Amy Dunn representing Pottawatomie Alliance for Community Health spoke regarding the Shawnee designation as a Certified Healthy Community. Shawnee received this designation last year and was awarded a grant of \$10,000.00. The City of Shawnee has been certified again this year and will be applying for a merit level grant of \$20,000.00 for 2013. In order to apply for this grant, there would need to be a Resolution supporting municipality's right to set tobacco decisions for their community. Also, an Ordinance prohibiting the advertisement of alcohol and tobacco products at any city sponsored event. Ms. Dunn would like to make a formal presentation to the commission at the next meeting and have the Resolution and Ordinance on that agenda. The deadline for grant application is February 28, 2013.

Cynthia Sementelli, Finance Director, reported the sales tax for January was down \$21,082 from last year receipts. The original amount the tax commission reported was down by approximately \$139,000 from the actual amount we will receive. V. CONSIDERATION OF REQUESTS

A. Consideration of request by Tyler Bridges to replace the regular School Zone signs with Flashing School Zone signs on Walnut Street just West of Pleasant Grove School and on Bryan Street on both the North and South sides of Pleasant Grove School.

Discussion: Michael Ludi-staff recommends approval of the light and would like to make the Traffic commission aware of the cost of the sign because it is a significant cost at \$5200 each .Tyler Bridges states the original request is to replace the regular School Zone Sign with a Flashing School Zone Sign on Walnut Street just west of Pleasant Grove School. This is the only one needed. Several incidents have happened in this area. It is a blind hill that is right before the school. People just fly over the hill and do not see the cars stopped for school pickup times. Major concern for safety is on Walnut. Ronald Taffe recommended amending the request to read " Consideration of request by Tyler Bridges to replace the regular School Zone Sign with a Flashing School Zone Sign on Walnut Street just West of Pleasant Grove School" All agreed to amend the consideration.

Minutes from the Traffic Commission October 23, 2012 Meeting Page 2 B. Discussion of proposed striping and signage of bike lanes for Bryan Street and surrounding streets.

Discussion: Michael Ludi presented a power point that showed general options for signage and striping. This is not to be viewed as a recommendation for any specific one but to just show options for striping and signage. Share the roads signs are signs that can be put on any speed of road with no changes to the road sizes. These signs would just need to be spaced out appropriately. Sharrows are actual striping you can paint them directly in the road lane and no additional signs are required although you can put signs with them as well. These can only be placed on roads with a speed limit not higher than 35 mph and you must place these every 250ft. when you do use them. May Use Full Lane signs are signs that give riders use of the full lane without changing the lane size. This sign would only be recommended for four lane roads. **Restriping the current two** lane street is an option. On a typical 32' two lane street you could restripe to have two 11' lanes and a 5' bike lane on each side with added bike lane signage. Code in Shawnee allows 12' lanes if we were to look at this option codes would need to be changed to allow the smaller lane. **Restriping a current four lane street** is an option. On a typical 50' four lane street you would stripe four 10' lanes and a 5' bike lane on each side with the added bike lane signage. With this option again other steps would need to be taken regarding changing the lane size to under 12'. Ludi showed an area map that has roads highlighted for 32' and 50' streets in Shawnee. This shows there is no good pattern to connect a bike trail throughout the City. We would need to choose multiple methods to create Bike paths around the City. Ludi also showed a map of Broadway that highlighted other problems that might be an issue when creating City wide trails. No parking in some areas might be needed and the bike lanes would end at intersections in some areas due to width issues. Other obstacles to look at would be referenced to Independence Street; if you put bike lanes there you would have to do away with center turn lanes which would back up traffic. No plans or recommendations are being made. No study has been done.

Shawna Turner, Chairman of the Planning Commission, states at the beginning of her term she was presented with the Master Trails Plans. Part of that document was to look at trails, sidewalks and cycling to connect the City and to encourage a safe pedestrian traffic and bike traffic. She had hoped there had been some action taken on bike lanes, but none has been to date. After a couple of her friends had been struck by cars while riding on City streets she decided to bring this back up again. Ms. Turner consulted the transportation planner for Oklahoma City to see if he had any thoughts on how we might do this and do it well. The planner states they use the sharrows. This does not designate a lane but it alerts drivers and cyclists that the area had been designated route and to expect to encounter cyclists on that roadway. When used with Share the Road signage this offers cyclists increased protection. Ms. Turner would like to see something get started to encourage people be more active and to use our streets for more than just driving their cars on.

