and renovation of the building, clients who will stay in the proposed overnight shelter will be required to be in the building by 9 PM nightly, with lights out by 10PM. The shelter will be locked down between the hours of 9PM and 6AM. Clients will not be allowed to leave the building during the night except in cases of employment and only with a signed permit. During the day, clients in the day shelter will be expected to engage in productive activities such as educational or job training, attending classes, housekeeping chores, gardening, maintaining the landscaping, cleaning up litter around the premises, helping process donations, and assisting with the processing of emergency food boxes.

In an effort to immediately address issues with traffic and parking during our current twice monthly food pantry distribution, we have changed the hours from 5 – 7 PM to 1 – 7 PM. This change has already helped decrease the number of people arriving at any one time at the Mission. We are also working to streamline our distribution process to speed the process. We have also begun positioning individuals to serve as parking monitors on the south side of 9th Street to prevent clients with cars from parking in the South Central Industries parking lot.

Although we provide assistance and services to numerous people from the homeless population in our community, far more of the clients we serve are actually impoverished residents who either own or rent homes in the neighborhoods immediately surrounding Shawnee Rescue Mission. Unfortunately, among both the homeless and impoverished residential population, there are those who engage in substance abuse and immoral behavior. Rest assured, no one would like to alleviate those kinds of behaviors more than Shawnee Rescue Mission. Such behaviors are completely in opposition to the Biblical principles on which we base our ministry.

Located immediately to the west of the South Central Industries property is a house wherein 6 – 10 people have resided. It has been known for housing individuals who engage in criminal and immoral activity and it has also been known as a “crack house.” It has recently been closed down, boarded up, and is set for demolition. The owner is in jail, awaiting prison sentencing. We are confident that the removal of this structure and its’ occupants will help alleviate some of the criminal and undesirable behavior in the neighborhood immediately surrounding the Rescue Mission. Unfortunately, farther north on Louisa and Kickapoo streets are residents who are reportedly engaged in substance abuse, prostitution, and probable criminal activity. We too, would like to see these individuals brought to justice.

You have been a refuge for the poor, a refuge for the needy in distress, a shelter from the storm, and a shade from the heat.

Some have speculated that SRM is bringing homeless people into Shawnee. Nothing could be further from the truth. Our goal is always to move clients out of their homeless condition and on toward lives that are more stable and productive. We have frequently been able to provide transportation or other assistance to enable homeless clients to go to other towns, other states, or to reunite with family, or move on to jobs, or get into life-changing rehab programs. We also routinely take homeless clients to Church to show them the love of God, the path to redemption, and the way to a changed life.

Please accept this letter as a response to the letters submitted by South Central Industries, Executive Home Rentals, LLC and Don Dudley Development and Investments concerning their protests of the request for the rezoning of the property known as Shawnee Rescue Mission.

Shawnee Rescue Mission is a faith-based non-profit whose mission is to combat poverty and homelessness. The Mission building is located at 204 N Louisa. The surrounding neighborhood includes private homes, single and multi-family rental properties, businesses, and other non-profit agencies.

The primary mission of SRM is to provide food, shelter (where needed) and services and training programs that will enable our clients to ultimately achieve rehabilitation and stability in their lives and assist them in becoming functioning members of society. The heart of our ministry centers on the Biblical teachings of Jesus, which commands that we love our neighbor as ourselves.

In keeping with that mandate from Christ, we desire to serve our clients, and the community at-large, in an atmosphere that fosters a caring and compassionate cooperation among those who come to us seeking assistance and those whose homes or businesses surround our property. It is our sincere desire to work cooperatively to ensure that the services we provide do not adversely infringe upon our business or residential neighbors. We would like for any property owner to feel they can come to us and air any complaints or issues they feel need to be addressed. It is our desire, in so far as we are able, to address any issues brought to our attention in a timely manner, and in a way, which would be agreeable to our neighbors.

While we are concerned about all of the complaints listed in the letters of protest, we are particularly saddened by the incidents reportedly directed toward the especially vulnerable clients of South Central Industries. Until reading the letter of protest, we were unaware that such incidents were occurring because we never saw them happen firsthand and they were never reported to us. Many of the clients of South Central Industries are also clients of Shawnee Rescue Mission and regularly come into the Mission seeking meals, food boxes, clothing, friendship, or even desiring to serve in some capacity as volunteers. These individuals are precious to us and we love them dearly and frequently try to show Christ's love to them by various acts of kindness such as celebrating their birthdays and spending holidays such as Thanksgiving and Christmas with them. We too, desire to protect them from the harshness of the world and from witnessing, or being solicited to engage in, acts of lewd behavior. However, in order to better try to prevent such issues from happening, or escalating, we must be informed immediately if such incidents are occurring. Our heart's desire is to work with South Central Industries, not against them.

Many of the issues of complaint raised in the letters of protest will actually be addressed by the rezoning of the SRM property. Plans are drawn up which will move the entrance and subsequent traffic flow to the west side of the building. The lots immediately to the west and northwest of the Mission building will be utilized for parking. Traffic flow will move through the lot onto Kickapoo Street. Most of our homeless clients arrive on foot, or by bicycle, rather than cars, and will also enter and exit on the west side of the building. Once the renovations are complete, our plan includes providing security personnel who will monitor the building and Mission property 24 hours a day. Plans also include security cameras installed both inside and outside of the building. Smoking will be in a designated outside area on the northwest side of the building. Loitering on Louisa or 9th streets will not be tolerated. The onsite security personnel will monitor these areas for inappropriate activity and the police will be called as needed.

Following the rezoning and renovation of the building, clients who will stay in the proposed overnight shelter will be required to be in the building by 9 PM nightly, with lights out by 10PM. The shelter will be locked down between the hours of 9PM and 6AM. Clients will not be allowed to leave the building during the night except in cases of employment and only with a signed permit. During the day, clients in the day shelter will be expected to engage in productive activities such as educational or job training, attending classes, housekeeping chores, gardening, maintaining the landscaping, cleaning up litter around the premises, helping process donations, and assisting with the processing of emergency food boxes.

In an effort to immediately address issues with traffic and parking during our current twice-monthly food pantry distribution, we have changed the hours from 5 – 7 PM to 1 – 7 PM. This change has already helped decrease the number of people arriving at any one time at the Mission. We are also working to streamline our distribution process to speed the process. We have also begun positioning individuals to serve as parking monitors on the south side of 9th Street to prevent clients with cars from parking in the South Central Industries parking lot.

Although we provide assistance and services to numerous people from the homeless population in our community, far more of the clients we serve are actually impoverished residents who either own or rent homes in the neighborhoods immediately surrounding Shawnee Rescue Mission. Unfortunately, among both the homeless and impoverished residential population, there are those who engage in substance abuse and immoral behavior. Rest assured, no one would like to alleviate those kinds of behaviors more than Shawnee Rescue Mission. Such behaviors are completely in opposition to the Biblical principles on which we base our ministry.

Located immediately to the west of the South Central Industries property is a house wherein 6 – 10 people have resided. It has been known for housing individuals who engage in criminal and immoral activity and it has also been known as a “crack house.” It has recently been closed down, boarded up, and is set for demolition. The owner is in jail, awaiting prison sentencing. We are confident that the removal of this structure and its’ occupants will help alleviate some of the criminal and undesirable behavior in the neighborhood immediately surrounding the Rescue Mission. Unfortunately, farther north on Louisa and Kickapoo streets are residents who are reportedly engaged in substance abuse, prostitution, and probable criminal activity. We too, would like to see these individuals brought to justice.

Some have speculated that SRM is bringing homeless people into Shawnee. Nothing could be further from the truth. Our goal is always to move clients out of their homeless condition and on toward lives that are more stable and productive. We have frequently been able to provide transportation or other assistance to enable homeless clients to go to other towns, other states, or to reunite with family, or move on to jobs, or get into life-changing rehab programs. We also routinely take homeless clients to Church to show them the love of God, the path to redemption, and the way to a changed life.

P.S. I forgot to mention that my shed was broken into a few months ago. The only time in 29 years.

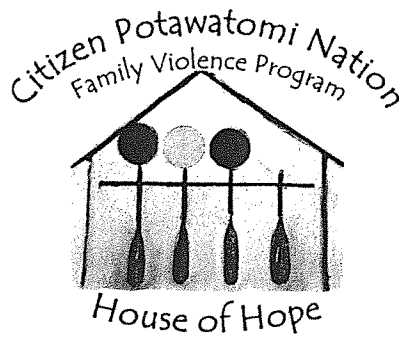

I am taking the time to address the City of Shawnee Planning Committee. My name is JR Kidney, I have been in law enforcement in Pottawatomie County for the last 18 years. I have had to help many people over the years find shelter, whether it is for a victim of domestic abuse or a homeless family. I have used the Ministerial Alliance many times if it was just for a night or so. There are times when we are unable to get people the help they need at the facilities that are currently in place. Many times we cannot use those facilities for reasons due to their rules, no room etc. Please keep in mind I am not speaking badly of those facilities. Here is an example of a situation that the current facilities would not be able to accommodate someone in need of help: A homeless mother, or a mother escaping a situation of domestic abuse with a male child would not want to be separated from her son overnight. Under the current facility's rules and regulations, she would be forced to send her child, regardless of his age into the male living quarters. Another example; under the current facilities, the people in that shelter are required to leave during the day. This causes a lot of people to turn to the public library for daytime shelter from extreme temperatures. The City of Shawnee Library has now hired security because of this. The municipal swimming pool has implemented evening security for the last 2 summers to help with the same issue. With the current shelters in place, you still see many people sleeping on the streets, in the parks and in their cars. There is a need for more places that are willing to help, like the Shawnee Rescue Mission. I have volunteered at the Shawnee Rescue Mission and seen first hand the impact it has on the people and the volunteers. My Church has helped at Shawnee Rescue Mission in many ways from helping to feed the needy, stocking shelves, or at the park providing food and clothing to those in need. When I am at the Mission, many times I bring my own children to help serve. I have never witnessed a problem at Shawnee Rescue Mission. There are people that the Mission helps, that I've dealt with in law enforcement, that have come up to me and said "thank you, it means a lot that you are here, God bless". Shawnee has a need for a day shelter that will give the homeless a place to spend the day so the park, library, and streets will not be the hangouts. Shawnee Rescue Mission also helps those in need get back on their feet, obtain their drivers license, find jobs, pay their utility bills, so many good things. The night shelter at Shawnee Rescue Mission would provide a place for many to rest, feel safe and not have to be separated from their children. They wouldn't have to sleep in their cars, on the streets, and in the parks. I have known Glenn Blankenship for many years. Please consider approving the rezoning request from the Shawnee Rescue Mission. Glenn and Melissa Blankenship are my neighbors and their character is above reproach. They are dedicating their life to providing opportunities and a safe haven for people who have lost all.

The criticisms I read regarding the current configuration of the mission seem a little far fetched to me. The mission seldom has anyone outside when I drive by the facility. The mission is there to give people a hand up not to perpetuate their misery. Yes, some of their clients have very little hope of making positive changes but many have both that hope and have also made positive changes and are now tax paying Shawnee citizens.