Bill Burk states he has been part of the bicycle club since 1993. He states he tries not to ride in town much. April 15, 2012 at the intersection of Broadway and Independence he was hit by a car while riding his bicycle. He states parked cars on roads and intersections are issues for cyclists. Bike lanes or anything the City could do to make awareness that there are people on bicycles out there would be helpful.

Monica Mullins states she rides regularly. Ms. Mullins uses her bike to commute to and from work at OBU. It is her primary mode of transportation. She states bikes are a healthy way and environmentally friendly and economical way for people to get around town. The more ways we have for everyone who share the roads to be aware of their rights and responsibilities she believes is beneficial. Many do not treat her as if she belongs on the road. Anything the City can do to educate people and to raise awareness so that others could feel comfortable and confident to ride. She states the students at OBU are terrified to ride around town and if they do ride they make poor choices because they do not know where to ride. She believes if there were bike lanes it would help them get around the community a little better.

Ronald Taffe states that sharing the road is the responsibility of everyone. He would love to see more education on the subject beginning possibly in the schools. Schools are always looking for presentations to be given to the kids. Part of the problem is the many different types of streets we have in the City. Ms. Turner suggests looking at the Master trail plans for recommendations on what streets to mark for bike trails. Theresa Cody recommends more discussion on this topic. She would like to review the Trails Master Plan. The next Traffic Commission Meeting is scheduled for November 27th. The commission would like to gather more information on this topic for further review.


(57) ABSTRACT





Concerning the cab and chassis needed for the Pro Patch Asphalt attachment, it is my understanding that Freightliner and International are the only vendors that make a truck with the electrical wiring and hydraulic alterations required for the Pro Patch. It is my recommendation to purchase the Freightliner instead of the International even with the cost of the International being less for the following reasons:

- Freightliner has a Cummins ISB 6.7 motor in it. This is the same basic motor that is in the Dodge pickup trucks it just has a lot more torque. This motor has been in use for several years and is a proven motor. The parts (when needed) will cost about 1/3 less than the parts for an International and can be purchased just about anywhere (including NAPA and O'reily's). The resale value on a Freightliner is higher than an International as well.
- International has a DT466 motor in it. This motor has only been out for a short time. This specific motor has had issues with its DPF emissions system. International is trying to work out all the "bugs" in it but with any new motor will take a few years. As the "bugs" are being worked out the truck may need to be in the shop for parts changing. Most of this should be covered in the warranty but will cause down time. The parts for this truck can only be purchased from international. Parts for an International are specific to the International motor and in turn cost more and may take up to two (2) weeks to receive. This will add to the down time needed for repairs.

Please consider the long term costs when deciding the final truck for purchase.

Commissioners:

There are four items, as we see it, that need to be addressed: Consultant Services, Provider Contracts, the City's contribution to the employees' medical benefits, and definition of those eligible for participation in the plan.

Consultant Services:

Summary: To the best of our knowledge, Commissioners have requested that the "Consultant Services" be rebid. We have used Insurica for that outsourced function since the FY budget year of 2009. Dustin Brand is the staff member with Insurica who was assigned to us. His duties include shopping the medical insurance market with the providers that will consider us in April of each year. Also, he handles situations with the provider that are beyond the scope of the employee insurance work group. He and Insurica have done an excellent job, and employees are really pleased with the service that he has performed for us.

Staff Recommendation: Develop an appropriate RFP for distribution to potential consultants. That RFP should be developed by a third party so that we get proposals from consultants that are qualified to perform services to employers like us. Thereafter, the employee work group shall narrow down the applicants, interview them and make a recommendation to Commissioners for consultant services.

Provider Contracts:

Summary: As staff understands it, Commissioner Harrod requested this item be placed on the agenda because he wants the City Commission to approve the annual contract with whichever provider is selected. Several years ago, the Commission capped its contribution to employee health benefits. Thereafter, since increases in the cost of coverage were to be borne by the employees, an employee work group was established so staff could manage the benefits for themselves.

Staff Recommendation: Commission approval of our provider contract is an excellent idea. The employee work group shall make a recommendation on the provider and level of benefits each year, based on quotes or bids obtained with the advice of the Consultant.

<u>City's Contribution toward Medical Benefits:</u>

Summary: The City's insurance contribution for non-union employees has remained the same for several years. There have been some changes in the amount paid for Union employees. Those amounts have been put into the City Manager's proposed budget that was approved by Commissioners.

Staff Recommendation: No Change. The City Manager's proposed budget will address the amount to be paid by the City, as in the past. It will be subject to the Commission's approval of the budget.

Definition of Insured:

Summary: This issue has been brought forward and discussed several times. The current contract for insurance does not provide for non-employees to be covered by the plan. However, over the years, from time to time Commissioners and their dependents have received coverage. There is no clear policy for staff to follow.

Staff Recommendation: This is a policy issue. The Commission should determine whether or not Commissioners and their dependents are to be covered, as well as determining when a former Commissioner and dependents may be carried on the Plan as a retired individual.

As chair for the Insurance Workgroup I wanted to give you an overview of who we are and what we do.

The workgroup is made up of employees representing all the other employees in their department. We have 16 members in the group which includes a representative for each union. Some members have been on the workgroup for several years while others change yearly. Departments select the coworker that will represent their concerns on insurance issues and selection.

Since we are comprised of employees from all departments & potentially differing shifts, there is not a set schedule of meetings. When there is something to discuss or review we schedule a time to meet. In the past, we had an initial meeting to get the group together, see what the overall satisfaction had been with the current insurance carrier (claims processing, co-pays, benefits...) then schedule a time to meet with our consultant.

The consultant would meet with the group, listen to any concerns that might need to be addressed and, when received, present the proposed renewal rates. This would be when the group would review the rates (increase or decrease) and decide what the employees want to do (based on prior discussion with departments). Rates are determined, open enrollment is scheduled, and members help during the open enrollment process.

This process has allowed employees direct access and input on the selection of their medical, dental & vision insurance. We have had some positive actions in the past few years as a direct result of being employee driven. Having complaints come from the employees to the workgroup, the workgroup is able to find ways to remedy

the problem. Members of the group are able to take what is discussed in the meeting back to the employees. Some employees feel this is more trusted information since it comes from other employees that were involved in the process. The group can honestly say that "this is the best option available to our group" or can share the process of how we get to a decision.

As mentioned earlier, we talk about how the employees are with overall satisfaction of insurance to include the carriers & open enrollment. In the past few years we have made great strides to improve the efficiency of open enrollment process as well as the benefits available. Open enrollment has been streamlined and received many positive comments! We opted to bring in a new worksite benefit provider, American Fidelity. This addition gave employees the unreimbursed medical card. Some employees had used one at previous employment and were thrilled to have access to one for their unreimbursed medical through the City of Shawnee. Knowing the varying needs of our employees we have brought more options on types of medical plans available. We now have an HMO as well as two different PPO options.

INSURANCE WORK GROUP

The City of Shawnee started the Insurance Work Group in approximately December of 2005 composed of staff that represented the different departments of the employment population to evaluate the insurance policies each year and be the "voice" of the employees regarding any changes implemented. The work group in recent years has been able to work closely with our Consultant, Dustin Brand with Insurica, to negotiate with the insurance companies regarding rates and different benefits that the employees have wanted to include in their package. Over the last 4 years, we have experiences no increases—along with the last renewal we had a 1.5% increase. Our consultant does not charge commissions for his services, but the City of Shawnee pays him a flat fee—currently \$24,500 per year.

The consultant is able to "shop" the different insurance companies for each plan year. He communicates directly with the insurance companies and the insurance work group— eliminating the need of going through a closed bid system that does not allow negotiations.

The consultant assists Human Resources with any claims or issues that an employee may have that is unable to be resolved directly with the insurance company. The consultant also assists with the week of open enrollment. The arrangement has been very successful in recent years—the employees are able to voice concerns and give input into how the plan is designed. There have been very few complaints regarding the insurance.