Other facilities in Shawnee are often full. I understand that the Salvation Army has a limit to the number of days a homeless person can stay. That limit does not help those people change their situation, it only helps them end up in the emergency room because of exposure. Family Promise usually has a waiting list and the changes the Blankenships are working hard to enact will provide help to families as well as individuals.

The "Not In My Back Yard" protesters need to understand that the Mission wants to lift up the current very depressed neighborhood. They are planning on putting in a garden for their clients to grow some of their own food. The rental units in this area are often run down and the yards are unkempt. Because of the current condition of those rentals, I can't imagine how the neighborhood could be damaged by a clean, functioning, classic art deco brick building that provides supervised shelter for the unfortunate.

RE: Rezoning For Shawnee Rescue Mission

I was surprised to learn of the opposition against the zoning request submitted by the Shawnee Rescue Mission, especially with the fact that the city has such a great need for their services.

Several years ago I worked with the Salvation Army here in town where, as a volunteer I was very involved in the homeless shelter for quite some time. I worked many evenings until 10:00 pm and occasionally spent overnight. My duties were to process intakes, provide meals, offer a bed, get them introduced to social Services in the area and just generally to help them with their immediate and long term needs.

Even at that time, I soon realized the weak point of the program was the fact that every morning each and all clients had to leave the shelter and 'go it alone' all day regardless of the weather or any other conditions they were exposed to.

Homelessness and need are not just 'after dark' problems. The need is there 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The Salvation Army and its' programs are a vital asset to Shawnee, but there simply is too much need for one organization to cover all the problems of the needy and homeless in our area.

Shawnee Rescue Mission has been committed to helping meet the needs of some of our most impoverished and down trodden residents long enough to make it apparent to any that want to see, they *are* making an impact.

At this point I would like to comment of a few of the arguments against the expansion of the mission and its' effect on Shawnee.


1. The reason you may see folks loitering around the library and our city parks is simple. They have nowhere else to go during the day. Remember, most are homeless. If SRM were allowed to have their doors open during the day, much of that problem would be alleviated. Of course, that would benefit the community, businesses *and* those in need.
2. I have spent some time at SRM as a volunteer and frankly have seen little or no negative impact on that neighborhood. This is not a suburban type, single family neighborhood that would suffer in any way because of the location of the shelter.
3. The Salvation Army has nothing but 'on street' parking. SRM has property that can easily be used to alleviate any parking issues around that facility.
4. The SRM day/night shelter would *not* be a 'duplication of services'. It would simply add to the solution of a city with inadequate facilities for single as well as family shelter and programs.

In summary, I would like to add just a few personal comments. All the time I volunteered at the Salvation Army shelter, security was *not* an issue. The clients had to adhere to a strictly enforced curfew and 'lock down' each night.

SRM has already offered day and night security on the premises as well as security cameras. Most homeless people are NOT trouble makers. They are simply tired and hungry. Did you know that on any given day, up to 40% of the male homeless population are Veterans? Don't we owe them *all* the help we can possibly give? Don't we owe this to *all* of our unfortunate brothers and sisters?

Missions like SRM have always been run largely by volunteers. That does not make them inadequate in any way. When volunteers help run such a facility, more money is able to be funneled into the area of need.

Given the functions of SRM, I really do not understand why any community would not welcome the expansion of its' services. I feel the minimal opposition speaks for itself. You must ask yourself this question. "Does the opposition of a few overpower the needs of many?"

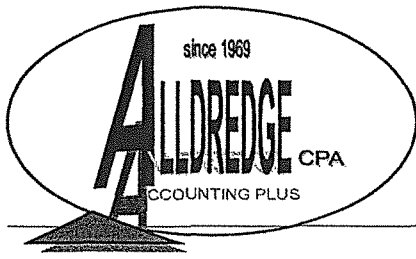



On behalf of South Central Industries, Inc. and South Central Housing, we would like to address some inconsistencies in the Shawnee Rescue Mission letter dated August 29, 2012. In order to make our responses easier to follow, please refer to SRM's letter by paragraph number 1-13.

In Paragraph 5, SRM indicates that the issues addressed in South Central Industries' letter "were never reported to us." South Central takes extreme offense to this statement. In January of 2011, South Central staff Tina Hanna, Executive Director, and Sherill Manderfeld, Assistant Director, met with Glen Blankenship and a gentleman named Angel. South Central was told that Glen was the Executive Director and Angel was the Assistant Director for Shawnee Rescue Mission. Hanna and Manderfeld began to discuss the issues that were present even back in January of 2011 with Blankenship and Angel. These issues are outlined in the South Central Industries' letter dated August 20, 2012. Blankenship assured South Central that these issues would be resolved immediately. Blankenship also provided Manderfeld with his personal cell phone number and instructed her to contact him with any concerns. If Blankenship's cell phone records were examined from January 2011 through present you would find ample phone calls from Manderfeld to Blankenship. A majority of these calls related to the issues/concerns outlined in SCI's August 20th letter. Blankenship always assured Manderfeld that the issue would be taken care of but the issues never ceased.

In Paragraph 5, SRM also states that "Until reading the letter of protest, we were unaware that such incidents were occurring..." Unfortunately, this is also false. On days when SRM held their events, South Central was forced to place big orange cones around its parking spaces and bay doors where SCI clients were transported to and from. Manderfeld approached Blankenship repeatedly asking for assistance to manage his clients' improper parking. No assistance was ever offered by SRM from January 2011 through July 2012. Finally, when the parking situation became a major safety concern and problem for South Central business and DHS clients, South Central had to resort to posting "NO PARKING" signs. When Manderfeld pointed out the signs to Blankenship

he responded that most of his people would not be able to read. Again, no assistance from SRM was offered. In August of 2012, South Central was forced to begin enforcing their "NO PARKING" signs and tow trucks were dispatched. Immediately SRM sent out volunteers in yellow vests to help divert the traffic. Unfortunately, as these volunteers attempted to stop the improper parking they were repeatedly overheard by South Central staff as making derogatory comments about South Central.

Also, Manderfeld relates information about one of the public sexual encounters that Glen Blankenship personally witnessed as he drove by the SRM. When Blankenship returned to SRM Manderfeld approached him about the incident. Blankenship thanked Manderfeld for the information and reported that he would have his people keep an eye out.

Paragraph 6 states "Most of our homeless clients arrive on foot, or by bicycle, rather than cars..." South Central's experience with SRM clients who arrive at the shelter from 7:30am-4pm is that the large majority travel by car. SRM's statement is contradictory to the abundant parking issues that take place every time an event is held at SRM. Another statement in paragraph 6 states, "Loitering on Louisa or 9th streets will not be tolerated." South Central's response to this is why has it not been handled already?

In Paragraph 7, SRM's letter indicates "... clients who will stay in the proposed overnight shelter will be required to be in the building by 9pm nightly..." A major concern of South Central's is what happens to the overflow of individuals who show up to receive shelter and then are turned away because of capacity ordinances. Past experience would show that these individuals remain in the vicinity and cause numerous incidents (again see South Central's letter dated August 20th).

Paragraph 8 addresses the fact that SRM has changed their hours "from 5-7pm to 1-7pm." They state that this was done to address the traffic and parking issues (although their clients arrive on foot). However, the change in hours has created a larger traffic and parking problem because their clients now begin arriving around 11:30am-12:00pm and South Central is forced to work around the problems for a larger majority of our work day.

Paragraph 8 also states "We have begun positioning individuals to serve as parking monitors on the south side of 9th street to prevent clients with cars from parking in the South Central parking lot." Again, this recent change only came about after police were called and towing services were contacted by South Central. All previous attempts by South Central to have SRM address this issue were unheeded.

Paragraph 10 which talks about the house located west of South Central that had "6-10 people residing" and "the owner is in jail.." is false. The owner, Anne Nappa, resides in Austin, Texas. South Central has been in communication with Anne and visited with her about her property. Anne shared that the abuse the SRM clients have directed at her property forced her to have to have it demolished. Anne's sister, who resided at 419 W. 9th was relocated to Griffin Memorial. Following numerous break-ins and other illegal activity, Anne had the home boarded up to stop the trespassing. When the trespassing

continued following Anne's best efforts, the decision was made to demolish the property to stop the illegal activity. This illegal activity was not the result of the homeowner's but began occurring following the relocation of SRM to across the street from this home.

Paragraph 12 states, "Eliminating Shawnee Rescue Mission, or the proposed overnight shelter, will not cause homelessness, or the problems associated with that segment of society, to go away." South Central agrees that eliminating SRM will not cause homelessness to go away but we do strongly believe that it would reduce the criminal activity in this area. Our major concern is the safety and well-being of our clients with developmental disabilities.

Following the front page article in Sunday, September 2nd's Shawnee News-Star, expressing South Central Industries' opposition to the Shawnee Rescue Mission, South Central became the victim of vandalism and an attempted break-in. South Central's "No Parking" signs were completely mangled and our overhead bay door that faces SRM was significantly damaged where an attempt to break-in had occurred. It is a sad commentary when this is the response to differences in opinion and further exemplifies the state of condition in the block of 9th and Louisa. South Central is extremely concerned about on-going retribution as our concerns become more public.

Thank you very much for taking the time to read through our addresses of the errors we believe were scripted in Shawnee Rescue Mission's letter.



Sirs:

I have been a business owner in the Shawnee Downtown Retail District for eighteen years. As such I have interacted with my fellow retailers and business persons in the downtown area and we share many of the same issues. Our businesses service not only our local customer base, but extend to other cities, counties and even other states. We create jobs and tax revenues.

It has recently been brought to my attention that several organizations wish to locate additional homeless shelters in the downtown retail district. If all of these organizations are allowed to do so, it will create a concentration of homeless people into one area and may certainly have a negative impact on the Shawnee retail district.

The City of Shawnee once had a vision of creating a downtown area of diversity, creating a safe, vibrant, prosperous downtown, with a mix of retail, theatre, arts and restaurants in a revitalization program which would attract new businesses and shoppers, all bringing more tax dollars into the city. It is of great concern that turning this same area into "Homeless Central", will reverse any progress which has been made.

I recently read over the City of Shawnee 2010-2014 Consolidated Plan and attended their meeting. The facts and figures that have been published show that the community's homeless needs are being met by current organizations and churches. Additionally, according to the facts and figures, it does not show there to be a need for more homeless shelters, and from appearances those studies would seem to be correct.

Another point I would like to address, the figures that are stated on page 43 of the report state that on October 30, 2009, that there were 3,000 people fed in the park. I have no doubt there were that many people fed that day, but how many were homeless? October 30th was the day that BOO ON BELL a locally and nationally published event took place bringing on average between 5,000 to 7,000 people to town. Many of those people would have gladly taken a free meal in the park.

For the most part, the organizaions in Shawnee are generous and open hearted, however sometimes their approach may actually create new problems. Currently, during operating hours, most of the homeless seem to gather at the public library. Since some of the organizations are feeding the homeless there it has become a greater issue. Many of the citizenry now feel it uncomfortable and unsafe to go to the library.