The Commissioners would have to pay 100% of the premium because the City Charter states there is no compensation for the Commissioners. This item was introduced by Commissioner Harrod, who stated that due to the staff vacancies in Accounting and Human Resources it seems like a good time for the City Commission to take control of the city employees' health insurance. He also stated that it was important to get the best insurance for the money available. Commissioner Harrod made a motion that the City Commission take control of the employee health insurance bidding process, including the selection of an agent of record to work with the city's insurance committee on employee health insurance, although the City Commission would have final say in the selection. Vice Mayor Stephens asked for clarification regarding the City's contribution toward the health insurance premiums to employees. She was informed the amount is \$1,219,000.00 per year. Vice Mayor Stephens then seconded Commissioner Harrod's motion.

Upon further discussion, Commissioner Sims stated that he would like to see the current Commission take the politics out of the insurance equation. He pointed out that the City pays a set amount toward the employees' insurance which does not change from year to year. The employees pay the majority costs of the insurance and any insurance increases, which have skyrocketed in recent years. He added that an Agent of Record would charge approximately \$110,000 in commissions, which would be also be borne by employees. Commission Sims stated that he felt it would be a mistake to take the decision away from the employees. Commissioner Holt agreed with Commissioner Sims and stated that previously three members of the current commission voted to "get out of the insurance business" and give this decision to staff. He also noted that he has not received any complaints from employees regarding the insurance issue since he has been on the Commission. Vice Mayor Stephens said that she felt it was the Commission's responsibility to be good stewards of the citizens' money; that she felt a

responsibility to the taxpayers as well as the employees. She and Commissioner Harrod both stated that they have received some complaints from city employees regarding insurance. Mayor Peterson asked if the Vice Mayor thought there might be a reduction in the amount that the City contributes to employee insurance. Vice Mayor Stephens answered that it was possible. She also stated that perhaps working with the insurance committee and trying to get the best deal for employees would allow the City to pay more toward employee coverage.

The employee work group analyzed the RFPs and determined the best two carriers were **Pacificare** and Aetna. The work group interviewed the carrier representatives.

The work group also met with two agents to answer questions and explain services they provided. The agents were J.T. Weedman, Tony Wall and Greg Wall; and Dustin Brand of North American. Commissioner Schrzan questioned Mrs. Cragin as to why staff recommended Aetna when Blue Cross Blue Shield had a lower proposal for the HMO plan. AGENDA ITEM NO. 5: Discuss and consider the procedure for analyzing health insurance bids. City Treasurer/Finance Director Becky Cragin explained that the main objective was to find the best health insurance coverage with a cost- effective price. Therefore, to be fair and honest, an RFP was drawn up, modeled from other cities, with input from the employee insurance group, and then advertised for a sealed bid process. Ms. Cragin noted that an addendum was sent to the bidders regarding "net of commission" or "with commission," but it did not change the RFP. She contacted all the bidders to make sure this particular item was clear to all the bidders. Upon discussion, Commissioner Schrzan guestioned City Treasurer Cragin and City Manager Collard about the process of requesting the bidders to bid their service net of commissions, which he stated was excluding the current Agents-of-Record, The Wall Brothers and J. T. Weedman. The city treasurer and city manager replied that it was never their intent to omit the current agents-of record. In further discussion, City Attorney John Canavan advised that legally the City is not required to use the bid process for the service of health insurance and since there is not a court case or state guidance, the City could set its own policy. He gave the following options: 1) open bids and proceed; 2) reject all bids; 3) if bids are prejudiced, do not open; or 4) if the Commission decided the bid process was too confusing, then it would be the Commission's option to do otherwise. Mayor Mills invited the insurance company representatives present in the audience to speak and answer questions.

Four out of the five insurance representatives were complimentary of city staff for the thorough specifications provided them and for their excellent communication with the bidders. Mr. J. T. Weedman, current agent-of-record for the City, complained that the bidding process was not fair stating PacifiCare refused to give a bid because the City requested the bid be "net of commission." Finalizing discussion, City Treasurer Cragin recommended the procedures for the bid process as follows:

1) open bids

2) evaluation of bids by employee insurance work group

3) give opportunity for selected insurance agents to clarify insurance proposals to the employee work group

4) allow city staff to forward its recommendation to the City Commission

5) after approval by the City Commission on the selected insurance carrier, allow adjustments to be made

First, Mr. Weedman told about his nine years as the City's agent of record stating that in that time the City had little problems and thereafter up to the present, as he understood, there were many problems with the health insurance.