I believe it is our duty to meet the needs of the homeless in a professional, discreet manner, where they can be treated with dignity and given a hand up, not just a handout.

Our city, organizations and citizens have made great strides in helping people find housing, food and clothing, of which we may be proud. We must though, as good stewards of the community, not negatively impact others in doing so. We must also protect and serve those citizens who work, shop and live in our business district and who have the right to be safe and secure in Shawnee.

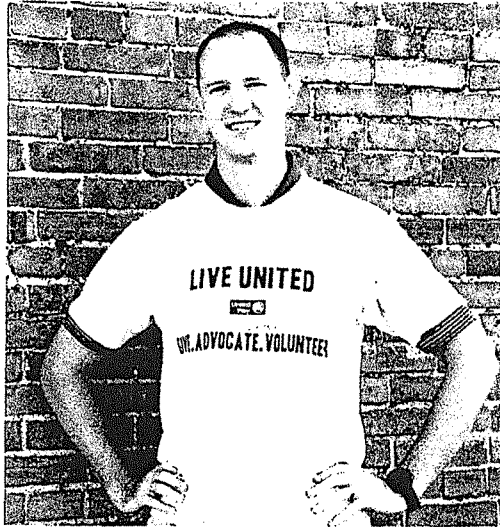
Finally, I feel it important to take time to get a more accurate picture of the actual need for additional services in Shawnee, what they may be and where those services should be located so as not to heavily impact one geographical area of the city. We want to also make sure that these shelters are not designed to "import" homeless from Oklahoma City or other large cities.

In conclusion, I would ask that the building of homeless shelters in Shawnee be placed on hold for a minimum of six months so that more research can be done and also making sure that those wishing to do the projects are indeed qualified to do so.

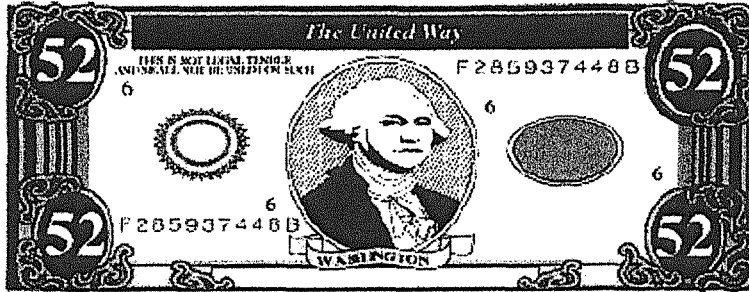



Mr. Justin Erickson, Planning Commission Members, and City Commissioners:

I am writing to voice my support for the rezoning of the property known as Shawnee Rescue Mission to allow for the renovation of the building to include an overnight shelter.

Because I have given hundreds of hours of volunteer service to Shawnee Rescue Mission over the past year and a half, I have seen firsthand pretty much every aspect of the work being done there. I would like to address some of the main issues raised by those in opposition to the rezoning of the Mission.

(1.) Demonstration of Need
(2.) Duplication of Services

Since these two concerns are so related, I will address them together. The question has been raised as to why we need another overnight shelter, when the Salvation Army has empty beds. To me, that is kind of like saying that if one Baptist church in town has empty pews on Sunday, (which would be easy enough to find, by the way) that a new one wanting to locate across town could not build their building because there was still room for more people to fit into the pews in the first church. Obviously, that kind of scenario is not likely to happen because we all understand that there are different styles of worship and different needs being met in various churches, even if they are of the same denomination and are in the same town. Likewise, assuming that there is no need for another shelter because we already have one in town that is not full, is an inaccurate assumption. The services to be offered by the two shelters will be different. It does not mean that one shelter will be better than the other, simply that each will address different needs.

Shawnee Rescue Mission intends to include family units in their shelter, which would allow more families in crisis to stay together during their time of crisis. It is a need I have personally witnessed on more than one occasion. It is heartbreaking to see a family torn apart when their child has to be taken away because there are not enough places in our town for families such as this to be sheltered together. Clients will also be able to stay in the day shelter during the day rather than be sent back out on the street. This is something that is not an option at this time with any agency in town. This will keep the homeless out of extreme weather conditions and offer a place for them to go rather than having to hang out on the street, in the park, or particularly in and around the library. I am aware of at least 2 clients who had severe heat strokes this summer from being outside in the heat too long and both are now suffering from long-term physical complications. Those clients who would be in the day shelter would also be expected to participate in productive activities in the shelter such as housekeeping, processing donated goods, educational classes, training opportunities, and recovery programs which will aid in bringing some structure, stability, and meaning to their lives.

Another service to be included in the planned renovation is the continuation of the food pantry, which currently provides emergency food boxes to between 300 and 500 families every time the pantry is open. Obviously there is a great need for such a service. While other non-profits offer food pantry ministries, there is still a tremendous need. In order to just survive, a family in crisis who waits in line for a couple of hours to get a food box that will likely only last a very few days, depending on the size of the family, will likely need assistance from more than one agency. The agencies in Shawnee must work together to effectively meet the needs of these vulnerable and at-risk people. SRM desires to do that and has recently joined the Charity Tracker program sponsored by United Way to aid in that process.

3. Impact on Neighborhood

Having seen the plans for the renovation of the Rescue Mission, it is clear that the problems with parking and loitering in the neighborhood are being addressed by moving the entrance to the west side of the building and by having traffic flow in and out of the mission through the new west parking lots onto Kickapoo. Likewise, the stated plans to provide a day and night security guard, plus the plans for security cameras would address the concern about activity around the outside of the building. The overnight shelter would go into lockdown mode overnight with no clients entering or exiting the building at that time. The plan to keep day shelter clients involved in productive activity during the day will also have a positive impact on the loitering problem.

While most of the people in the neighborhood are law-abiding citizens, there are people who live on the streets surrounding that area who are reported to engage in less than desirable behaviors—ie substance abuse and prostitution. Those individuals are not just lurking in the neighborhood because of their coming to the Mission, they actually live in the neighborhood. It seems that perhaps those issues of unlawful behavior among certain residents should be investigated by the city in order to provide a safer environment for the rest of the neighborhood around the Mission.

In the year and a half that I have been a volunteer at the Mission, I have never seen or heard of any activity or area of concern that would make me feel that the Mission was neglecting to address inappropriate behaviors such as sexual solicitation or activities on the mission property. My personal experiences in working closely with Glenn and Melissa Blankenship makes me confident that, had they been made aware of any inappropriate behaviors, they would have immediately dealt with the problem.

I personally have never been threatened, nor have I been solicited while I have worked there. I have had personal, one-on-one contact with literally hundreds of clients in the time I have volunteered. What I have witnessed, however, is how much the Mission is having a positive impact on the clients it serves. I have seen clients who were so overcome with emotion that they literally broke down and cried when they have been able to be helped. I cannot count the number of times someone has personally, and very genuinely, told me “thank you for helping me.” People who come to volunteer leave feeling like they have been the ones blessed.

4. Concerns Over The Mission Being Run By Volunteers


There seems to be concern about whether the Mission will be able to sustain a program, on the scale being planned, with a mostly volunteer staff, rather than having mostly paid positions. It has been noted that no other shelter of this size is running solely by volunteers. Because I have spent so much time volunteering at the mission, I have seen firsthand that people can and do actually make commitments to work and provide services for a ministry such as this without being monetarily compensated. Just because someone is not being paid, does not mean they are not reliable or capable of

performing the job. I'm sure one of the major concerns is whether there will be difficulty in finding enough capable volunteers to perform the work. It has been amazing to see how many people, of various walks of life, come to the Mission to volunteer. In my hundreds of hours of volunteer work at SRM, I have worked in the food pantry, in the former day shelter, in the clothing ministry, in the prayer ministry, and in the client intake area of the mission where I have been able to see firsthand how volunteers have already run the day-to-day operations of SRM. Even the directors of the Mission, Glenn and Melissa Blankenship, and Sarah Inselman, the very committed and capable director of the food pantry, have always worked without a salary. I think the difference in our perspective is that we all see this as a ministry and feel called by God to perform the jobs as a service. It is not about us making a living. It is about us serving others.

I would urge the Planning Commission and City Commissioners to trust that the very professional, and capable Board of Directors of Shawnee Rescue Mission, are capable of directing the work of the Mission. It will take months for the construction to be completed, once the rezoning takes place, and I have every confidence that this board will use that time to make sound decisions about needed staff members, the budget, the programs, and services. These board members are all very successful and highly respected people who live and work in Shawnee and none of them want to jeopardize their own careers or businesses by making hasty or irresponsible decisions. Likewise, they all are committed Christians who are likewise committed to the ministry of Shawnee Rescue Mission. Every one of them volunteers at the Mission, makes a financial commitment to the work, and is responsible to raise funds for the ongoing operation. That is part of what they readily agreed to do when they came on the Board of Directors. To Whom It May Concern:

Thank you for the opportunity to share my heart with you today. My name is Sarah Inselman. I'm 50 years old and Shawnee has always been my home. I am very involved with the ministry at Shawnee Rescue Mission.

I'm glad to see that we are finally working toward a solution for the homeless and impoverished in our community, so the homeless may have a place to call home for this season they are going through in their life, and the impoverished can have a little relief in their budget.

Many of the problems that we are concerned with today are brought about because the people we are trying to help are living their lives outside. With the exception of illegal activities, which should not be accepted or tolerated, these people are no different than you and me. They are, however, exposed to the elements 24/7. They're hot in summer and cold in winter. They're hungry, they want to take a shower, they want to be able to lay in bed at night, and to have a door to shut, and to know they won't be attacked before morning. They just want a safe place. They have the same desires as you and me.

The homeless want a place to call home during the day, a place to have a cup of coffee, and not have to spend their day on a park bench where they know they are not wanted, wondering where can I go when I need to go to the bathroom or where can I go to just get a drink of water today. They have no chance to brush their teeth, no breakfast, no lunch, just another hot or cold day at the park, waiting for 5 o'clock to come so they can get at least one meal at the "Sally" which is only available Monday – Friday. And that's not to mention what the weekends hold, where their only hope is that some church might have a meal at the park for the homeless on Saturday or Sunday.

I don't think we can even imagine the stressful, hopeless, and dangerous life they live. Their hope for a job is so removed. They have no address, no transportation, and no clean clothes to even begin to look for a job that they know will be needed to bring about a change in their lives.

These are all basic things that Shawnee Rescue Mission will be able to bring into their lives. We already have Pastor Jerry Barham available one day a week helping people with job applications and resumes, job placement, and training and transportation for interviews. This is something we want to be available on a daily basis.

Do we need a facility of this size?

This will be a facility that will be here for many years to come. It's our hope that it is never full to its' capacity. There are certain times of the year (holidays, extreme heat and extreme cold) when the need is greater than others. One sad example of the need is when we got the news this summer that Allen, a homeless man living under the river bridge, was murdered. He had visited SRM only the day before. The only thing we had to offer him was our backpack of food for the homeless. Then, there is the fact that at least 3 homeless that we know of have suffered heat strokes this summer, with one man, about 53 years old, who was left in such a condition that he will likely spend the rest of his life in a nursing home.