Mr. Greg Wall and Mr. Tony Wall asked the Commission to consider going with local agents pointing out that through their commissions and wages paid to their employees monies would go right back into Shawnee's economy. Both agencies felt it unfair that they had helped City staff last year to put together a proposal for health insurance and were not given consideration. They appealed to the Commission to give them the opportunity to be the agent of record for the City. Mr. Tim McFall of North American insurance Agency, the City's current Agent of Record, acknowledged that problems with claims when they entered the contract with the City a year ago was not North American's fault, but they had rectified those problems and had done a good job for the City. Next, Personnel Director Dave Chesher informed the Commission that rarely do insurance companies go beyond the 12-month contract, but North American was able to get the 15-month contract with Aetna.

Upon discussion, several city officials expressed satisfaction with North American considering it would be wrong for the City not to continue with them at this point since

enrollment was completed. Other Commissioners expressed another side to the argument saying that they clearly supported conducting business locally. After deliberation, a motion was made by Commissioner Weaver, seconded by Commissioner Pettyjohn, to change the Agent of Record from North American insurance Agency to The Weedman Group and Wall Brothers insurance Services in thirty (30) days. He stressed that with the current insurance increases, the City of Shawnee employees were not the cause of the rapid increases in premiums in the State Plan.

He also emphasized that the City would have more control of the insurance plan and the City could build a larger plan with the payments going back into the reserve.

After hearing from Mr. Roberts, two local insurance agents, Mr. J. T. Weedman and Mr. Tony Wall, who wanted an opportunity to bid on the City's insurance, addressed the Commission.

Mr. Weedman was the first to give the history from his point of view on the City's insurance track record since 1986. He cautioned how tricky health insurance can be and in a constant change.

Next, Mr. Wall also came forth with words of caution stating that there are no simple answers and the decisions depend on how much risk the City wants to take and at what level of benefits they desire.

City Manager Terry Powell commented that to simplify the proposals for health insurance, the state plan could be a model for the specifications. In view of the foregoing topic of conversation, Commissioner Pettyjohn suggested that staff work with the agents to develop criteria for gathering quotes for the City's health insurance in order for the Commission to make the best decision.

A motion was made by Commissioner Pettyjohn, seconded by Vice Mayor Downing, to instruct the City Manager and the Director of Public

Safety and Administration, to work with any interested agent in developing criteria and to accept health insurance proposals at the December 17th meeting. Motion carried.

a. Employee Health Insurance and Related Benefits (award)

Mr. Allen Benelli, Personnel Director, addressed the Commission for an analysis of the health insurance proposals for FY 2000-2001. He advised that currently the employees participate in the Oklahoma State and Education Employees Group Health Insurance Plan.

Mr. Benelli had included in the agenda packet the analysis of the health insurance proposals that were submitted at the last meeting that contained the following information:

*definition of Health Care Terms

*spreadsheet containing a summary of proposed insurance coverage

*notes on the summary of proposed insurance coverage

*cost analysis of the monthly premiums for various health insurance proposals

Other key points made by Mr. Benelli were that the employees currently participate in the Oklahoma State and Education Employees Group Health Insurance Plan and through a survey of employees, a majority were in favor of staying with the State Plan.

He noted that the City of Shawnee contributes towards each employee's health care premium of \$150.00 per month for single employees and \$275.00 per month for employees with families. The majority of the employees are enrolled in an HMO and a minority of employees are enrolled in the Indemnity Plan.

At this time, Mr. J. T. Weedman, local insurance agent for Blue Cross & Blue Shield Insurance Company, presented a new proposal after stating that he had requested his insurance carrier to go to a lower cost in order to be more competitive. It was ruled by City Attorney John Canavan that since the proposals were submitted by sealed bid, that the Commission could not consider Mr. Weedman's new proposal, but the Commission had the right to throw out all the bids and rebid if they wished. The State Plan representatives were in attendance to answer questions about the State Plan.

A motion was made by Commissioner Claybrook, seconded by Vice Mayor Downing, that the City of Shawnee remain with the Oklahoma State and Education Employees Group Health Insurance Plan for health care insurance for the fiscal year 2000-2001 effective July 1, 2000. Motion carried.

SUMMARY

On January 10, 2013, the Administrative Hearing Office (Community Development Director) for the City of Shawnee issued an Administrative Order requiring the dismantling and removal of all buildings associated with the property at 915 E. Hayes (Exhibit 1). In accordance with Shawnee Municipal Code Section 7-582(6), Rita Knight-Taber filed an appeal of the Administrative Order (see Exhibit 2).

STAFF ANALYSIS




Figure 1: Location map.




Figure 2: Property layout, 915 E. Hayes.

The property located at 915 E. Hayes is part of Grove Block 2, Lots 18-23 (see Figure 1 for location map). The plat dates to 1909 and the subject property has been in the current family's holdings since the 1950s. There are five (5) structures located on the site, which include: 1) single-family residence; 2) carport; 3) barn; 4) outbuilding; and 5) a cellar/storm shelter (see Figure 2 for site layout). According to the Potawatomie County Assessor, the home was built in 1940 and is 728 square feet. The six lots total 18,750 square feet.

The single-family residence is in extremely poor condition. Approximately one-quarter or more of the roof has collapsed. In addition, the interior of the structure has suffered catastrophic damage including deterioration of the subfloor (missing in places), and severe damage to the foundation (which is bowing) and sill plates. Rehabilitation of the structure would require a new roof, new plumping, new wiring, new foundation, new subfloor, new structural members and other repairs. According to City records, the house has not had active water service since November 2004 (see Exhibit 3 for Building Inspector Report).

As is typical, when a primarily residence is ordered removed, all accessory structures are also required to be removed. The reason for this is two-fold. First, accessory structures are not permitted without the establishment of a primary use (residence) and thus, removal of all structure prevents the establishment of a non-conforming situation. Second, without a primary residence, outbuildings and

accessory buildings tend to suffer vandalism and are an attractive nuisance to vagrants and children. Accessory structures located on this property include an unsecured cellar/storm shelter, a barn that is in very poor condition, a carport that is in fair condition and another outbuilding, which is in poor condition.

Exhibit 4 includes a series of the photographs of the property and all structures located thereon. Exhibit 5 lists previous code enforcement action taken at the subject property. Between May 2004 and April 2009, 12 violations were recorded for tall grass and weeds. The owner did correct the violations in every case.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Administrative Order ordering the removal of all structures at 915 E. Hayes be upheld and that the appeal filed by Rita Knight-Taber be <u>denied</u>.

Should the City Commission offer relief to the appellant, Staff recommends that the primary structure (residence), the barn, and the outbuilding be required to be removed (leaving the carport and cellar/storm shelter) and that the remaining two structures be secured.





SUMMARY OF REQUEST

Tiffany Miller (DBA: R Town Real Estate Investments, LLC) owner of 20 acres on the western boundary of the city limits (see attached map) is requesting de-annexation of the property (see attached request and supporting documentation). The proposed use of the land is a rural residential subdivision. The proposed lot configuration could not be approved under City of Shawnee zoning regulations, which require a minimum of five (5) acres for each dwelling unit in the A-1 (Agricultural) Zone. Nearly all land in the vicinity of Shawnee Twin Lakes is zoned A-1. There are no City utilities in the vicinity of the property.

STAFF ANALYSIS

The Shawnee Comprehensive Plan encourages strategic annexation of unincorporated land adjacent to the City – it does not address the issue of de-annexation at all. In general, it would be rare for a City to actively pursue a policy of de-annexation, considering the difficultly in annexing property under State law.

With the above stated, Staff understands that the applicant was under the belief that the property was in unincorporated Pottawatomie County at the time of purchase. The development plans indicate a development featuring lots 1.14-1.57 acres in size with site-built homes a minimum of 1,800 square feet. The proposed development could not be approved by the existing zone classification. Even if the land was rezoned to "RE" (Rural Estate), the minimum size lot would be two-acres under City development regulations. With a few exceptions, nearly all the land in the Twin Lakes region, is zoned A-1 (Agricultural).

Considered in isolation, the proposed development and de-annexation probably has minimal impact to the City, but it would set a precedent that would make it very hard to deny similar petitions in this area, which could lead to a slow, but continual decrease in land within City Limits.

Staff notes the following potential benefits and drawbacks to de-annexation:

Potential Benefits of De-Annexation:

- 1. City no longer has to provide fire/police service, which in theory may save some resources/expense; and
- 2. Development of 16 rural residential lots can occur and serve the region.