There are the stories, from different ones living in tents on "The Hill," of how their tents get sliced up and all their belongings are stolen while they are gone to eat or trying to work. Then, there are the times I've heard of how the police came through the park at 2 & 3 o'clock in the morning, and ran people out of the park. It goes to show the tremendous need for an overnight shelter, with a day center facility, and soup kitchen, and the many other services that SRM can bring to our community.

Do we have finances for such a facility?

God has generously provided finances to buy this awesome building, and the thousands upon thousands of dollars by way of private donations for daily operations. Millions of dollars worth of items have been given to SRM to give freely to the people in the community. And now, knowing that He has provided \$450,000.00 in this grant for the remodel of the shelter should show us all that God's provision is more than enough.

I am excited to think that we (the people of Shawnee) are getting closer to having a place where we can come together as the Body of Christ and minister to the needs of people.

As I know God has given you the authority to grant, or not grant, Shawnee Rescue Mission the rezoning, it's my prayer that you prayerfully consider your decision.

And again, thank you for your time in reading my letter.





Dear City of Shawnee Planning Commission Members,

I hope that you will approve the Shawnee Rescue Mission's rezoning request. The Shawnee Rescue Mission has been a partner with us in serving some of the same people in need in our community since they began their mission a few years ago.

The Pioneer Library System is planning to change the *Rules of Conduct* for customers in the library to no longer tolerate sleeping in the library. This will impact a great number of people in our community without homes who have been utilizing the library as a de facto day shelter.

Some people have told me that the reason they fall asleep in the library is that they do not sleep well out on the streets. When their time limit is up at the Salvation Army overnight shelter, they have no place to go to sleep at night. They end up falling asleep during the day in the library to make up for the restless nights with no shelter.

We are not able to continue to accommodate people sleeping at Shawnee Public Library. We are making this change to address ongoing complaints from library customers who are disturbed by people sleeping in the library. Our intent with this change is to make the library a welcoming place for all people who wish to actively use our many resources. We are planning to hire additional security and to begin training staff to make this transition. We met with Chief Frantz, Justin Erickson, and James Bryce on August 29, 2012 to ask for the City's support for our new policy, and they were very helpful.

When we begin implementing this policy change, people who are not able to stay awake after a warning will be asked to leave the library for varying periods of time, depending on how often we must warn them. With no day shelter currently available in Shawnee, these people will have no place to go. We need Shawnee Rescue Mission to provide a daytime refuge for people with no other options.

Would we have a duplication of services in Shawnee if we allowed another shelter to open? I believe not, as there are already so many who fall through the cracks who are not eligible to receive services from existing agencies. Salvation Army does a wonderful job, but they are limited by their rules and guidelines as to who they are able to shelter. Family Promise, also an excellent organization, also has restrictions that limit who they are able to shelter.


One example of someone who fell through the cracks, recently, is a young mother who has a seven-month old baby. She is not allowed back into Family Promise, having already been there during a previous pregnancy which ended in involuntary miscarriage. This mother comes into the library most days, and she is currently staying overnight at the Salvation Army shelter. Salvation Army requires her to leave during the day to look for work, and she does use library computers to look for jobs. However, her seven-month old child is now developmentally delayed because he hasn't been getting down onto the floor to do "tummy time" and play during the day since the family doesn't have a home base. Once librarians realized her situation, we have offered to put a blanket on the floor so she can do interactive play with her baby. I also contacted DHS to make sure she gets a caseworker assigned to help her find services for her baby.

A good night & day shelter would have been better equipped to work closely with such a young mother and could have prevented her baby's developmental delay. We only perpetuate the problem of generational poverty by not acting quickly to give babies and young children the best possible beginnings.

A quick trip through the Shawnee Public Library almost any day will help you understand the magnitude of the problem with homelessness facing our community. There are many people without homes who are not able to qualify for shelter from Salvation Army or Family Promise. These people are currently falling asleep in the public library because they don't sleep well out on the streets. And now the library will be moving them along if they fall asleep in our facility.

Affording these people the basic human dignity of a shelter at night and a refuge during the day is something that should be a priority for our city. I am grateful that Shawnee Rescue Mission is willing and able to offer that service, and I urge you to accept their offer to provide day and night shelter for those in our community who are in need.

Thank you for the opportunity to respond to specific concerns regarding zoning case #P13-12; 204 N. Louisa Street- Shawnee Rescue Mission.

We have contacted Tom Jones regarding the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) as requested by the City Planning Commission. We expect to have this document in place shortly. Our attempt is to solidify, in writing, our relationship with City Rescue Mission. The relationship between Shawnee Rescue Mission (SRM) and City Rescue Mission is a vital part of our organization. A copy of this MOU will be provided on or before the City Planning Commission meeting October 10, 2012.

The second point of the request is in relation to the number of beds being proposed in the zoning request. To clarify, we are requesting the zoning to allow for 31 beds. The SRM board agrees with the planning commission staff that this building project requires a phased approach. Please reference the Project Phasing documents detailing the construction phasing and the amended site plan (exhibit A).

The third point of the request deals with neighborhood security. SRM plans to implement a neighborhood watch program which will be put in place when residents are present at the Shawnee Rescue Mission. The board of SRM has approved, and is in the process of installing security cameras on the outside of the facility to monitor activities. SRM will implement a "no tolerance" policy regarding loitering on the property. The SRM board has also approved hiring paid security staff to provide security for the food pantry which operates from 1-7 p.m. twice monthly. Two uniformed security personnel are currently in place when the Shawnee Rescue Mission is in operation. In an effort to address the concerns over parking and traffic flow, we have now raised funds to complete the parking lot renovation. This will include resurfacing the existing parking lot to the west of our building with the creation of a drive that will allow our guests to exit onto Kickapoo. This project will start as soon as the appropriate construction requirements have been met.

In response to the City Planning Commission request regarding criminal activity in the area, please reference police reports (exhibit B) that detail the number of calls made to the Shawnee Rescue Mission. These reports show there have been no calls to SRM in the last 6 months and 5 in the last 2 years. We have also presented documents from the police department listing the number of calls made to nearby properties (exhibit C).

Please reference letters from Westchester Realty & Management & Angel's Acres (nearby property) that speak to the crime rate as it relates to Shawnee Rescue Mission (exhibit D).

SRM held a public meeting with residents of the surrounding neighborhood to discuss the zoning request and the development of a neighborhood watch. The date of the "open house" was September 30th from 2:00-4:00 p.m. at the Shawnee Rescue Mission. The purpose of the meeting was to address questions that have arisen from the public meeting of the City of Shawnee Planning Commission on August 23rd. Fliers were distributed to residents within a 2 block radius of SRM for notification of the meeting (exhibit E).

With regards to the property values in areas surrounding SRM, it is the opinion of the SRM board that if SRM is run properly, the property values should not be affected. The SRM building located at 204 N. Louisa is currently zoned commercial C3. The building is appraised at \$480,000 and is the highest valued property in the neighborhood. The planned remodel of the building will improve the appearance and increase the value of the building.

Staffing levels for SRM will proceed as follows: Glenn and Melissa Blankenship will continue to serve as volunteer managers of SRM. Currently volunteers serve in areas such as secretarial work, distribution of food, employment assistance, maintenance, shipping and receiving, janitorial services, counseling, job placement services, etc. SRM does not currently have paid employees but has operated for over 10 years in this manner. Currently over 100 volunteers are active monthly to provide the services that are currently offered. The SRM board is aware that this method of operation will not be sufficient as the scope of services expands. These paid staff positions include, but are not limited to, kitchen and dietary staff, social work, security, drug and alcohol counseling, employment counseling, fundraising personnel, etc. The SRM board is active in developing long range goals that incorporate these items. Many staff positions will be part-time, internship positions, and short-term employees. As we expand our programs, our plan is to collaborate with other agencies who will help provide professional services in exchange, on a limited basis, for office space.

The SRM board of directors will use the **Community Standards for Emergency Homeless Shelters** document (exhibit F) as a guide to assure SRM adheres to generally accepted standards for the appropriate care of the homeless. Screening clients against the Sex Offender Registry and background check for a violent criminal record will be mandatory. Clients with a history in either of these areas will be denied use of the overnight shelter. Clients will not be allowed to use drugs or alcohol, use profanity, possess weapons of any kind, nor be allowed to utilize the overnight shelter while under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol.


Duplication of services is a concern for Shawnee Rescue Mission. The SRM board of directors believes the services will amplify and support services already being offered by other charities. The day shelter, as planned by SRM, is a service that is not currently

being offered in the Shawnee community. Other agencies do not provide services to clientele during the day. We believe providing the homeless a place to go during the day will be beneficial to area businesses and public buildings. The day shelter will allow residents and others to utilize other services at SRM (currently drug and alcohol counseling and job placement services). Additionally, the family housing units will provide a service that is lacking at this time by keeping the family together. We feel it is important to keep the family unit intact as much as possible. SRM is in the process of obtaining letters of support from partnering agencies.

Two SRM board members (Don Orr and Carey Humphrey) are currently developing policies and procedures with regards to finances and accounting. This committee of the board will report to the SRM board on their progress at the scheduled October board meeting. SRM owns the property at 204 N Louisa (valued at \$480,000) and the building located at 506 S. Beard St. (valued at \$170,000). These buildings were recently appraised. (Documents available upon request).

Please find attached a copy of the most recent audit (exhibit G).