Potential Drawbacks to De-Annexation:

- 1. Density is greater than surrounding land use, other neighbors may want area to stay rural with 5-acre minimum;
- 2. Sixteen (16) additional wells/septic systems within the watershed;
- 3. May spur additional de-annexation requests and approval sets a precedent;
- 4. Development is dense (more urban than rural) yet has no public utilities, fire protection (fire hydrants, etc.); and
- 5. City has no code enforcement authority/ability.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends <u>denial</u> of the requested de-annexation. The potential drawbacks to de-annexation outweigh the potential benefits to the City of Shawnee in Staff's opinion.

The acreage was purchased with the understanding that it was not in city limits. The county assessor's office was contacted and it was shared that the property, at time prior to purchase, was county. The county commissioner's office was contacted and it was shared that the property was county. The road markings and/or striping currently in front of the property shows where the county and city change from one to the other and it appears to be at the Easterly edge of the property which would give the appearance that the property is in county - not city limits. Road requirements of what the county required for the road were given to Shawna Miller at a meeting at the property with Mr. Richards and his foreman. The surveyor began working on the plat of survey for the addition to be submitted for the docket and bids were being obtained for the road when it was learned that the property may be in the city limits. As of present date, all operations have been stopped due to this possibility.

The Quail Run addition will be a great asset to the community. It will give those wishing to move in to the community, and not wanting to maintain five acres or more, a beautiful mature treed addition in the Bethel School District to live in.





A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF SHAWNEE, OKLAHOMA, URGING THE OKLAHOMA STATE LEGISLATURE TO RESTORE THE RIGHTS OF CITIZENS OF LOCAL GOVERNMENTS TO ADOPT LAWS REGULATING THE USE OF TOBACCO WITHIN THEIR COMMUNITIES

WHEREAS, local governments have the right and responsibility to adopt laws that protect the health and safety of their citizens, and

WHEREAS, the people in local government should have the right to protect themselves against the harmful effects of secondhand smoke; and

WHEREAS, Oklahoma has a preemptive state law since 1987, which prohibits local governments from enacting laws that restrict smoking in any public places; and

WHEREAS, the vast majority of states do not preempt local smoke-free air legislation and Oklahoma is one of only two states that preempts all smoke-free air legislation; and

WHEREAS, more than 3,500 local governments throughout the country have successfully passed smoke-free air laws to protect people against the harmful effects of secondhand smoke; and

WHEREAS, 48.7% of the U.S. population lives in cities or states with smoke-free air laws for enclosed public places and workplaces, restaurants, and bars, while many of these Oklahoma venues remain smoke-filled and their employees and patrons remain unprotected from secondhand smoke because of preemptive state laws; and

WHEREAS, the tobacco industry, in an effort to negate such local registration, has long had as its chief legislative strategy the preemption of local authority to regulate smoke-free laws; and

WHEREAS, preemptive state laws have a devastating effect on tobacco control efforts, economic development, and on the public health of the states' residents and workers; and

WHEREAS, multiple states have successfully overturned preemption and restored local control to enact and enforce smoke-free air laws; and

WHEREAS, protecting people from the harmful effects of secondhand smoke is best accomplished by local communities working directly with the people most affected by smoke-free air laws: and

WHEREAS, numerous studies have found that tobacco smoke is a major contributor to indoor air pollution, and that breathing secondhand smoke is a cause of disease in healthy nonsmoker, including heart disease, stroke, respiratory disease, and lung cancer; and

WHEREAS, the 2006 U.S. Surgeon General's report, "*The Health Consequences of Involuntary Exposure to Tobacco Smoke*," concluded that there is 1) no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke; 2) ventilation and other air cleaning technologies cannot completely control for exposure of nonsmokers to secondhand smoke; 3) smoke-free workplace policies are the only effective way to eliminate secondhand smoke exposure in the workplace, and 4) evidence from peer-reviewed studies show that smoke-free policies and laws do not have an adverse economic impact on the hospitality industry; and

WHEREAS, the Oklahoma State Legislature should not deprive local governments of the authority to protect people from the harmful effects of secondhand smoke;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City of Shawnee urges the State Legislature to repeal any preemption of local smoke-free air and restore the right of local governments to enact and enforce smoke-free air laws.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City of Shawnee strongly encourages other local governmental entities in Oklahoma to adopt similar resolutions.