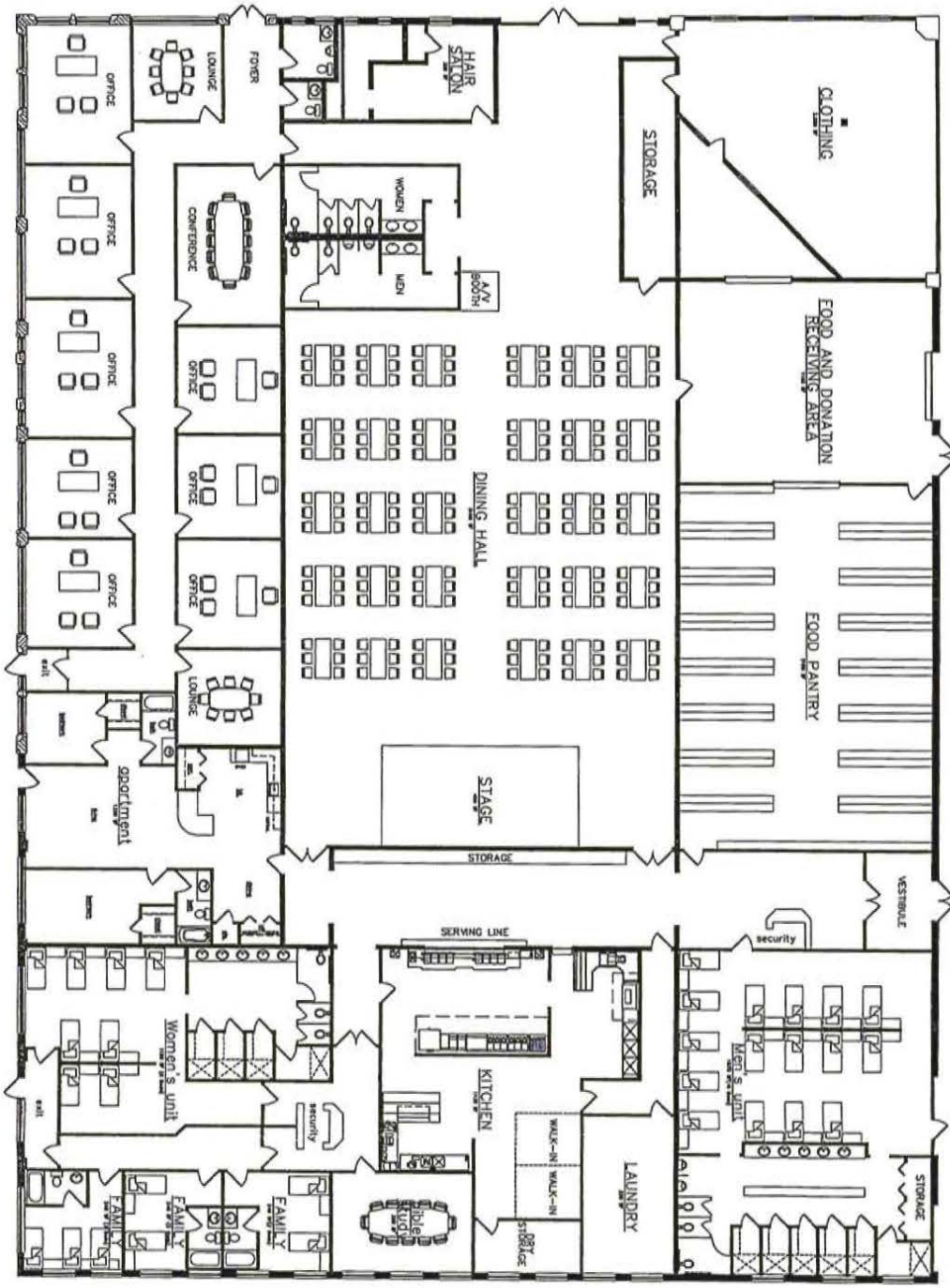

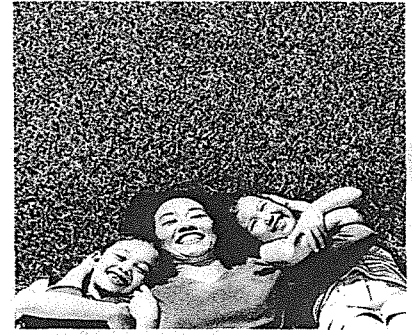
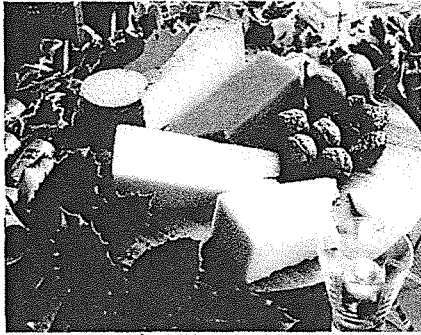

Community Standards for Emergency Homeless Shelters

In 2004, Oklahoma City experienced the opening of three homeless shelters that were not fit for human habitation, were a clear and present danger to their residents, created a nuisance for nearby property owners, and were an affront to the reputation for prudence and care of the legitimate homeless shelters in Oklahoma City. After working together to respond to the immediate crises represented by these "homeless warehouses," the executives of the legitimate homeless shelters in Oklahoma City determined to develop community standards for the operation of a homeless shelter. These standards were developed to give the public confidence in the care provided to the homeless by these organizations and better insight into what constitutes appropriate care for the homeless.

It should be noted that many of the organizations that contributed to developing this document have internal policies and procedures that are far more rigorous than the standards listed herein. Alternatively, some of the organizations that contributed will need to enhance their internal policies and procedures to meet these standards. The Homeless Alliance has committed its resources to building the capacity of all of Oklahoma City's legitimate shelters to meet these community standards.

The standards contained herein address important issues that clearly relate to quality shelter services and facilities for the homeless. They provide flexibility for homeless shelters in meeting expectations, significant latitude to identify and organize their own priorities, and guidelines for providing services that are adaptable enough to meet their unique needs and those of the people they serve. The standards are centered around the people that are served by homeless shelters. They are organized around functions that are common to homeless shelters.

The intent of these standards is to build the capacity of all homeless shelters to best meet the needs of their residents. They carry no statutory authority, no funding component, and no regulatory power. Rather, these standards make clear what the shelter executives believe to be minimum principles for the care of the homeless in our community and should be used to educate the community on the needs of this population.

The governing authority for these standards is the shelter executives themselves, facilitated by the Homeless Alliance. The standards contained herein were arrived at by consensus and any changes, additions, deletions and/or amendments will be derived by the same body, using the same consensus building methodology.

Governance

Oklahoma City homeless shelters recognize that active, effective volunteer governing bodies are indispensable to the success of the shelter as a business entity. Further, good governance ensures that residents of the shelter receive the care they need and deserve. Finally, an effective governing body comprised of community volunteers who serve without compensation also ensures that employees of the shelter are treated fairly and given the tools they need to perform their functions.

- Homeless shelters have a clearly defined governance structure commensurate with their mission.
- The shelter's governance structure recognizes the requirements of the Internal Revenue Service and the Oklahoma Secretary of State for the operation of a nonprofit (where applicable).
- The shelter's governance structure and the names of those individuals responsible are freely available to the public.
- The shelter's governing body is described in a written document that contains:
 - organization's role and purpose
 - governing body's duties and responsibilities
 - process and criteria for selecting members of the governing body
 - governing body's organizational structure
 - relationship of responsibilities among those responsible for governing and any authority superior to the governing body (if such exists), the chief executive officer, and other appropriate leaders
 - definition of "conflicts of interest" and a means for resolving conflicts of interest
- Each shelter will have a written mission statement that clearly defines their role in the continuum of care serving the homeless.

Staff/Personnel

Oklahoma City homeless shelters often use a combination of paid professional staff and residents to perform the day-to-day work of caring for the homeless. Facilitating residents to do these jobs can often help teach the resident job skills as well as instill self esteem and a sense of accomplishment. The following standards can be adjusted to apply to the special position of the resident as employee of the shelter.

- Each shelter has written standards for staff that may include:
 - Required background checks for all paid staff
 - Required drug screening for all staff
 - Required pre-employment physical for staff
- Shelters may also have written standards for staff relating to age, education, training (CPR, First Aid), donor status, and proficiency in violence de-escalation techniques.
- Shelters will have a written substance abuse policy for both staff and residents.
- Shelters will maintain a staff-to-resident ratio that ensures the safety and security of both personnel and clients. Further, shelters will maintain adequate staffing levels to ensure program goals can be met.
- Where appropriate, shelters will maintain written job descriptions for all staff positions that clearly define roles and responsibilities of positions.
- Shelters will have written personnel policies, set by their governing structure, covering hiring and termination of employees. These policies will comply with all applicable federal and state regulations.
- Where appropriate, shelters will maintain personnel training manuals to facilitate the education and development of staff.

Finance

Oklahoma City Homeless Shelters are supported by the generosity of the community. Therefore, it is incumbent on the shelters to clearly demonstrate their stewardship of the funds donated by individuals and organizations to sustain their efforts. Most often, financial transparency is achieved through the periodic completion of independent CPA audits of an organization's financial transactions. Audits are expensive and time-consuming and some shelters have chosen to undergo the less rigorous process of a review in lieu of a full scope audit. The Accounting Review process provides oversight of financial transactions but does not enable the reviewer to express an opinion on whether financial statements are fairly presented and conform to generally accepted accounting principles. Effective, transparent financial accounting is critical to the community's understanding of the place of the shelter in our community.

- Each shelter accounts for its funds in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) published by the Financial Accounting Standards Board.
- Each shelter is audited periodically by an independent body. The shelter's governing Board determines the frequency of audits and the organization's response to any finding therein. Copies of the organization's most recent audit are freely available to the public.
- Each shelter annually provides the Internal Revenue Service an accounting of its revenue and expenses in the form of a tax return. Copies of completed tax returns are available to the public for inspection.
- Accounting standards, auditing requirements, and tax returns may be provided for the shelter by its governing authority.

Health

Protecting the health of residents and staff of the shelters is of paramount importance to the community. Because the health status of the homeless population is often compromised by poor diet, substance abuse, mental illness and other issues, establishing mechanisms to maintain residents' health will aid them in their journey toward secure housing. Further, staff at homeless shelters are often exposed to health risks brought in by residents and establishing policies and procedures to promote health serves to protect staff from unnecessary exposure. Effective policies governing health at the shelters are vital.

- Each shelter has written standards for the administration of medication. Where medications are dispensed by staff, the written standards comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws. Shelters that facilitate residents' self-administration of medication have written standards governing the shelter's role and the liability of shelter staff.
- Each shelter complies with the Oklahoma City-County Health Department's Tuberculosis Management and Prevention Protocols for Homeless Shelters. Those protocols provide for exceptions for shelters that don't, or don't normally, provide congregate sleeping arrangements, as well as exceptions for inclement weather. In addition, the protocols allow flexibility at the shelters to address issues of timing, availability, and transportation of residents.
- Shelters that provide health services to clients comply with all applicable provisions of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA).
- Each shelter maintains an adequately stocked First Aid kit to respond to minor emergencies and provides staff reasonable training in its use.
- Shelters that provide food services comply with all applicable regulations for the preparation, storage and service of food. Shelter food preparation services are inspected regularly by the Oklahoma City-County Health Department and any and all findings are addressed expeditiously.

Safety

The community expects that all businesses will operate in way that preserves the safety, and security of its employees, customers and neighbors. Those expectations are often expressed as municipal codes and ordinances that set minimum standards for operation in our community. Emergency homeless shelters, like any other business, are held accountable for meeting these community expectations. Recognizing that housing large numbers of vulnerable people carries added responsibility for ensuring safety, emergency shelters in Oklahoma City will adopt the following minimum standards.

- Each shelter complies with all applicable municipal codes and ordinances for fire, safety and physical facility.
- Each shelter will develop and maintain a written disaster response and recovery plan. These plans include provisions for tiered responses concomitant to the level of disaster. All plans include provisions for evacuation, business resumption and periodic testing.
- Each shelter will investigate the feasibility of including fire suppression systems with any new construction or renovation. Where financially and operationally feasible, shelters will retrofit current structures with fire suppression systems.
- Each shelter will maintain a written policy governing the storage and use of toxic substances.
- Shelters' housekeeping and maintenance functions may be performed by paid staff, residents, contract service companies or some combination.
- Effective pest control will be maintained at each shelter.
- Each shelter will enforce a substance abuse policy covering residents, the facility and employees.

Resident Rights and Responsibilities

Emergency homeless shelters exist to serve their residents. For many shelters, building, or re-building, a resident's sense of self-esteem, dignity and self-worth is a step along the path to rebuilding their lives. Shelters may try to help residents achieve a greater sense of self-esteem by linking expanded privileges to expanded responsibilities. All shelters, however, recognize that every resident has intrinsic value and will be accorded basic human rights.

- *Confidentiality* – Shelter residents, like any private citizen, have a reasonable expectation of privacy and confidentiality. Shelter staff will not disclose the identity of residents without careful consideration and only in cases where the health and/or safety of the resident, other residents, or the community provide a compelling basis for the disclosure. Shelters will establish mechanisms to enable homeless residents to be contacted by interested family, friends or associates on a voluntary basis that preserves residents' privacy. Shelters cannot be held responsible for any breaches of residents' confidentiality that occur as the result of another resident's communications. At shelters where residents perform staff-like functions, professional shelter staff will work with resident-staff to ensure all residents' privacy is respected. At shelters where case management of residents takes place, it is often necessary to share residents' information with case managers at other service providers. Shelters will have appropriate safeguards in place to ensure data shared between service providers is done with the informed consent of the resident.
- *Smoking* – Where operationally feasible and practical, shelters will provide protected smoking areas for residents. Recognizing their obligation to be good neighbors in their respective communities, shelters will endeavor to provide smoking areas away from public view and off neighborhood common areas like sidewalks.
- *Secure storage* – Where operationally and financially feasible, shelters will provide secure storage facilities for their residents' belongings. In those cases where the shelter provides secure storage, access to the storage facilities will be strictly limited and each shelter will have some method for maintaining accountability of items stored.
- *Telephone* – Access to telephone communications can be critical to receiving services and maintaining the social network so important to recovery. Shelters will provide telephone access to residents as much as feasible. Telephone access can also be abused and shelters reserve the right to deny telephone access to residents when appropriate.

- *Service participation requirements* - Shelters may make provision of certain services contingent upon expressed standards for residents' behavior. Where shelters have service participation requirements, they will be clearly communicated to residents, in language they can understand and acknowledge.
- *Bars and bans* – Sometimes, in order to protect the health and safety of residents and staff, it may become necessary for a shelter to bar or ban an individual from accessing the shelter. Where shelters employ bars or bans, they will do so under the aegis of a clear, written policy that is available to residents upon request. Written policies governing the use of bars and bans will include some mechanism for appeal, as well as some mechanism to redress or make amends for the infraction or behavior that caused the ban. The policy may include descriptions of some behaviors for which there is no remedy.

Other Standards

- *Emergency overflow provisions* – It is occasionally necessary for a shelter to house more residents than preferable, for instance during seriously inclement weather. The Homeless Alliance recognizes that there needs to be a community response to the need for emergency overflow capacity in Oklahoma City homeless shelters. The Homeless Alliance will work in concert with shelter executives, city government and community leaders to devise an acceptable mechanism to provide emergency overflow capacity for the homeless in times of exceptional need.
- *Case management standards* – The Coalition for the Needy, an ad hoc group of Oklahoma City service providers to the homeless and very low income, have developed community standards for the provision of case management services. The standards were derived from the Code of Ethics of the National Association of Social Workers. Recognizing that quality case management can often provide the supports necessary to lift an individual or family out of homelessness, those emergency homeless shelters that provide case management services to residents will adopt the case management standards of the Coalition (Appendix A). Section 5.01 of the Case Management Code of Ethics forbids discrimination by case managers. Many homeless shelters in Oklahoma City limit the populations they serve to specific groups (e.g. youth only, women and children only, mentally ill only, Christian only, etc.). The shelter executives assert that case managers should not discriminate *within the population served by the shelter*, and will continue to limit the populations served by each shelter commensurate with the mission established for the shelter by its governing authority.
- *H.net/HMIS* – H.net/HMIS is a networked computer database system that enables the providers of services to homeless and very low income individuals to share data on shared clients. The system is administered by the Homeless Alliance with grants and oversight from the City of Oklahoma City and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The Homeless Alliance will work closely with all emergency homeless shelters to customize H.net to suit their unique operational requirements, overcome any financial burdens implementation may place on a shelter, and provide training, implementation and ongoing technical assistance. *Only shelters accepting HUD funding are required to use H.net/HMIS.*
- *Good Neighbor Agreements* – Positive relationships with nearby property owners and the broader community are critical to successful shelter operations. The Homeless Alliance will assist any shelter that wishes to develop and negotiate “Good Neighbor Agreements” with local stakeholders. Good Neighbor Agreements clearly state what adjacent and nearby property owners can expect from an emergency homeless shelter and provide property owners with a mechanism to air their complaints and have them addressed timely in a cooperative atmosphere.

Enforcement and Capacity Building

Each shelter will be reviewed for compliance with these standards every two years. The review team will consist of three shelter directors supported by Homeless Alliance staff. The review team will complete a Shelter Standards Review form (Appendix B). The form may be completed by the agency being reviewed, by telephone interview, or by onsite interview, at the discretion of the review team and the leadership of the agency being reviewed.

Upon completion of the Shelter Standards Review form, the review team will compile a report for the Shelter Executives the report will detail all the items with which the reviewed agency is compliant. The report will also detail the items with which the reviewed agency is not compliant and include a Capacity Building Plan for the reviewed agency to achieve compliance. The Capacity Building Plan will be developed in consultation with the reviewed agency's volunteer and professional leadership.

The final report of the review team will be approved by the full Shelter Executives Group and the agency's volunteer and professional leadership prior to any release of information.

Case Management Code of Ethics

Case Management Definition

Case management is a practice in which the service recipient is a partner to the greatest extent possible in accessing needs, obtaining services, treatments and supports, and in preventing and managing crisis. The individual/family and the practitioner plan, coordinate, monitor, adjust, and advocate for services and supports directed toward the achievement of the individualized, personal goals for community living (National Association of Case Management).

Ethical Standards

The following ethical standards are relevant to the professional activities of all case managers. These standards concern (1) case managers' ethical responsibilities to clients, (2) case managers' ethical responsibilities to colleagues, (3) case managers' ethical responsibilities in practice settings, (4) case managers' ethical responsibilities as professionals, (5) case managers' ethical responsibilities to the case management profession, and (6) case managers' ethical responsibilities to the broader society.

(The following ethical standards have been taken from the Code of Ethics of the National Association of Social Workers).

1. Case Managers' Ethical Responsibilities to the Case Work Profession

1.01 Integrity of the Profession

- (a) Case managers should work toward the maintenance and promotion of high standards of practice.
- (b) Case managers should uphold and advance the values, ethics, knowledge, and mission of the profession. Case workers should protect, enhance, and improve the integrity of the profession through appropriate study and research, active discussion, and responsible criticism of the profession.
- (c) Case managers should contribute time and professional expertise to activities that promote respect for the value, integrity, and competence of the casework profession.

2. Case Managers' Ethical Responsibilities to Clients

2.01 Commitment to Clients

Case managers' primary responsibility is to promote the well-being of clients.

2.02 Self-Determination

Case managers respect and promote the right of clients to assist clients in their efforts to identify and clarify their goals. Case managers may limit clients' right to self-determination when, in the case managers' professional judgment, clients' actions or potential actions pose a serious, foreseeable, and imminent risk to themselves or others.

2.03 Informed Consent

- (a) Case managers should provide services to clients only in the context of a professional relationship based, when appropriate, on valid informed consent.

(b) Case managers should take steps to ensure clients' comprehension when clients are not literate or have difficulty understanding the primary language used in the practice setting.

2.04 Competence

Case managers should provide services and represent themselves as competent only within the boundaries of their education, training, license, certification, consultation received, supervised experience, or other relevant experience.

2.05 Cultural Competence and Social Diversity

(a) Case managers should understand culture and its function in human behavior and society, recognizing the strengths that exist in all cultures.

(b) Case managers should have a knowledge base of their clients' cultures and be able to demonstrate competence in the provision of services that are sensitive to clients' cultures and to differences among people and cultural groups.

(c) Case managers should obtain education about and seek to understand the nature of social diversity and oppression with respect to race, ethnicity, national origin, color, sex, sexual orientation, age, marital status, political belief, religion, and mental or physical disability.

2.06 Conflicts of Interest

(a) Case managers should be alert to and avoid conflicts of interest that interfere with the exercise of professional discretion and impartial judgment. Case managers should inform clients when a real or potential conflict of interest arises and take reasonable steps to resolve the issue in a manner that makes the clients' interests primary and protects clients' interests to the greatest extent possible. In some cases, protecting clients' interests may require termination of the professional relationship with proper referral of the client.

(b) Case managers should not take unfair advantage of any professional relationship or exploit others to further their personal, religious, political, or business interests.

(c) Case managers should not engage in dual or multiple relationships with clients or former clients in which there is a risk of exploitation or potential harm to the client. In instances when dual or multiple relationships are unavoidable, case managers should take steps to protect clients and are responsible for setting clear, appropriate, and culturally sensitive boundaries. (Dual or multiple relationships occur when case managers relate to clients in more than one relationship, whether professional, social, or business. Dual or multiple relationships occur simultaneously or consecutively.)

(d) When case managers provide services to two or more people who have a relationship with each other (for example, couples, family members), case managers should clarify with all parties which individuals will be considered clients and the nature of case managers' professional obligations to the various individuals who are receiving services. Case managers who anticipate a conflict of interest among the individuals receiving services or who anticipate having to perform in potentially conflicting roles should clarify their role with the parties involved and take appropriate action to minimize any conflict of interest.

2.07 Privacy and Confidentiality

(a) Case managers should respect clients' right to privacy. Case managers should not solicit private information from clients unless it is essential to providing services or conducting case management evaluation. Once private information is shared, standards of confidentiality apply.

(b) Case managers may disclose confidential information when appropriate with valid consent from a client or person legally authorized to consent on behalf of a client.

(c) Case managers should protect the confidentiality of all information obtained in the course of professional service, except for compelling professional reasons. The general expectation that case managers will keep information confidential does not apply when disclosure is necessary to prevent serious, foreseeable, and imminent harm to a client or other identifiable person. In all instances, case managers should disclose the least amount of confidential information necessary to achieve the desired purpose; only information that is directly relevant to the purpose for which the disclosure is made should be revealed.

(d) Case managers should inform clients, to the extent possible, about the disclosure of confidential information and the potential consequences, when feasible before the disclosure is made. This applies whether case managers disclose confidential information on the basis of a legal requirement or client consent.

(e) Case managers should discuss with clients and other interested parties the nature of confidentiality and limitations of clients' rights to confidentiality. Case managers should review with clients circumstances where confidential information may be requested and where disclosure of confidential information may be legally required. This discussion should occur as soon as possible in the case manager-client relationship and as needed throughout the course of the relationship.

(f) Case managers should not discuss confidential information in any setting unless privacy can be ensured. Case managers should not discuss confidential information in public or semipublic areas such as hallways, waiting rooms, elevators, and restaurants.

(g) Case managers should protect the confidentiality of clients' written and electronic records and other sensitive information. Case managers should take reasonable steps to ensure that clients' records are stored in a secure location and that clients' records are not available to others who are not authorized to have access.

(h) Case managers should take precautions to ensure and maintain the confidentiality of information transmitted to other parties through the use of computers, electronic mail, facsimile machines, telephones and telephone answering machines, and other electronic or computer technology. Disclosure of identifying information should be avoided whenever possible.