AN ORDINANCE ENACTING A NEW SECTION TO THE SHAWNEE MUNICIPAL CODE PROHIBITING ADVERTISEMENT OF TOBACCO AND ALCOHOL PRODUCTS AT CITY-SPONSORED EVENTS; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, use of tobacco products and excessive use of alcohol has been proven detrimental to health; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of the citizens of the City of Shawnee that healthy lifestyles be promoted; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Mayor and City Commissioners of the City of Shawnee that Shawnee be designated as a Healthy Community; and

WHEREAS, limiting the types of advertising at City-sponsored events promotes those goals;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SHAWNEE, OKLAHOMA:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. That a new section to be codified as Section 20-42 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Shawnee, Oklahoma, is hereby adopted and shall from and after the effective date of this Ordinance read as follows:

SECTION 20-42.ADVERTISMENT OF TOBACCO ANDALCOHOL PROHIBITED AT CITY SPONSORED EVENTS.

A. It shall be unlawful for any person or business to market or advertise, in any manner or method, products that contain tobacco or alcohol at any event sponsored

by the City of Shawnee, Oklahoma.

- B. Such events shall include, but are not limited to:
- 1. Sporting events;
- 2. Parades;
- 3. Museums;
- 4. Dances; and
- 5. Festivals

C. Any person, firm, or corporation found in violation of this Section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in an amount not to exceed \$500. Every day a violation occurs shall be deemed a separate offense.

<u>SECTION 2: SEVERABILITY</u>. The provisions of this ordinance are severable, and if any sentence, provision or other part of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the decision of the courts so holding shall not affect or impair any of the remaining parts or provisions of this ordinance.

<u>SECTION 3: EMERGENCY</u>. That for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, by reason whereof this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon passage and approval.



At the January 22, 2013 City Commission meeting we opened bids that were received for the Bell Street Sidewalk Project. A total of eight bids were received and opened, however, I failed to notice that one of the bids received was from a company that had not purchased a set of plans and specifications directly from the City of Shawnee as required by the contract documents for the bid to be considered. I should have not even opened that company's bid and had it returned to them. That company had submitted their bid on the wrong bid schedule sheet because unknown to us, we were not able to send them the Addendum and the "revised bid schedule" to bid as the other seven bidders had done. That is the reason we require plan holders to directly purchase the plans from us so that we have their name(s), addresses, and email so that if Addendums and revised bid schedules are issued that we can ensure that all plan holders receive them, and the bids submitted are "apples to apples" so to speak.

We did tabulate the seven bids that were bid with the revised bid schedule and they are attached. The lowest and best bid received was from All Roads Paving in the dollar amount of **\$95,875.50**. At the February 4, 2013 City Commission meeting, staff will be recommending to award the Bell Street Sidewalk Project to All Roads paving in the amount of **\$95,875.50**.

We had budgeted \$180,000 this current fiscal year (see attached Capital Outlay Report), and with \$30,050.20 going to OGE for the decorative lighting along the project, we have approximately \$142,000 remaining for the sidewalk and enhanced crosswalk work that will be done on this project. If you have any questions or need additional information, please advise.

COS-PW-12-03</u>, <u>BELL STREET SIDEWALK PROJECT</u> and the envelope should bear on the outside the name of the BIDDER, his address, his license number if applicable and the name of the project for which the BID is submitted. If forwarded by mail, the sealed envelope containing the BID must be enclosed in another envelope addressed to the OWNER at <u>Office of the CITY CLERK</u>, P.O. Box 1448, Shawnee, OK 74802-1448.

No BIDDER may withdraw a BID within 60 days after the actual date of the opening thereof. Should there be reasons why the contract cannot be awarded within the specified period, the time may be extended by mutual agreement between the OWNER and the BIDDER.

BIDDERS must satisfy themselves of the accuracy of the estimated quantities in the BID SCHEDULE by examination of the site and review of the drawings and specifications including ADDENDA. After BIDS have been submitted, the BIDDER shall not assert that there was a misunderstanding concerning the quantities of WORK or of the nature of the WORK to be done.

The OWNER shall provide to BIDDERS prior to BIDDING, all information that is pertinent to, and delineates and describes, the land owned and rights-of-way acquired or to be acquired.