(i) Case managers should transfer or dispose of clients' records in a manner that protects clients' confidentiality and is consistent with state statutes governing records.

(j) Case managers and agencies should comply with all HIPAA regulations. (www.hhs.gov/ocr/hipaa)

2.08 Access to Records

(a) Case managers should provide clients with reasonable access to records concerning the clients. Case managers who are concerned that clients' access to records could cause serious misunderstanding or harm to the client should provide assistance in interpreting the records and consultation with the client regarding the records.

(b) When providing clients with access to their records, case managers should take steps to protect the confidentiality of others identified or discussed in such records.

2.09 Sexual Relationships

Case managers should under no circumstances engage in sexual activities or sexual contact with current or former clients or clients' families.

2.10 Physical Contact

Case managers should not engage in physical contact with clients when there is a possibility of psychological harm to the client as a result of the contact (such as cradling or caressing clients). Case managers who engage in appropriate physical contact with the clients are responsible for setting clear, appropriate, and culturally sensitive boundaries that govern such physical contact.

2.11 Sexual Harassment

Case managers should not sexually harass clients. Sexual harassment includes unwelcome and unwarranted sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct.

2.12 Derogatory Language

Case managers should not use derogatory language in their written or verbal communications to or about clients. Case managers should use accurate and respectful language in all communications to and about clients.

2.13 Clients Who Lack Decision-Making Capacity

When case managers act on behalf of clients who lack the capacity to make informed decisions, case managers should take reasonable steps to safeguard the interests and rights of those clients.

2.14 Interruption of Services

Case managers should make reasonable efforts to ensure continuity of services in the event that services are interrupted by factors such as unavailability, relocations, illness, disability, or death.

2.15 Termination of Services

- (a) Case managers should terminate services to clients and professional relationships with them when such services and relationships are no longer required or no longer serve the clients' needs or interests.
- (b) Case managers should take reasonable steps to avoid abandoning clients who are still in need of services. Case managers should withdraw services precipitously only under unusual circumstances, giving careful consideration to all factors in the situation and take care to minimize possible adverse effects. Case managers should assist in making appropriate arrangements for continuation of services when necessary.
- (c) Case managers who anticipate the termination or interruption of services to clients should notify clients promptly and seek the transfer, referral, or continuation of services in relation to the clients' needs and preferences.
- (d) Case managers who are leaving an employment setting should inform clients of appropriate options for the continuation of services and the benefits and risks of the options.

3. Case Managers Ethical Responsibilities to Colleagues

3.01 Respect

Case managers should treat colleagues with respect and should represent accurately and fairly the qualifications, views, and obligations of colleagues.

3.02 Confidentiality

Case managers should respect confidential information shared by colleagues in the course of their professional relationships and transactions. Case managers should ensure that such colleagues understand case managers' obligation to respect confidentiality and any exceptions related to it. The general expectation that case managers will keep information confidential does not apply when disclosure is necessary to prevent serious, foreseeable, and imminent harm to a client or other identifiable person.

3.03 Interdisciplinary Collaboration

Case managers who are members of an interdisciplinary team should participate in and contribute to decisions that affect the well-being of clients by drawing on the perspectives, values, and experiences of the case work profession. Professional and ethical obligations of the interdisciplinary team as a whole and of its individual members should be clearly established.

3.04 Consultation

Case managers should seek the advice and counsel of colleagues whenever such consultation is in the best interests of clients.

3.05 Referral for Services

Case managers should refer clients to other professionals when the other professionals' specialized knowledge or expertise is needed to serve clients fully or when case managers believe they are not being effective or making reasonable progress with clients and that additional service is required.

4. Case Managers' Ethical Responsibilities in Practice Settings

4.01 Continuing Education and Staff Development

Case manager administrators and supervisors should take reasonable steps to provide or arrange for continuing education and staff development for all staff for whom they are responsible. Continuing education and staff development should address current knowledge and emerging developments related to case work practice and ethics. Case managers in the Oklahoma City metro area should strive to participate in REACH, a collaborative training and network of area case managers.

5. Case Managers' Ethical Responsibilities as Professionals

5.01 Discrimination

Case managers should not practice, condone, facilitate, or collaborate with any form of discrimination on the basis of race, ethnicity, national origin, color, sex, sexual orientation, age, marital status, political belief, religion, or mental or physical disability.

5.02 Dishonesty, Fraud, and Deception

Case managers should not participate in, condone, or be associated with dishonesty, fraud, or deception.

5.03 Impairment

Case managers should not allow their own personal problems, psychosocial distress, legal problems, substance abuse, or mental health difficulties to interfere with their professional judgment and performance or to jeopardize the best interests of people for whom they have a professional responsibility.

NOTES TO CASH BASIS FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 2011

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Operations: Shawnee Rescue Mission, Inc. (the "Mission") is a community based non-profit organization located in Shawnee, Oklahoma that is funded by personal, private and public tax-free donations. The Mission works with local churches, businesses, organizations and with citizens in the Shawnee area as a community based effort to combat homelessness. In accordance with Christian principles, the Mission provides safety, physical and spiritual support services to anyone in need. The Mission assists individuals in becoming independent, dignified, and productive members of society.

Basis of Accounting: The Mission prepares its financial statements on a cash basis of accounting which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP"). Under this basis, cash receipts from donors or granting agencies are recognized as revenue at date of receipt, and cash payments are recognized as expenditures at date of payment. The cash basis differs from GAAP in that under the GAAP approach, revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

Cash and Cash Equivalents: The Mission defines cash and cash equivalents as cash and investments having an original maturity of three months or less. The Mission had no cash equivalents at December 31, 2011.

Concentration: During 2011, all of the Mission's revenues were generated from cash donations received from individuals and businesses, primarily in the Shawnee, Oklahoma area.

The Mission maintains cash balances at First United Bank. From time to time, the accounts may exceed the limits insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. Management does not consider this to be a significant risk.

Subsequent Events: Subsequent events have been evaluated through March 17, 2012, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

(2) GRANTS AND CONTRIBUTIONS

The Mission has received approval for an Affordable Housing Grant in the amount of \$450,000 to be used in renovating a building at 9th and Louisa in Shawnee, Oklahoma that is used in the Mission's ongoing operations. As of December 31, 2011, the Mission has not expended or received any of these grant funds.

During 2011, the Mission received a \$100,000 grant from the Zarrow Foundation. The Mission received the funds but chose to return them to the Zarrow Foundation to hold on behalf of the Mission until it is at a point where it will be able to use the funds for their intended purpose.

(2) **GRANTS AND CONTRIBUTIONS, CONTINUED**

As of December 31, 2011, the Mission was approved to receive \$8,700 of funding in 2012 from the United Way of Pottawatomie County to use in offsetting utilities expenses.

As of December 31, 2011, the Mission had approximately \$46,000 in pledges receivable from various individuals and businesses.

As the Mission's financial statements are presented on the cash basis, none of these grants, contributions, or pledges has been reflected in the accompanying financial statements.

(3) **RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS**

During 2011, the Mission received \$23,600 in donations from members of its Board of Directors.

During 2011, the Mission utilized a building located at 9th and Louisa in Shawnee, Oklahoma as part of its operations. The building is owned by Unity Health Group, whose president served on the Mission's Board of Directors for most of 2011. The Mission leased the building from Unity Health Group for a nominal annual fee.

(4) **DONATED GOODS AND SERVICES**

During 2011, the Mission received approximately \$598,000 of donated goods from Feed the Children to use in preparing meals and for giving to qualifying individuals.

During 2011, the Mission received approximately \$280,000 of donated goods from Oklahoma Regional Food Bank to use in preparing meals and for giving to qualifying individuals.

The Mission does not have any paid employees or Board members and relies on volunteers that donate their time to perform a variety of tasks that assist the Mission with its programs. The Mission does not record contributions of donated services as the Mission generally pays for all services requiring specific expertise.

(5) **FIXED ASSETS**

The accompanying financial statements are presented on the cash basis. The Mission does have various fixed assets used in its operations that are not presented in the cash basis financial statements. The Mission does track and depreciate its fixed assets, which had a net book value of approximately \$194,000 at December 31, 2011.

As discussed in Note 3 above, the Mission utilized a building located at 9th and Louisa in Shawnee, Oklahoma as part of its operations 2011 that is owned by Unity Health Group. As of December 31, 2011, the Mission was working with Unity and other interested parties to acquire the building. Although terms of the acquisition have not been finalized, management anticipates that the acquisition will be completed in 2012.

This MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING is hereby made and entered into by and between CITY RESCUE MISSION and the SHAWNEE RESCUE MISSION.

A. PURPOSE:

The purpose of this MOU is to continue to develop and expand a framework of cooperation between __Shawnee Rescue Mission_ and City Rescue Mission Inc., to provide _Consulting Services_ to enhance the success of Shawnee Rescue Missions in the community and the clients they serve.

B. CITY RESCUE MISSION INC., will provide:

- Assistance with the development of "Best Practice" policies and procedures for the operations of the mission.
- Consistent collaboration in regards to the operations of the mission and their services.
- Provide assistance with maintaining a qualified and trained team of staff and interns to carry out the desired programming functions. This would include administrative staff, security staff, food service staff and discipleship program staff.
- Assist in creative fundraising processes to help maintain a stable financial foundation for the ministry.

C. COLLABORATOR SHALL:

- Provide clear communications on existing policies and procedures of the mission
- Provide up to date information on numbers of clients served for determination of needed staff levels.

D. IT IS MUTUALLY UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED BY AND BETWEEN THE PARTIES THAT:

1. MODIFICATION. Modifications to this agreement shall be made by mutual consent of the parties, by the issuance of a written modification, signed and dated by authorized officials, prior to any changes being performed.
2. PARTICIPATION IN SIMILAR ACTIVITIES. This agreement in no way restricts City Rescue Mission Inc. from participating in similar activities with other public or private agencies, organizations, and individuals.
3. TERMINATION. Either party, upon thirty (30) days written notice, may terminate the agreement in whole, or in part, at any time before the date of expiration.

5. NON-FUND OBLIGATING DOCUMENT. This agreement is neither a fiscal nor a funds obligation document. Any endeavor or transfer of anything of value involving reimbursement or contribution of funds between the parties to this agreement will be handled in accordance with applicable laws, regulations, and procedures. Such endeavors will be outlined in separate agreements that shall be made in writing by representatives of the parties and shall be independently authorized by appropriate statutory authority. This agreement does not provide such authority. Each party shall be fiscally responsible for their own portion work performed under the MOU including staff payroll, benefits, workers compensation, supplies and other work related items.

6. HIPAA COMPLIANCE. The parties agree to abide by all applicable Federal and State laws/regulations addressing patient confidentiality.

7. COMMENCEMENT/EXPIRATION DATE. This agreement is executed as of the date of last signature and is effective through January 1, 2015 at which time it will expire unless extended.

8. LIABILITIES. It is understood that neither party to this Memorandum of Understanding is the agent of the other and neither is liable for the wrongful acts or negligence of the other. Each party shall be responsible for its negligent acts or omissions and those of its officers, employees, agents or students (if applicable), howsoever caused, to the extent allowed by Oklahoma state laws.

Dear Justin:

Thank you for the opportunity to address Mr. Salter's request from the September 5th Planning Commission meeting for police reports and written reports pertaining to the issues and concerns related to Shawnee Rescue Mission's proximity to residential areas and areas providing services to vulnerable developmentally and mentally disabled adults.

Per Mr. Salter's request, South Central obtained police reports that related to South Central's vocational shelter and the residential facilities providing services to developmentally disabled adults all of which are in close proximity to SRM's location.

The following is a breakdown of calls to police the year **prior** to SRM's locating across the street from South Central:

- 2 Burglary/Larceny calls (1 by SCI client, 1 by SCI disgruntled employee)
- 2 Suspicious person calls
- 1 Threat by phone (telemarketer)
- 5 Total

Following is a breakdown of police reports and calls to police following SRM's locating across the street from South Central:

- 1 Rape
- 1 Attack
- 2 Shots Fired/windows shot out
- 2 Harassment/Offensive Language
- 5 Trespassing/On property refusing to leave
- 3 Suspicious Person
- 5 Threats to others/threats to self
- 1 Arson
- 6 Vandalism/Broken glass, windows/Attempted burglaries
- 1 Sexual solicitations
- 5 Illegal Drugs/Public Drunkenness (drugs given to South Central clients)
- 17 Theft
- 5 Calls for assistance
- 54 Total

In addition to the above-mentioned reports, South Central has made several calls to the police department asking for assistance with blocked roadways and blocked driveways at the Group Homes that are not reflected in these reports.

Shawnee Rescue Mission has stated that the issues South Central reported in our initial letter resulted from being located in this area and not as a result of SRM clients. However, the numbers speak for themselves. Prior to SRM's relocation, South Central had made 5 calls to the police. Two calls involved a South Central client and a South Central disgruntled employee and one involved a telemarketer. Since SRM's relocation, the calls made to police range from sexual assault, to vandalism, theft and illegal drugs being given to South Central clients. The evidence supports that the issues are not a by-product of the neighborhood but the result of Shawnee Rescue Mission relocating to this area.

On behalf of the fifty (50) developmentally and mentally disabled clients that work at South Central, the ten (10) clients that live in our Group Homes and the thirty (30) developmentally and mentally challenged individuals living in the designated apartment complex nearby, South Central asks that you deny Shawnee Rescue Mission's request to operate 24/7. As you can see the benefit derived in caring for the homeless in a residential neighborhood consisting of almost 100 developmentally and mentally challenged adults is not worth the negative impact or safety risks being forced on these vulnerable individuals.

I am writing to respond to Commissioner Turner's request for information pertaining to what economic impact has occurred in the area surrounding Shawnee Rescue Mission since their relocation to 9th and Louisa.


As a property owner of four homes located in the 200 block of Park street, I can personally attest to the economic impact that has occurred over the past two years. The rental home at 229 N. Park, a four-bed, 2 bath home that previously rented through the Shawnee Housing Authority for \$800/mo now only rents for \$650/mo. Three bedroom homes in this area have lowered from \$650/mo to \$550/mo and two bedrooms are down from \$550/mo to \$450/mo. Some may think that this decline in rental values is due to the economic down turn of our nation; however, this lowering in rent has not occurred with my other properties located in other locales across Shawnee.

In addition, in 2011 I attempted to sale my properties at 218 N. Park and 229 N. Park. These properties were listed through Century 21 at their assessed value. Unfortunately, there were few offers to buy in this area and what offers were received were extremely below assessed value. Therefore, I had no other option than to retain these properties as rental properties and continue to watch my rental income decline.

I know this is just one example of the economic impact that has been felt in this area since the relocation of Shawnee Rescue Mission.

I was employed at Lamar Industries, 204 N. Louisa, from 1992 to 2005. I attest to the fact that undesirable activity near the corner of Ninth & Louisa occurred for many years *before* Shawnee Rescue Mission acquired the property. Police reports document some of the instances when police assistance was needed during those years.

One time a purse was found in the alley. We called the phone number found inside the purse & Kaye Steele thanked us for recovering her stolen purse. Another time, during daylight business hours, I left the office to get into my truck & found a man rummaging through an employee's vehicle. The man bolted up Louisa on foot.

At times, people walking along Louisa & Ninth Streets or in the alley entered the Lamar building uninvited. They were caught roaming in the warehouse areas as well as in the offices. Sometimes they walked in wanting to use the restroom. There is no doubt that missing tools & other items that appeared to be lost were in fact carried away by passersby. We even caught a homeless person living in a construction trailer parked in the storage yard west of the alley.

Because of frequent occurrences noted above, when I worked late at night & didn't leave the office until it was dark outside, I made sure to check the surroundings before exiting the building. Since the goals of Shawnee Rescue Mission include organizing a neighborhood watch group & implementing other security measures, the integrity of the neighborhood will be enhanced & not diminished.

In regards to homelessness in Shawnee, it is not isolated to the downtown area. When clearing heavy timber on a jobsite last year in a residential area in northern Shawnee, two separate homeless camps were discovered with makeshift shelters & clothes hanging in trees. The Shawnee Rescue Mission will be an asset to help eliminate these camps & provide opportunities for the homeless to improve their living conditions & find jobs.

Thank you for the opportunity to address Chairwoman Turner's request from the September 5th Planning Commission meeting pertaining to the impact of Shawnee Rescue Mission's proximity to residential areas and areas providing vocational services to vulnerable developmentally and mentally challenged adults.

Within the two block area on 9th street between Kickapoo and Park, there are over 90 developmentally and mentally challenged individuals who work and/or live. For over 30 years, this community within a community served as a safe haven for these individuals to socialize, shop, work and live. However, since 2010 and the relocation of Shawnee Rescue Mission within this two block radius, this "sheltered community" has been repeatedly victimized.

Since South Central Group Homes opening, there has been a significant number of clients vacate the premises. The main reason given for these clients' termination was the lack of security they felt due to the individuals around the Shawnee Rescue Mission. As you will note in the police reports, South Central's mentally and developmentally challenged clients have been the victim of many transgressions ranging from illegal substances to sexual abuse/propositions, theft and harassment.

Commissioner Turner's comments about weighing the beneficial impact to the homeless versus the negative impact to our vulnerable citizens whom already face mental and developmental adversities were much appreciated and insightful.

Attached please find letters from family members of South Central clients asking for help to protect their loved ones. As you will notice, many of our current clients' families are faced with making the decision between their child's happiness versus their safety.

My daughter, Lisa Schaffel, lives at South Central Industries Housing and works at South Central Industries Work Shop. As you are aware, she lives and works across the street from the Shawnee Rescue Mission. My daughter has Down Syndrome and is Intellectually Impaired. Due to her handicap, I am concerned that if the Rescue Mission expands to a homeless shelter, my daughter's safety will be placed further into jeopardy. As it is, there are unsupervised clients from the Rescue Mission that cause concern for the safety of my daughter and others from South Central Industries. As presented before, Rescue Mission clients' actions on South Central's property has been undesirable, if not illegal. Lisa and the other clients are vulnerable and are easily influenced by others. Of all people, the clients of South Central should be afforded the opportunity to live and work in a safe and positive environment. As a parent it is my responsibility to ensure the safety of my daughter. If Lisa is put in any more compromising situations as has been evidenced by the actions of the Rescue Mission clients, then I would have no choice but to consider moving her to another group home. Lisa came to South Central from another group home in which she was not thriving as she should. We chose South Central because of its reputation and opportunities it provides for Lisa to thrive. She has never been happier. It would be a shame to uproot her when she has finally found her niche. Would you want your child living and working in surroundings that would further put her at risk?

I am very concerned over the news of the Shawnee Rescue Mission potentially opening as a 24/7 facility. I understand and am sympathetic to the situation that many homeless people are in - I feel that having a disabled child has made me even more aware of the special needs of all, whether mentally or physically challenged, or emotionally disturbed or addicted. However, this heightened awareness of the situation does not allay my fears that my son could be threatened or harmed by the people that would frequent a 24/7 homeless shelter in such immediate proximity to his home. I have to consider the protection of my family first and foremost. If it did come to pass that the city allows the homeless shelter to open so close to our assisted living facility, I will have to reconsider Adrian's living arrangement. That would be devastating to Adrian. He is so happy at South Central - the homes are lovely and the staff is excellent, his work is so close. Our group homes just aren't set up to have the kind of surveillance and monitoring that would be needed to protect them from people who may be under the influence of drugs, or suffering from mental disturbances that often lead to violence. With the rescue mission open 24/7, the clients seeking food and shelter would be constantly around the area. Please let me know of any news you have of this situation, and who I could possibly consult with to voice my concerns.

As always - thank you and all the staff at South Central for the amazing and wonderful difference you have made in our lives.


Dear Sirs:



I am also aware of the planned paid full time staffing for the new Shawnee Rescue Mission. Other points of my personal concern:

The requested zoning change for the Shawnee Rescue Mission will help facilitate the renovation of their property and in doing so improve the values of surrounding properties,

The services that Shawnee Rescue Mission has offered in the past and hopefully continues to offer in do not conflict or duplicate the efforts of Salvation Army or other local service organizations. SRM and it's efforts will compliment and fill in the gaps of services needed for the needy in our community. Presently there are no services provided during the daytime hours in our community thus we see many of our needy and homeless in the local parks, library and anywhere else that they can get in out of the elements. SRM plans to have a full service day shelter with staffed support for the various needs of

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO WATER AND SANITARY SEWER RATES FOR THE CITY OF SHAWNEE, OKLAHOMA, AMENDING SUBSECTIONS (a) AND (b), SECTION 26-26, ARTICLE II, CHAPTER 26 OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF SHAWNEE; AMENDING WATER RATES FOR RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL USE BOTH INSIDE AND OUTSIDE THE CITY LIMITS; AMENDING SUB-SECTIONS (b) AND (c), SECTION 26-27, ARTICLE II, CHAPTER 26 OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF SHAWNEE; AMENDING SANITARY SEWER RATES FOR RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL USE BOTH INSIDE AND OUTSIDE THE CITY LIMITS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SHAWNEE, OKLAHOMA:

SECTION 1: AMENDATORY. That Sub-Section (a), Section 26-26, Article II, Chapter 26 of the Code of the City of Shawnee is hereby amended to read as follows:

The master plan engineers have advised us not to do any major projects until the master plan is finished, although we can continue with pipe bursting and water line projects. Based on these facts, staff's recommendation is to postpone the rate increase scheduled for November 1, 2012 until November 1, 2013. After the master plan project is complete and we have an idea what needs to be done, it can then be reassessed.

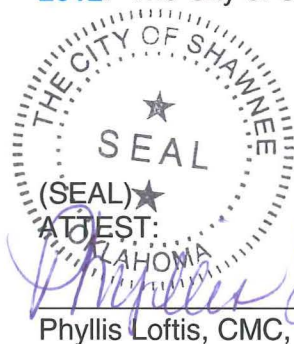
